## Hotspot as a Noun

### Definitions of "Hotspot" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “hotspot” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A lively entertainment spot.*
- *A place of political unrest and potential violence.*
- *A public place where a wireless signal is made available so that the internet can be accessed.*
- *A point of relatively intense heat or radiation.*
- *A small area with a relatively high temperature in comparison to its surroundings.*
- *A place of significant activity, danger, or violence.*
- *A popular place of entertainment.*
- *An area on a computer screen which can be clicked to activate a function, especially an image or piece of text acting as a hyperlink.*
- *An area of volcanic activity.*



### Synonyms of "Hotspot" as a noun (5 Words)

**club**

A nightclub playing fashionable dance music.  
*He led a small **club**.*

**flashpoint**

The lowest temperature at which the vapor of a combustible liquid can be ignited in air.  
*The conflict reached a **flashpoint** last year.*

**nightclub**

A spot that is open late at night and that provides entertainment (as singers or dancers) as well as dancing and food and drink.  
*The gossip columnist got his information by visiting **nightclubs** every night.*

**supper club**

A light evening meal; served in early evening if dinner is at midday or served late in the evening at bedtime.

**trouble spot** An effort that is inconvenient.



## Usage Examples of "Hotspot" as a noun

- *Teams will patrol anti-social behaviour hotspots in all parts of the borough.*
- *Treat your clients to a cocktail at one of the following hotspots.*
- *They identified eight pollution hotspots at the mouth of the Thames.*
- *While some were caught in the cross-fire at various political hotspots, most victims were targeted and killed.*
- *Fire engines were required to visit the scene again last night after hotspots appeared to be in danger of re-igniting.*





## Associations of "Hotspot" (30 Words)

<b>basalt</b>	A kind of black stoneware developed by Josiah Wedgwood.
<b>bicker</b>	(of water) flow or fall with a gentle repetitive noise; patter. <i>The restless wheels whose flashing spokes <b>bicker</b> and burn.</i>
<b><u>contention</u></b>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>Freud s <b>contention</b> that all dreams were wish fulfilment.</i>
<b><u>contentious</u></b>	Involving or likely to cause controversy. <i>A style described as abrasive and <b>contentious</b>.</i>
<b>contentiousness</b>	An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious.
<b><u>controversial</u></b>	Giving rise or likely to give rise to controversy or public disagreement. <i>Years of wrangling over a <b>controversial</b> bypass.</i>
<b><u>controversy</u></b>	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>The announcement ended a protracted <b>controversy</b>.</i>

<b><u>debatable</u></b>	Open to argument or debate. <i>It is <b>debatable</b> whether the country is coming out of recession.</i>
<b>debate</b>	A discussion in which reasons are advanced for and against some proposition or proposal. <i>MPs <b>debated</b> the issue in the Commons.</i>
<b><u>disagreement</u></b>	Lack of consensus or approval. <i><b>Disagreement</b> between the results of the two assessments.</i>
<b>discussion</b>	A conversation or debate about a specific topic. <i>The committee acts as a forum for <b>discussion</b>.</i>
<b>disputable</b>	Not established as a fact, and so open to question or debate. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be <b>disputable</b>.</i>
<b>disputation</b>	The formal presentation of a stated proposition and the opposition to it (usually followed by a vote). <i>The founding father of logical <b>disputation</b>.</i>
<b>disputatious</b>	Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>A <b>disputatious</b> lawyer.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	A disagreement or argument about something important. <i>The point has been much <b>disputed</b>.</i>
<b><u>earthquake</u></b>	A great upheaval. <i>A political <b>earthquake</b>.</i>
<b><u>enthuse</u></b>	Express eager enjoyment, interest, or approval regarding something. <i>Public art is a tonic that can <b>enthuse</b> alienated youth.</i>
<b>gainsay</b>	Deny or contradict (a fact or statement). <i>None could <b>gainsay</b> her.</i>
<b>geologic</b>	Of or relating to or based on geology. <i><b>Geologic</b> forces.</i>
<b>hassel</b>	Norwegian chemist noted for his research on organic molecules (1897-1981).
<b>impugn</b>	Attack as false or wrong. <i>The father does not <b>impugn</b> her capacity as a good mother.</i>
<b>interlocutor</b>	A person who takes part in a dialogue or conversation.
<b>polemical</b>	Of or involving dispute or controversy. <i>A <b>polemical</b> essay.</i>
<b><u>quarrel</u></b>	An angry dispute. <i>We have no <b>quarrel</b> with the people of the country only with the dictator.</i>

<b>quarrelsome</b>	Given to quarreling. <i>A moody <b>quarrelsome</b> man.</i>
<u><a href="#">refute</a></u>	Prove (a statement or theory) to be wrong or false; disprove. <i>A spokesman totally <b>refuted</b> the allegation of bias.</i>
<u><a href="#">rivalry</a></u>	Competition for the same objective or for superiority in the same field. <i>There always has been intense <b>rivalry</b> between the clubs.</i>
<b>seismograph</b>	An instrument that measures and records details of earthquakes, such as force and duration.
<b>volcanic</b>	(of a feeling or emotion) bursting out or liable to burst out violently. <i>Types of <b>volcanic</b> activity.</i>
<u><a href="#">wrangle</a></u>	Round up, herd, or take charge of (livestock). <i>The bar keeper threw them out but they continued to <b>wrangle</b> on down the street.</i>
