- *Curved down like an eagle's beak.*
- *Addicted to a drug.*
- *Curved like a hook.*

addicted to	Compulsively or physiologically dependent on something habit-forming.
angular	Having angles or an angular shape. <i>Adam s angular black handwriting.</i>
aquiline	(of a person's nose) hooked or curved like an eagle's beak.
bent	Fixed in your purpose. <i>A bent cop.</i>
bowed	Of a stringed instrument; sounded by stroking with a bow.
curved	Having the form of a curve; bent. <i>His curved lips suggested a smile but his eyes were hard.</i>
dependant	Contingent on something else.
dependent	(of a clause) unable to stand alone syntactically as a complete sentence. <i>Dependent on moisture.</i>
dependent on	Contingent on something else.
devoted to	Zealous in devotion or affection.
drug-addicted	Addicted to a drug.
fanatical about	On the move.
hook-shaped	Shaped in the form of a hook.
hooklike	Having or resembling a hook (especially in the ability to grasp and hold). <i>Hooklike thorns.</i>
recurved	Bent or curved backwards. <i>Large recurved tusks.</i>
strung-out	Addicted to a drug.
very enthusiastic about	Being the exact same one; not any other.
very keen on	Precisely as stated.



Usage Examples of "Hooked" as an adjective

- *A golden eagle with hooked beak.*

bow	A decorative ribbon tied in a bow. <i>She bowed before the Queen.</i>
crooked	Having the back and shoulders rounded; not erect. <i>A dress with a crooked hemline.</i>
curve	Form a curl curve or kink. <i>He relies on a couple of curves and a modest fastball.</i>
distortion	A shape resulting from distortion. <i>Heavy metal guitar players use vacuum tube amplifiers to produce extreme distortion.</i>
ductile	Able to be deformed without losing toughness; pliable, not brittle. <i>Ductile copper.</i>
fish	The flesh of fish as food. <i>Many of the lochs we used to fish are now affected by forestry.</i>
flexibly	In a way that bends easily without breaking. <i>The robot can move flexibly and smoothly over uneven surfaces.</i>
gnarled	Used of old persons or old trees; covered with knobs or knots. <i>Gnarled and knotted hands.</i>
lopsided	With one side lower or smaller than the other. <i>A lopsided grin.</i>
reel	Wind onto or off a reel. <i>The two reeled out of the bar arm in arm.</i>
refract	Subject to refraction. <i>When refracting patients an ophthalmologist relies on verbal reports.</i>
refractive	Of or relating to or capable of refraction. <i>The refractive characteristics of the eye.</i>
serpentine	Complex, cunning, or treacherous. <i>For young horses suppleness and control were built with serpentines.</i>
sinuous	Curved or curving in and out. <i>The sinuous grace of a cat.</i>
turn	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>The chestnut leaves were turning.</i>
twist	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>Lets do the twist.</i>
twisted	Forced out of its natural or proper shape; crumpled. <i>Suffering a twisted ankle he was carried from the field.</i>
underhand	Slyly and secretly- John Donne- C.G.Bowers. <i>An underhand stroke.</i>

- underhanded** With hand brought forward and up from below shoulder level.
***Underhanded** practices.*
- warped** Used especially of timbers or boards; bent out of shape usually by moisture.
*The floors were **warped** and cracked.*
- wind** Wind instruments or specifically woodwind instruments forming a band or a section of an orchestra.
*The river **winds** through the hills.*
- winding** The act of winding or twisting.
*The **windings** of the stream.*
- wry** Using or expressing dry, especially mocking, humour.
*A **wry** neck.*
- zigzag** In a zigzag course or on a zigzag path.
*The river **zigzags** through the countryside.*
