Associations of "Hooked" (30 Words)

addicted	Compulsively or physiologically dependent on something habit-forming. Addicted to cocaine.
aquiline	Curved down like an eagle's beak.
<u>askew</u>	Wrong; awry. Rugs lying askew .
asymmetrical	Having parts that fail to correspond to one another in shape, size, or arrangement; lacking symmetry. The church has an asymmetrical plan with an aisle only on one side.
<u>awry</u>	Away from the correct or expected course. Many youthful romances go awry .
<u>bent</u>	A natural talent or inclination. A bent cop.



<u>bow</u>	A decorative ribbon tied in a bow. <i>She bowed before the Queen.</i>
<u>crooked</u>	Having the back and shoulders rounded; not erect. A dress with a crooked hemline.
<u>curve</u>	Form a curl curve or kink. He relies on a couple of curve s and a modest fastball.
distortion	A shape resulting from distortion. <i>Heavy metal guitar players use vacuum tube amplifiers to produce extreme</i> <i>distortion</i> .
ductile	Able to be deformed without losing toughness; pliable, not brittle. Ductile copper.
fish	The flesh of fish as food. Many of the lochs we used to fish are now affected by forestry.
flexibly	In a way that bends easily without breaking. The robot can move flexibly and smoothly over uneven surfaces.
gnarled	Used of old persons or old trees; covered with knobs or knots. <i>Gnarled</i> and knotted hands.
lopsided	With one side lower or smaller than the other. A lopsided grin.
reel	Wind onto or off a reel. The two reel ed out of the bar arm in arm.
refract	Subject to refraction. When refract ing patients an ophthalmologist relies on verbal reports.
refractive	Of or relating to or capable of refraction. The refractive characteristics of the eye.
serpentine	Complex, cunning, or treacherous. For young horses suppleness and control were built with serpentine s.
sinuous	Curved or curving in and out. The sinuous grace of a cat.
turn	Turning or twisting around in place. The chestnut leaves were turn ing.
<u>twist</u>	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>Lets do the twist.</i>
<u>twisted</u>	Forced out of its natural or proper shape; crumpled. Suffering a twisted ankle he was carried from the field.
underhand	Slyly and secretly- John Donne- C.G.Bowers. An underhand stroke.



underhanded	With hand brought forward and up from below shoulder level. <i>Underhanded</i> practices.
warped	Used especially of timbers or boards; bent out of shape usually by moisture. <i>The floors were warped and cracked.</i>
wind	Wind instruments or specifically woodwind instruments forming a band or a section of an orchestra. The river wind s through the hills.
winding	The act of winding or twisting. The winding s of the stream.
wry	Using or expressing dry, especially mocking, humour. A wry neck.
zigzag	In a zigzag course or on a zigzag path. The river zigzag s through the countryside.
