- *Special honour or respect shown publicly.*



Synonyms of "Homage" as a noun (18 Words)

<u>acclaim</u>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The book met with modest acclaim.</i>
acclamation	Loud and enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in acclamation.</i>
<u>admiration</u>	Something regarded as impressive or worthy of respect. <i>I have the greatest admiration for all those involved in the project.</i>
adulation	Excessive admiration or praise. <i>He found it difficult to cope with the adulation of the fans.</i>
commendation	An award given for very good performance. <i>The film deserved the highest commendation.</i>
court	The courtiers retinue and household of a sovereign. <i>The house was built around an inner court.</i>
esteem	An attitude of admiration or esteem. <i>He was held in high esteem by colleagues.</i>

give recognition to	The elasticity of something that can be stretched and returns to its original length.
honour	An ace, king, queen, jack, or ten. <i>His portrait hangs in the place of honour.</i>
laud	Praise. <i>All glory laud and honour to Thee Redeemer King.</i>
pay tribute to	Something that remunerates.
praise	The expression of respect and gratitude as an act of worship. <i>The audience was full of praise for the whole production.</i>
recognition	An acceptance (as of a claim) as true and valid. <i>A politician whose recall of names was as remarkable as his recognition of faces.</i>
respect	The state of being admired or respected. <i>He went to law school out of respect for his father s wishes.</i>
reverence	An act showing respect (especially a bow or curtsy). <i>The French treat food with gentle reverence.</i>
salute	A prescribed movement, typically a raising of a hand to the head, made by a member of a military or similar force as a formal sign of respect or recognition. <i>A twenty one gun salute.</i>
take one's hat off to	The income or profit arising from such transactions as the sale of land or other property.
<u>worship</u>	The activity of worshipping. <i>Worship of the Mother Goddess.</i>



Usage Examples of "Homage" as a noun

- *Daniel's films were a homage to her.*
- *A man doing homage to his personal lord.*
- *Many villagers come here to pay homage to the Virgin.*



Associations of "Homage" (30 Words)

<u>admiration</u>	A feeling of delighted approval and liking. <i>A small token in admiration of your works.</i>
admire	Look at (something impressive or attractive) with pleasure. <i>I admire your courage.</i>
admired	Regarded with admiration.
<u>adoration</u>	The act of admiring strongly. <i>It was enough to earn him the adoration of the fans.</i>
adored	Regarded with deep or rapturous love (especially as if for a god). <i>Adored grandchildren.</i>
appreciation	Increase in monetary value. <i>The appreciation of the dollar against the pound.</i>
<u>awe</u>	Inspire awe in. <i>He stared over the edge with a feeling of awe.</i>
canonize	Treat as a sacred person. <i>We have canonized freedom of speech as an absolute value overriding all others.</i>

comity	The mutual recognition by nations of the laws and customs of others. <i>A show of public comity in the White House.</i>
compliance	The action or fact of complying with a wish or command. <i>This paper estimates the compliance costs of such a policy change.</i>
<u>deference</u>	A disposition or tendency to yield to the will of others. <i>His deference to her wishes was very flattering.</i>
esteem	An attitude of admiration or esteem. <i>He was held in high esteem by colleagues.</i>
<u>fame</u>	The state of being known or talked about by many people, especially on account of notable achievements. <i>The song s success rocketed him to stardom and fame.</i>
<u>glowing</u>	The amount of electromagnetic radiation leaving or arriving at a point on a surface. <i>He received a glowing report from his teachers.</i>
honor	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>Today we honor our soldiers.</i>
idolatry	The worship of idols. <i>We must not allow our idolatry of art to obscure issues of political significance.</i>
<u>obedience</u>	Behavior intended to please your parents. <i>Their children were never very strong on obedience.</i>
obeisance	A gesture expressing deferential respect, such as a bow or curtsy. <i>They paid obeisance to the Prince.</i>
<u>obey</u>	Carry out (a command or instruction). <i>When the order was repeated he refused to obey.</i>
<u>pious</u>	Dutiful or loyal, especially towards one's parents. <i>A deeply pious woman.</i>
respect	Show respect towards. <i>The government s record in this respect is a mixed one.</i>
respectful	Feeling or showing deference and respect. <i>They sit in respectful silence.</i>
revere	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>C zanne s still lifes were revered by his contemporaries.</i>
reverence	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>The Chinese reverence for the dead.</i>

<u>reverent</u>	Feeling or showing profound respect or veneration. <i>A reverent silence.</i>
<u>reverential</u>	Of the nature of, due to, or characterized by reverence. <i>Their names are always mentioned in reverential tones.</i>
<u>venerate</u>	Regard with great respect; revere. <i>We venerate genius.</i>
vereneration	A feeling of profound respect for someone or something. <i>His respect for the law bordered on vereneration.</i>
wonder	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>How many times have I written that I wonder.</i>
<u>worship</u>	The activity of worshipping. <i>The family worshipped at Trinity Church.</i>
