<a href="#">admirable</a>	Arousing or deserving respect and approval. <i>His taste was impeccable his health <b>admirable</b>.</i>
<b>advert</b>	An advertisement.
<b>aforementioned</b>	Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of. <i>Songs from the <b>aforementioned</b> album.</i>
<b>aforesaid</b>	Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
<a href="#">allude</a>	(of an artist or a work of art) recall (an earlier work or style) in such a way as to suggest a relationship with it. <i>The photographs <b>allude</b> to Italian Baroque painting.</i>
<a href="#">allusion</a>	The practice of making allusions. <i>An <b>allusion</b> to Shakespeare.</i>
<b>ascribe</b>	Regard something as being due to (a cause). <i>He <b>ascribed</b> Jane s short temper to her upset stomach.</i>
<b>citation</b>	A reference to a previous case, used as guidance in the trying of comparable cases or in support of an argument. <i>The <b>citation</b> described him as an officer of extreme gallantry.</i>
<a href="#">cite</a>	A short note recognizing a source of information or of a quoted passage. <i>He does not <b>cite</b> any source for this assertion.</i>
<b>creditable</b>	(of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful. <i>A very <b>creditable</b> 2 4 defeat.</i>
<b>declaim</b>	Speak against in an impassioned manner. <i>An opportunity to <b>declaim</b> against the evils of society.</i>
<b>enunciation</b>	The articulation of speech regarded from the point of view of its intelligibility to the audience.
<b>estimable</b>	Deserving of respect or high regard. <i><b>Estimable</b> assets.</i>

<b>fame</b>	Favorable public reputation. <i>Winning the Olympic title has brought her <b>fame</b> and fortune.</i>
<b>famous</b>	Excellent. <i>A <b>famous</b> star.</i>
<b>foregoing</b>	Especially of writing or speech; going before. <i>The <b>foregoing</b> analysis of the economic class structure.</i>
<b>gratefully</b>	In a thankful manner; with thanks. <i>Your financial support is <b>gratefully</b> acknowledged.</i>
<b>impute</b>	Assign (a value) to something by inference from the value of the products or processes to which it contributes. <i>The teacher <b>imputed</b> the student's failure to his nervousness.</i>
<b>notation</b>	A note or annotation. <i>He added a short <b>notation</b> to the address on the envelope.</i>
<b>note</b>	A written sign representing the pitch and duration of a musical note. <i>The Secretariat sent a diplomatic <b>note</b> to the embassy protesting about the sale of arms.</i>
<b>ostensive</b>	Manifestly demonstrative.
<b>quote</b>	Put quote marks around. <i>He <b>quoted</b> from the scriptures.</i>
<b>refer</b>	Make reference to. <i><b>Refer</b> to your notes.</i>
<b>reference</b>	The relation between a word or phrase and the object or idea it refers to. <i>Each chapter should have <b>references</b> to books covering the subject in greater depth.</i>
<b>remark</b>	A written or spoken comment. <i>He <b>remarked</b> the man's inflamed eyelids.</i>
<b>reputable</b>	Having a good reputation. <i>A <b>reputable</b> wine.</i>
<b>repute</b>	Look on as or consider. <i>The waters of the fountain are <b>reputed</b> to have healing properties.</i>
<b>respectable</b>	Of some merit or importance. <i>America's GDP grew by a <b>respectable</b> 2.6 per cent.</i>
<b>respected</b>	Deeply admired or esteemed. <i>A <b>respected</b> academic.</i>
<b>statement</b>	A nonverbal message. <i>She accessorized with a dazzling orange scarf and a <b>statement</b> necklace.</i>
