## Synonyms of "Homage" as a noun (18 Words)

<b><u>acclaim</u></b>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The book met with modest <b>acclaim</b>.</i>
<b>acclamation</b>	Loud and enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in <b>acclamation</b>.</i>
<b><u>admiration</u></b>	Something regarded as impressive or worthy of respect. <i>I have the greatest <b>admiration</b> for all those involved in the project.</i>
<b>adulation</b>	Excessive admiration or praise. <i>He found it difficult to cope with the <b>adulation</b> of the fans.</i>
<b>commendation</b>	An award given for very good performance. <i>The film deserved the highest <b>commendation</b>.</i>
<b>court</b>	The courtiers retinue and household of a sovereign. <i>The house was built around an inner <b>court</b>.</i>
<b>esteem</b>	An attitude of admiration or esteem. <i>He was held in high <b>esteem</b> by colleagues.</i>

<b>give recognition to</b>	The elasticity of something that can be stretched and returns to its original length.
<b>honour</b>	An ace, king, queen, jack, or ten. <i>His portrait hangs in the place of <b>honour</b>.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise. <i>All glory <b>laud</b> and honour to Thee Redeemer King.</i>
<b>pay tribute to</b>	Something that remunerates.
<b>praise</b>	The expression of respect and gratitude as an act of worship. <i>The audience was full of <b>praise</b> for the whole production.</i>
<b>recognition</b>	An acceptance (as of a claim) as true and valid. <i>A politician whose recall of names was as remarkable as his <b>recognition</b> of faces.</i>
<b>respect</b>	The state of being admired or respected. <i>He went to law school out of <b>respect</b> for his father s wishes.</i>
<b>reverence</b>	An act showing respect (especially a bow or curtsy). <i>The French treat food with gentle <b>reverence</b>.</i>
<b>salute</b>	A prescribed movement, typically a raising of a hand to the head, made by a member of a military or similar force as a formal sign of respect or recognition. <i>A twenty one gun <b>salute</b>.</i>
<b>take one's hat off to</b>	The income or profit arising from such transactions as the sale of land or other property.
<b>worship</b>	The activity of worshipping. <i><b>Worship</b> of the Mother Goddess.</i>



### **Usage Examples of "Homage" as a noun**

- *A man doing homage to his personal lord.*
- *Many villagers come here to pay homage to the Virgin.*

- admiration** A feeling of delighted approval and liking.  
*A small token in **admiration** of your works.*
- admire** Look at (something impressive or attractive) with pleasure.  
*I **admire** your courage.*
- admired** Regarded with admiration.
- adoration** The act of admiring strongly.  
*It was enough to earn him the **adoration** of the fans.*
- adored** Regarded with deep or rapturous love (especially as if for a god).  
***Adored** grandchildren.*
- appreciation** Increase in monetary value.  
*The **appreciation** of the dollar against the pound.*
- awe** Inspire awe in.  
*He stared over the edge with a feeling of **awe**.*
- canonize** Treat as a sacred person.  
*We have **canonized** freedom of speech as an absolute value overriding all others.*

<b>comity</b>	The mutual recognition by nations of the laws and customs of others. <i>A show of public <b>comity</b> in the White House.</i>
<b>compliance</b>	The action or fact of complying with a wish or command. <i>This paper estimates the <b>compliance</b> costs of such a policy change.</i>
<b>deference</b>	A disposition or tendency to yield to the will of others. <i>His <b>deference</b> to her wishes was very flattering.</i>
<b>esteem</b>	An attitude of admiration or esteem. <i>He was held in high <b>esteem</b> by colleagues.</i>
<b>fame</b>	The state of being known or talked about by many people, especially on account of notable achievements. <i>The song's success rocketed him to stardom and <b>fame</b>.</i>
<b>glowing</b>	The amount of electromagnetic radiation leaving or arriving at a point on a surface. <i>He received a <b>glowing</b> report from his teachers.</i>
<b>honor</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>Today we <b>honor</b> our soldiers.</i>
<b>idolatry</b>	The worship of idols. <i>We must not allow our <b>idolatry</b> of art to obscure issues of political significance.</i>
<b>obedience</b>	Behavior intended to please your parents. <i>Their children were never very strong on <b>obedience</b>.</i>
<b>obeisance</b>	A gesture expressing deferential respect, such as a bow or curtsy. <i>They paid <b>obeisance</b> to the Prince.</i>
<b>obey</b>	Carry out (a command or instruction). <i>When the order was repeated he refused to <b>obey</b>.</i>
<b>pious</b>	Dutiful or loyal, especially towards one's parents. <i>A deeply <b>pious</b> woman.</i>
<b>respect</b>	Show respect towards. <i>The government's record in this <b>respect</b> is a mixed one.</i>
<b>respectful</b>	Feeling or showing deference and respect. <i>They sit in <b>respectful</b> silence.</i>
<b>revere</b>	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>C zanne's still lifes were <b>revered</b> by his contemporaries.</i>
<b>reverence</b>	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>The Chinese <b>reverence</b> for the dead.</i>

- reverent** Feeling or showing profound respect or veneration.  
*A **reverent** silence.*
- reverential** Of the nature of, due to, or characterized by reverence.  
*Their names are always mentioned in **reverential** tones.*
- venerate** Regard with great respect; revere.  
*We **venerate** genius.*
- veneration** A feeling of profound respect for someone or something.  
*His respect for the law bordered on **veneration**.*
- wonder** Something that causes feelings of wonder.  
*How many times have I written that I **wonder**.*
- worship** The activity of worshipping.  
*The family **worshipped** at Trinity Church.*
