- Deserving of esteem and respect.
- Worthy of being honored; entitled to honor and respect.
- Adhering to ethical and moral principles.

good	Appropriate to a particular purpose. His marks are just not good enough.
<u>honest</u>	Free of deceit; truthful and sincere. My honest opinion.
honourable	(of the intentions of a man courting a woman) directed towards marriage. <i>The young man s intentions had been</i> honourable .
<u>respectable</u>	(of a person's appearance, clothes, or behaviour) decent or presentable. A respectable botanical text.

<u>fame</u>	The state of being known or talked about by many people, especially on account of notable achievements. The song s success rocketed him to stardom and fame .
<u>famous</u>	Widely known and esteemed. The country is famous for its natural beauty.
glorious	Having or deserving or conferring glory. <i>Our glorious literature.</i>
gratefully	In a thankful manner; with thanks. Your financial support is gratefully acknowledged.
honor	The quality of being honorable and having a good name. <i>Today we honor our soldiers.</i>
honorary	Of a person holding an honorary title or position. An honorary doctorate.
honored	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
known	(of a quantity or variable) having a value that can be stated. <i>The limits of the known world.</i>
laudable	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. App laudable efforts to save the environment.
<u>noble</u>	Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth. A noble gas such as helium or neon.
praise	The expression of respect and gratitude as an act of worship. <i>Give praise to God.</i>
praiseworthy	Worthy of high praise. The government s praiseworthy efforts.
prestigious	Exerting influence by reason of high status or prestige. A prestigious professor at a prestigious university.
<u>reputable</u>	Having a good reputation. A reputable business.



reputation	The general estimation that the public has for a person. <i>His reputation for promiscuity.</i>
repute	The state of being held in high esteem and honor. The waters of the fountain are repute d to have healing properties.
<u>respectable</u>	Large in amount or extent or degree. A respectable sum.
respected	Receiving deferential regard. A respected family.
respectful	Full of or exhibiting respect. A respectful glance.
terrific	Extremely good; excellent. A terrific thunderstorm storm.
trustworthy	Able to be relied on as honest or truthful. <i>Trustworthy public servants.</i>
venerable	Accorded a great deal of respect, especially because of age, wisdom, or character. A venerable statesman.
worthy	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. A fact worthy of attention.
