## Associations of "Hiring" (30 Words)

<a href="#">career</a>	The time spent by a person in a career. <i>The general had had a distinguished <b>career</b>.</i>
<b>chartered</b>	(of an accountant, engineer, librarian, etc.) qualified as a member of a professional body that has a royal charter. <i>The <b>chartered</b> buses arrived on time.</i>
<a href="#">employ</a>	The state of being employed or having a job. <i>The newcomers are <b>employed</b> in developing the technology into a product.</i>
<b>employed</b>	Put to use. <i>Most of our graduates are <b>employed</b>.</i>
<b>employee</b>	A person employed for wages or salary, especially at non-executive level.
<a href="#">employer</a>	A person or firm that employs workers. <i>The National Health Service was the largest <b>employer</b> in Europe.</i>
<b>employment</b>	The utilization of something. <i>The <b>employment</b> of a full time tutor.</i>
<a href="#">engage</a>	Engage for service under a term of contract. <i>She had offered to <b>engage</b> a room in the house of the woman.</i>
<a href="#">engaged</a>	Unavailable for use by anyone else or indicating unavailability engaged is a British term for a busy telephone line. <i>She rang Mrs Tavett but the line was <b>engaged</b>.</i>
<b>hired</b>	Hired for the exclusive temporary use of a group of travelers. <i><b>Hired</b> hands.</i>
<b>hireling</b>	A person who works only for money. <i>The government s paid <b>hirelings</b> assure us that we re on our way out of recession.</i>
<b>indenture</b>	The state of being bound to service by an indenture. <i>The 30 apprentices have received their <b>indentures</b> on completion of their training.</i>

<b>induct</b>	Formally introduce (a member of the clergy) into possession of a benefice. <i>My master <b>inducted</b> me into the skills of magic.</i>
<b>lackey</b>	A brownish European moth of woods and hedgerows, the caterpillars of which live communally in a silken tent on the food tree. <i><b>Lackeys</b> were waiting to help them from the carriage.</i>
<b>latecomer</b>	Someone who arrives late. <i><b>Latecomers</b> were not admitted before the interval.</i>
<u><b>mercenary</b></u>	A person hired to fight for another country than their own. <i>She s nothing but a <b>mercenary</b> little gold digger.</i>
<u><b>profession</b></u>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>The legal <b>profession</b> has become increasingly business conscious.</i>
<b>recruit</b>	Persuade to do or help with something. <i>The regiment was still actively <b>recruiting</b>.</i>
<b>recruiter</b>	A person whose job is to enlist or enrol people as employees, in the armed forces, or as members of an organization. <i>Military <b>recruiters</b>.</i>
<b>rent</b>	Hold under a lease or rental agreement of goods and services. <i>I cannot even afford to pay the <b>rent</b> on this flat.</i>
<b>semiskilled</b>	Possessing or requiring limited skills. <i><b>Semiskilled</b> dockworkers.</i>
<u><b>servant</b></u>	A person working in the service of another (especially in the household). <i>A government <b>servant</b>.</i>
<b>subcontract</b>	Work under a subcontract engage in a subcontract. <i><b>Subcontract</b> work.</i>
<b>subcontractor</b>	A firm or person that carries out work for a company as part of a larger project.
<b>sycophant</b>	A person who tries to please someone in order to gain a personal advantage.
<b>toady</b>	Act in an obsequious way. <i>She imagined him <b>toadying</b> to his rich clients.</i>
<b>workaholic</b>	Person with a compulsive need to work.
<b>workday</b>	A day on which one works. <i>Saturdays were <b>workdays</b> for him.</i>
<u><b>workforce</b></u>	The people engaged in or available for work, either in a country or area or in a particular firm or industry. <i>A quarter of Galway s manufacturing <b>workforce</b> are being put out of a job.</i>
