career	The time spent by a person in a career. <i>The general had had a distinguished career.</i>
chartered	(of an accountant, engineer, librarian, etc.) qualified as a member of a professional body that has a royal charter. <i>The chartered buses arrived on time.</i>
employ	The state of being employed or having a job. <i>The newcomers are employed in developing the technology into a product.</i>
employed	Put to use. <i>Most of our graduates are employed.</i>
employee	A person employed for wages or salary, especially at non-executive level.
employer	A person or firm that employs workers. <i>The National Health Service was the largest employer in Europe.</i>
employment	The utilization of something. <i>The employment of a full time tutor.</i>
engage	Engage for service under a term of contract. <i>She had offered to engage a room in the house of the woman.</i>
engaged	Unavailable for use by anyone else or indicating unavailability engaged is a British term for a busy telephone line. <i>She rang Mrs Tavett but the line was engaged.</i>
hired	Hired for the exclusive temporary use of a group of travelers. <i>Hired hands.</i>
hireling	A person who works only for money. <i>The government s paid hirelings assure us that we re on our way out of recession.</i>
indenture	The state of being bound to service by an indenture. <i>The 30 apprentices have received their indentures on completion of their training.</i>

induct	Formally introduce (a member of the clergy) into possession of a benefice. <i>My master inducted me into the skills of magic.</i>
lackey	A brownish European moth of woods and hedgerows, the caterpillars of which live communally in a silken tent on the food tree. <i>Lackeys were waiting to help them from the carriage.</i>
latecomer	Someone who arrives late. <i>Latecomers were not admitted before the interval.</i>
<u>mercenary</u>	A person hired to fight for another country than their own. <i>She s nothing but a mercenary little gold digger.</i>
<u>profession</u>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>The legal profession has become increasingly business conscious.</i>
recruit	Persuade to do or help with something. <i>The regiment was still actively recruiting.</i>
recruiter	A person whose job is to enlist or enrol people as employees, in the armed forces, or as members of an organization. <i>Military recruiters.</i>
rent	Hold under a lease or rental agreement of goods and services. <i>I cannot even afford to pay the rent on this flat.</i>
semiskilled	Possessing or requiring limited skills. <i>Semiskilled dockworkers.</i>
<u>servant</u>	A person working in the service of another (especially in the household). <i>A government servant.</i>
subcontract	Work under a subcontract engage in a subcontract. <i>Subcontract work.</i>
subcontractor	A firm or person that carries out work for a company as part of a larger project.
sycophant	A person who tries to please someone in order to gain a personal advantage.
toady	Act in an obsequious way. <i>She imagined him toadying to his rich clients.</i>
workaholic	Person with a compulsive need to work.
workday	A day on which one works. <i>Saturdays were workdays for him.</i>
<u>workforce</u>	The people engaged in or available for work, either in a country or area or in a particular firm or industry. <i>A quarter of Galway s manufacturing workforce are being put out of a job.</i>
