genuineness	Undisputed credibility. <i>The uneven appearance of the grain confirms the genuineness of the leather.</i>

honestness	The quality of being honest.
honour	(in whist) an ace, king, queen, or jack of trumps. <i>The highest military honours.</i>
honourableness	The quality of deserving honor or respect; characterized by honor.
integrity	The state of being whole and undivided. <i>The structural integrity of the novel.</i>
lunaria annua	Southeastern European plant cultivated for its fragrant purplish flowers and round flat papery silver-white seedpods that are used for indoor decoration.
money plant	The official currency issued by a government or national bank.
moral correctness	The significance of a story or event.
morality	Concern with the distinction between good and evil or right and wrong; right or good conduct. <i>The issue of the morality of the possession of nuclear weapons.</i>
morals	Motivation based on ideas of right and wrong.
<u>nobility</u>	The group of people belonging to the highest social class in a country; the aristocracy. <i>A man of nobility and learning.</i>
<u>openness</u>	Without obstructions to passage or view. <i>The openness of the Western landscape.</i>
outspokenness	The trait of being blunt and outspoken.
plainness	Clarity as a consequence of being perspicuous. <i>The plainness of vanilla ice cream.</i>
principle	A rule or law concerning a natural phenomenon or the function of a complex system. <i>He will not violate his principles.</i>
principles	Rule of personal conduct. <i>The principles of democracy.</i>
rectitude	Morally correct behaviour or thinking; righteousness. <i>Mattie is a model of rectitude.</i>
righteousness	Adhering to moral principles. <i>We had little doubt about the righteousness of our cause.</i>

satin flower	Reproductive organ of angiosperm plants especially one having showy or colorful parts.
satinpod	Southeastern European plant cultivated for its fragrant purplish flowers and round flat papery silver-white seedpods that are used for indoor decoration.
silver dollar	A soft white precious univalent metallic element having the highest electrical and thermal conductivity of any metal; occurs in argentite and in free form; used in coins and jewelry and tableware and photography.
<u>sincerity</u>	A quality of naturalness and simplicity. <i>The sincerity of his beliefs is unquestionable.</i>
straightforwardness	The quality of being direct and straightforward. <i>What some people take for rudeness is really straightforwardness.</i>
truth	A fact that has been verified. <i>He told the truth.</i>
<u>truthfulness</u>	The fact of being realistic or true to life; realism. <i>The truthfulness of her playing of an ageing American spinster.</i>
uprightness	Position at right angles to the horizon. <i>Steadying himself he slowly managed to achieve a state of relative uprightness.</i>

<u>candor</u>	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
candour	The quality of being open and honest; frankness. <i>A man of refreshing candour.</i>
<u>childlike</u>	Exhibiting childlike simplicity and credulity. <i>Childlike charm.</i>

clarity	The quality of being certain or definite. <i>The clarity of the picture.</i>
credibility	The quality of being trusted and believed in. <i>The book s anecdotes have scant regard for credibility.</i>
decency	The quality of conforming to standards of propriety and morality. <i>A loose dress rather too low cut for decency.</i>
directness	The quality of proceeding in a straight line without deflection. <i>I like the simplicity and directness of the image.</i>
forthrightness	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
frank	Clearly manifest; evident. <i>To be perfectly frank I don t know.</i>
friendliness	The quality of being friendly; affability. <i>I was overwhelmed by the friendliness of the people here.</i>
guileless	Devoid of guile; innocent and without deception. <i>His face once so open and guileless.</i>
honest	Gained or earned without cheating or stealing. <i>Gave honest answers.</i>
integrity	Internal consistency or lack of corruption in electronic data. <i>The structural integrity of the novel.</i>
naivete	Innocence or unsophistication. <i>His greatest fault was his political naïvet.</i>
openness	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>The openness of the internet makes public debate more possible.</i>
probity	Complete and confirmed integrity; having strong moral principles. <i>He enjoys an exaggerated reputation for probity.</i>
rectitude	Righteousness as a consequence of being honorable and honest. <i>Mattie is a model of rectitude.</i>
righteousness	Adhering to moral principles. <i>Conviction of his own moral righteousness gave his oratory an irresistible power.</i>
sincere	(of a person) saying what they genuinely feel or believe; not dishonest or hypocritical. <i>She d sounded sincere enough.</i>
sincerity	A quality of naturalness and simplicity. <i>The simple sincerity of folk songs.</i>
straightness	A sexual attraction to (or sexual relations with) persons of the opposite sex.

transparency	Permitting the free passage of electromagnetic radiation. <i>The transparency of ice.</i>
truth	That which is true or in accordance with fact or reality. <i>He told the truth.</i>
<u>truthfulness</u>	The fact of being true; truth. <i>The truthfulness of her playing of an ageing American spinster.</i>
unflinching	Not shrinking from danger. <i>He has shown unflinching determination throughout the campaign.</i>
uprightness	Righteousness as a consequence of being honorable and honest. <i>There is a general lack of uprightness in these postmodern times.</i>
<u>veracity</u>	Conformity to facts; accuracy. <i>Officials expressed doubts concerning the veracity of the story.</i>
