- *The line at which the sky and Earth appear to meet.*
- *A specific layer or stratum of soil or subsoil in a vertical cross section of land.*
- *A level of an excavated site representing a particular period.*
- *The circular boundary of the part of the earth's surface visible from a particular point, ignoring irregularities and obstructions.*
- *The great circle on the celestial sphere whose plane passes through the sensible horizon and the center of the Earth.*
- *The limit of a person's knowledge, experience, or interest.*
- *A great circle of the celestial sphere, the plane of which passes through the centre of the earth and is parallel to that of the apparent horizon of a place.*
- *A layer of soil or rock, or a set of strata, with particular characteristics.*
- *The line at which the earth's surface and the sky appear to meet.*
- *The range of interest or activity that can be anticipated.*

perspective	An apparent spatial distribution in perceived sound. <i>A trick of perspective.</i>
purview	The range of interest or activity that can be anticipated. <i>Social taboos meant that little information was likely to come within the purview of women generally.</i>
range of experience	A variety of different things or activities.
range of vision	A kitchen appliance used for cooking food.
scope	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>Plato even maintains religion to be the chief aim and scope of human life.</i>
skyline	The line at which the sky and Earth appear to meet. <i>The skyline of the city.</i>
sphere	The apparent surface of the imaginary sphere on which celestial bodies appear to be projected. <i>His social sphere is limited.</i>
view	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>The end of the tunnel came into view.</i>
vista	A mental view of a succession of remembered or anticipated events. <i>Vistas of freedom seemed to open ahead of him.</i>

intercontinental	Relating to or travelling between continents. <i>Intercontinental flights.</i>
<u>length</u>	The length of a swimming pool as a measure of the distance swum. <i>The length of her skirt.</i>
lengthen	Make or become longer. <i>In Spring the days lengthen.</i>
line	A contour or outline considered as a feature of design or composition. <i>A washing line.</i>
<u>long</u>	A long sound such as a long signal in Morse code or a long vowel or syllable. <i>Took a long view of the geopolitical issues.</i>
longitudinal	Of or relating to lines of longitude. <i>Longitudinal positions.</i>

<u>purview</u>	Range of experience or thought. <i>Social taboos meant that little information was likely to come within the purview of women generally.</i>
railway	A network of tracks with the trains, organization, and personnel required for its working. <i>Services were disrupted after an eight year old boy was spotted trespassing on the railway.</i>
route	Send via a specific route. <i>All lines of communication were routed through London.</i>
<u>scope</u>	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>They d scoped out their market.</i>
<u>sea</u>	A roughly definable area of the sea. <i>A ban on dumping radioactive wastes in the sea.</i>
<u>transverse</u>	Situated or extending across something. <i>A transverse beam supports the dashboard.</i>
<u>traverse</u>	An area of land surveyed with a traverse. <i>A probe is traversed along the tunnel.</i>
widen	Extend in scope or range or area. <i>The lane widened out into a small clearing.</i>
