<b>honourableness</b>	The quality of deserving honor or respect; characterized by honor.
<b>integrity</b>	The state of being whole and undivided. <i>The structural <b>integrity</b> of the novel.</i>
<b>lunaria annua</b>	Southeastern European plant cultivated for its fragrant purplish flowers and round flat papery silver-white seedpods that are used for indoor decoration.
<b>money plant</b>	The official currency issued by a government or national bank.
<b>moral correctness</b>	The significance of a story or event.
<b>morality</b>	Concern with the distinction between good and evil or right and wrong; right or good conduct. <i>The issue of the <b>morality</b> of the possession of nuclear weapons.</i>
<b>morals</b>	Motivation based on ideas of right and wrong.
<b><u>nobility</u></b>	The group of people belonging to the highest social class in a country; the aristocracy. <i>A man of <b>nobility</b> and learning.</i>
<b><u>openness</u></b>	Without obstructions to passage or view. <i>The <b>openness</b> of the Western landscape.</i>
<b>outspokenness</b>	The trait of being blunt and outspoken.
<b>plainness</b>	Clarity as a consequence of being perspicuous. <i>The <b>plainness</b> of vanilla ice cream.</i>
<b>principle</b>	A rule or law concerning a natural phenomenon or the function of a complex system. <i>He will not violate his <b>principles</b>.</i>
<b>principles</b>	Rule of personal conduct. <i>The <b>principles</b> of democracy.</i>
<b>rectitude</b>	Morally correct behaviour or thinking; righteousness. <i>Mattie is a model of <b>rectitude</b>.</i>
<b>righteousness</b>	Adhering to moral principles. <i>We had little doubt about the <b>righteousness</b> of our cause.</i>

<b>satin flower</b>	Reproductive organ of angiosperm plants especially one having showy or colorful parts.
<b>satinpod</b>	Southeastern European plant cultivated for its fragrant purplish flowers and round flat papery silver-white seedpods that are used for indoor decoration.
<b>silver dollar</b>	A soft white precious univalent metallic element having the highest electrical and thermal conductivity of any metal; occurs in argentite and in free form; used in coins and jewelry and tableware and photography.
<u><a href="#">sincerity</a></u>	A quality of naturalness and simplicity. <i>The <b>sincerity</b> of his beliefs is unquestionable.</i>
<b>straightforwardness</b>	The quality of being direct and straightforward. <i>What some people take for rudeness is really <b>straightforwardness</b>.</i>
