- *Curved down like an eagle's beak.*
- *Addicted to a drug.*
- *Curved like a hook.*

<b>addicted to</b>	Compulsively or physiologically dependent on something habit-forming.
<b>angular</b>	Having angles or an angular shape. <i>Adam s <b>angular</b> black handwriting.</i>
<b>aquiline</b>	(of a person's nose) hooked or curved like an eagle's beak.
<b><a href="#">bent</a></b>	Fixed in your purpose. <i>A <b>bent</b> cop.</i>
<b>bowed</b>	Of a stringed instrument; sounded by stroking with a bow.
<b>curved</b>	Having the form of a curve; bent. <i>His <b>curved</b> lips suggested a smile but his eyes were hard.</i>
<b>dependant</b>	Contingent on something else.
<b>dependent</b>	(of a clause) unable to stand alone syntactically as a complete sentence. <i><b>Dependent</b> on moisture.</i>
<b>dependent on</b>	Contingent on something else.
<b>devoted to</b>	Zealous in devotion or affection.
<b>drug-addicted</b>	Addicted to a drug.
<b>fanatical about</b>	On the move.
<b>hook-shaped</b>	Shaped in the form of a hook.
<b>hooklike</b>	Having or resembling a hook (especially in the ability to grasp and hold). <i><b>Hooklike</b> thorns.</i>
<b>recurved</b>	Bent or curved backwards. <i>Large <b>recurved</b> tusks.</i>
<b>strung-out</b>	Addicted to a drug.
<b>very enthusiastic about</b>	Being the exact same one; not any other.
<b>very keen on</b>	Precisely as stated.



## Usage Examples of "Hooked" as an adjective

- *A girl who got hooked on cocaine.*
- *A hooked gold earring.*
- *Cricket fans are currently hooked on a series of college matches.*



- *A golden eagle with hooked beak.*

- addicted** Compulsively or physiologically dependent on something habit-forming.

- aquiline** Curved down like an eagle's beak.
- askew** Wrong; awry.  
*Rugs lying **askew**.*
- asymmetrical** Having parts that fail to correspond to one another in shape, size, or arrangement; lacking symmetry.  
*The church has an **asymmetrical** plan with an aisle only on one side.*
- awry** Away from the correct or expected course.  
*Many youthful romances go **awry**.*
- bent** A natural talent or inclination.  
*A **bent** cop.*

<b>bow</b>	A decorative ribbon tied in a bow. <i>She <b>bow</b>ed before the Queen.</i>
<b>crooked</b>	Having the back and shoulders rounded; not erect. <i>A dress with a <b>crooked</b> hemline.</i>
<b>curve</b>	Form a curl curve or kink. <i>He relies on a couple of <b>curves</b> and a modest fastball.</i>
<b>distortion</b>	A shape resulting from distortion. <i>Heavy metal guitar players use vacuum tube amplifiers to produce extreme <b>distortion</b>.</i>
<b>ductile</b>	Able to be deformed without losing toughness; pliable, not brittle. <i><b>Ductile</b> copper.</i>
<b>fish</b>	The flesh of fish as food. <i>Many of the lochs we used to <b>fish</b> are now affected by forestry.</i>
<b>flexibly</b>	In a way that bends easily without breaking. <i>The robot can move <b>flexibly</b> and smoothly over uneven surfaces.</i>
<b>gnarled</b>	Used of old persons or old trees; covered with knobs or knots. <i><b>Gnarled</b> and knotted hands.</i>
<b>lopsided</b>	With one side lower or smaller than the other. <i>A <b>lopsided</b> grin.</i>
<b>reel</b>	Wind onto or off a reel. <i>The two <b>reeled</b> out of the bar arm in arm.</i>
<b>refract</b>	Subject to refraction. <i>When <b>refracting</b> patients an ophthalmologist relies on verbal reports.</i>
<b>refractive</b>	Of or relating to or capable of refraction. <i>The <b>refractive</b> characteristics of the eye.</i>
<b>serpentine</b>	Complex, cunning, or treacherous. <i>For young horses suppleness and control were built with <b>serpentine</b>s.</i>
<b>sinuous</b>	Curved or curving in and out. <i>The <b>sinuous</b> grace of a cat.</i>
<b>turn</b>	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>The chestnut leaves were <b>turning</b>.</i>
<b>twist</b>	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>Lets do the <b>twist</b>.</i>
<b>twisted</b>	Forced out of its natural or proper shape; crumpled. <i>Suffering a <b>twisted</b> ankle he was carried from the field.</i>
<b>underhand</b>	Slyly and secretly- John Donne- C.G.Bowers. <i>An <b>underhand</b> stroke.</i>



- underhanded** With hand brought forward and up from below shoulder level.  
***Underhanded** practices.*
- warped** Used especially of timbers or boards; bent out of shape usually by moisture.  
*The floors were **warped** and cracked.*
- wind** Wind instruments or specifically woodwind instruments forming a band or a section of an orchestra.  
*The river **winds** through the hills.*
- winding** The act of winding or twisting.  
*The **windings** of the stream.*
- wry** Using or expressing dry, especially mocking, humour.  
*A **wry** neck.*
- zigzag** In a zigzag course or on a zigzag path.  
*The river **zigzags** through the countryside.*
