## Synonyms of "Historically" as an adverb (11 Words)

<b>commonly</b>	Very often; frequently. <i>Shift workers <b>commonly</b> complain of not getting enough sleep.</i>
<b>conventionally</b>	In a way that is based on what is traditionally done or believed. <i>He was dressed <b>conventionally</b> in a grey shirt and trousers.</i>
<b>customarily</b>	By custom; according to common practice. <i>The leaves are <b>customarily</b> used for animal fodder.</i>
<b><u>generally</u></b>	Without regard to specific details or exceptions. <i>A decade when France was moving <b>generally</b> to the left.</i>
<b>habitually</b>	According to habit or custom. <i>Does he lie <b>habitually</b>.</i>
<b><u>normally</u></b>	In a normal manner. <i>Try to breathe <b>normally</b>.</i>
<b>ordinarily</b>	Usually. <i>A person who is <b>ordinarily</b> resident in the United Kingdom.</i>
<b><u>regularly</u></b>	On a habitual basis; usually. <i>A <b>regularly</b> updated news page.</i>
<b><u>routinely</u></b>	As part of a regular procedure rather than for a special reason. <i>Owners <b>routinely</b> flout local laws about restraining and picking up after their pets.</i>
<b>traditionally</b>	According to tradition; in a traditional manner. <i><b>Traditionally</b> styled 1930s era houses.</i>
<b><u>typically</u></b>	In a way that is characteristic of a particular person or thing. <i>A <b>typically</b> English village wedding.</i>

- anachronism** A person who seems to be displaced in time; who belongs to another age.  
*The town is a throwback to medieval times an **anachronism** that has survived the passing years.*
- anachronistic** Belonging to a period other than that being portrayed.  
*English public schools are **anachronistic**.*
- ancient** A person who lived in ancient times.  
***Ancient** history.*
- annals** Used in titles of learned journals.  
*The **annals** of the police courts.*
- antediluvian** Of or belonging to the time before the biblical Flood.  
*A ramshackle **antediluvian** tenement.*
- anthropology** The study of human societies and cultures and their development.
- antiquate** Give an antique appearance to.
- antiquity** Extreme oldness.  
*The great civilizations of **antiquity**.*

<b>archaeological</b>	<i>Uprooting trees will disturb any <b>archaeological</b> remains below ground level.</i>
<b>archaeology</b>	The study of human history and prehistory through the excavation of sites and the analysis of artefacts and other physical remains.
<b>archaic</b>	(of a word or a style of language) no longer in everyday use but sometimes used to impart an old-fashioned flavour. <i>Prisons are run on <b>archaic</b> methods.</i>
<b>cartographic</b>	Of or relating to the making of maps or charts. <i>He started his own <b>cartographic</b> printing company.</i>
<b>chronicle</b>	A fictitious or factual work describing a series of events. <i>His work <b>chronicles</b> 20th century migration.</i>
<b>chronology</b>	A record of events in the order of their occurrence. <i>His book transformed prehistoric <b>chronology</b> by applying the results of carbon dating.</i>
<b>classic</b>	An artist who has created classic works. <i><b>Classic</b> Chinese pottery.</i>
<b>demography</b>	The composition of a particular human population. <i>Europe's <b>demography</b> is changing.</i>
<b>dolmen</b>	A megalithic tomb with a large flat stone laid on upright ones, found chiefly in Britain and France.
<b>historic</b>	Belonging to the past; of what is important or famous in the past. <i>A <b>historical</b> character.</i>
<b>history</b>	A record kept by a web browser of the web pages and other files it has been used to access. <i>He teaches Medieval <b>history</b>.</i>
<b>megalithic</b>	Relating to or denoting prehistoric cultures characterized by the erection of monuments made of large stones. <i>Massive <b>megalithic</b> monuments.</i>
<b>old</b>	Used informally especially for emphasis old adj of a very early stage in development. <i>I get sick of the same <b>old</b> routine.</i>
<b>outdated</b>	Out of date; obsolete. <i><b>Outdated</b> equipment.</i>
<b>paleolithic</b>	Second part of the Stone Age beginning about 750,000 to 500,000 years BC and lasting until the end of the last ice age about 8,500 years BC. <i><b>Paleolithic</b> artifacts.</i>
<b>paleontology</b>	The earth science that studies fossil organisms and related remains.

- past** A past tense or form of a verb.  
*The **past** year.*
- period** A set of elements occupying a horizontal row in the periodic table.  
***Period** pains.*
- precedent** A system of jurisprudence based on judicial precedents rather than statutory laws.  
*We hope to set a legal **precedent** to protect hundreds of miles of green lanes.*
- prehistoric** Very old or out of date.  
*My dad s electric typewriter was a **prehistoric** machine.*
- prehistory** The events or conditions leading up to a particular occurrence or phenomenon.  
*The **prehistory** of capitalism.*
- regressive** (of taxes) adjusted so that the rate decreases as the amount of income increases.  
*Indirect taxes are as a group **regressive**.*
