*That hat is my **property**.*
- retention** The fact of keeping something in one's memory.
*Eating too much salt can lead to fluid **retention**.*

<u>founder</u>	Fail utterly; collapse. <i>The horses foundered.</i>
have	Have as a feature. <i>Have a postdoc.</i>
holder	A smallholder. <i>A cigarette holder.</i>
<u>host</u>	Be the host of or for. <i>Your host is Stuart Macmillan.</i>
hostess	A woman innkeeper. <i>The perfect dinner party hostess.</i>
<u>keep</u>	Store or keep customarily. <i>Keep my job for me while I give birth.</i>
<u>landed</u>	Owning or consisting of land or real estate. <i>The decline of landed estates.</i>
landholder	A person who owns land, especially one who either makes their living from it or rents it out to others.
landlady	A woman who keeps lodgings, a boarding house, or a pub.
landlord	A man (in legal use also a woman) who rents out land, a building, or accommodation.
<u>loot</u>	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>Ten thousand quid is a lot of loot.</i>
memory	An electronic memory device. <i>He searched his memory frantically for an answer.</i>
<u>own</u>	Have something as one's own possess. <i>I used to design all my own clothes.</i>
<u>owner</u>	Someone who owns (is legal possessor of) a business. <i>They are searching for the owner of the car.</i>
possession	The state of being completely dominated by an idea or emotion. <i>She had taken possession of the sofa.</i>
possessor	A person who owns something or has a particular quality. <i>His father was the possessor of a considerable fortune.</i>

property	Shares or investments in property. <i>Self confidence is not an endearing property.</i>
<u>proprietor</u>	(law) someone who owns (is legal possessor of) a business. <i>By 1640 he was himself the proprietor of a three hundred acre tract.</i>
rancher	A person who owns or runs a ranch.
<u>retention</u>	The action of absorbing and continuing to hold a substance. <i>The children s retention of facts.</i>
retentive	(of a substance) able to absorb and hold moisture. <i>Soil should be rich and moisture retentive.</i>
<u>stock</u>	Supply with livestock. <i>I must stock up the fridge.</i>
<u>unpack</u>	Remove from its packing. <i>Unpack the presents.</i>
<u>vested</u>	Fixed and absolute and without contingency. <i>A vested right.</i>
wallet	A bag for holding provisions, especially when travelling, typically used by pedlars and pilgrims.
