## Honorable as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Honorable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “honorable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not disposed to cheat or defraud; not deceptive or fraudulent.*
- *Deserving of esteem and respect.*
- *Worthy of being honored; entitled to honor and respect.*
- *Adhering to ethical and moral principles.*



## Synonyms of "Honorable" as an adjective (6 Words)

- estimable** May be computed or estimated.  
*She was shown into that **estimable** woman's presence.*
- ethical** Adhering to ethical and moral principles.  
***Ethical** issues in nursing.*
- good** Appropriate to a particular purpose.  
*His marks are just not **good** enough.*
- honest** Free of deceit; truthful and sincere.  
*My **honest** opinion.*
- honourable** (of the intentions of a man courting a woman) directed towards marriage.  
*The young man's intentions had been **honourable**.*
- respectable** (of a person's appearance, clothes, or behaviour) decent or presentable.  
*A **respectable** botanical text.*



## Usage Examples of "Honorable" as an adjective

- *Led an honorable life.*
- *Honorable service to his country.*
- *An honorable man.*
- *Followed the only honorable course of action.*



## Associations of "Honorable" (30 Words)

- admirable** Inspiring admiration or approval.  
*Trains ran with **admirable** precision.*
- appreciatively** With appreciation; in a grateful manner.  
*He accepted my offer **appreciatively**.*
- award** Give or order the giving of (something) as an official payment, compensation, or prize to (someone).  
*The jury **awarded** a million dollars to the plaintiff.*



<u>compliment</u>	<p>Congratulations or praise expressed to someone.  <i>Prince George expected to be <b>complimented</b> with a seat in the royal coach.</i></p>
creditable	<p>Worthy of often limited commendation.  <i>The student s effort on the essay though not outstanding was <b>creditable</b>.</i></p>
esteem	<p>An attitude of admiration or esteem.  <i>Many of these qualities are <b>esteemed</b> by managers.</i></p>
estimable	<p>Worthy of great respect.  <i><b>Estimable</b> assets.</i></p>
<u>fame</u>	<p>The state of being known or talked about by many people, especially on account of notable achievements.  <i>The song s success rocketed him to stardom and <b>fame</b>.</i></p>
<u>famous</u>	<p>Widely known and esteemed.  <i>The country is <b>famous</b> for its natural beauty.</i></p>
glorious	<p>Having or deserving or conferring glory.  <i>Our <b>glorious</b> literature.</i></p>
gratefully	<p>In a thankful manner; with thanks.  <i>Your financial support is <b>gratefully</b> acknowledged.</i></p>
honor	<p>The quality of being honorable and having a good name.  <i>Today we <b>honor</b> our soldiers.</i></p>
honorary	<p>Of a person holding an honorary title or position.  <i>An <b>honorary</b> doctorate.</i></p>
honored	<p>Having an illustrious reputation; respected.</p>
known	<p>(of a quantity or variable) having a value that can be stated.  <i>The limits of the <b>known</b> world.</i></p>
laudable	<p>(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation.  <i><b>Applaudable</b> efforts to save the environment.</i></p>
<u>noble</u>	<p>Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth.  <i>A <b>noble</b> gas such as helium or neon.</i></p>
praise	<p>The expression of respect and gratitude as an act of worship.  <i>Give <b>praise</b> to God.</i></p>
praiseworthy	<p>Worthy of high praise.  <i>The government s <b>praiseworthy</b> efforts.</i></p>
prestigious	<p>Exerting influence by reason of high status or prestige.  <i>A <b>prestigious</b> professor at a <b>prestigious</b> university.</i></p>
<u>reputable</u>	<p>Having a good reputation.  <i>A <b>reputable</b> business.</i></p>

<b>reputation</b>	The general estimation that the public has for a person. <i>His <b>reputation</b> for promiscuity.</i>
<b>repute</b>	The state of being held in high esteem and honor. <i>The waters of the fountain are <b>reputed</b> to have healing properties.</i>
<u><b>respectable</b></u>	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>A <b>respectable</b> sum.</i>
<u><b>respected</b></u>	Receiving deferential regard. <i>A <b>respected</b> family.</i>
<b>respectful</b>	Full of or exhibiting respect. <i>A <b>respectful</b> glance.</i>
<b>terrific</b>	Extremely good; excellent. <i>A <b>terrific</b> thunderstorm storm.</i>
<u><b>trustworthy</b></u>	Able to be relied on as honest or truthful. <i><b>Trustworthy</b> public servants.</i>
<b>venerable</b>	Accorded a great deal of respect, especially because of age, wisdom, or character. <i>A <b>venerable</b> statesman.</i>
<b>worthy</b>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>A fact <b>worthy</b> of attention.</i>
