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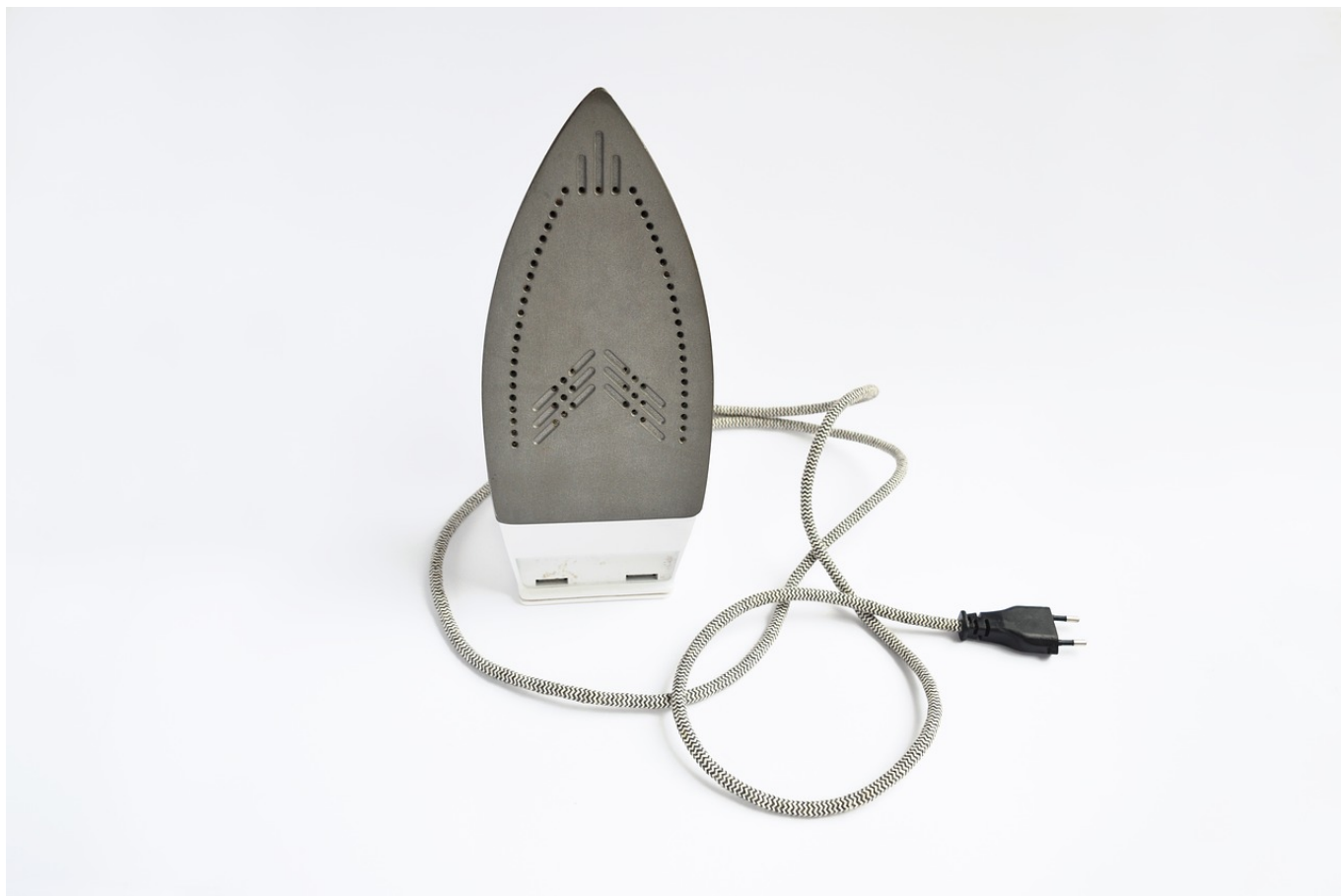
The synonyms of “Housekeeper” are: attendant, retainer

Definitions of "Housekeeper" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “housekeeper” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person employed to manage a household.*
- *A person employed to perform cleaning and other domestic tasks in a hotel or institution.*
- *A servant who is employed to perform domestic task in a household.*



Synonyms of "Housekeeper" as a noun (2 Words)

attendant An event or situation that happens at the same time as or in connection with another.

*A cloakroom **attendant**.*

retainer A thing that holds something in place.
*Faithful family **retainers**.*



Associations of "Housekeeper" (30 Words)

acolyte	A person assisting a priest in a religious service or procession. <i>She runs the department through a small group of acolytes.</i>
allegiant	Steadfast in devotion (especially to your lawful monarch or government). <i>It is impossible to be allegiant to two opposing forces.</i>
babysitting	The work of a baby sitter; caring for children when their parents are not home. <i>I used to do a lot of free babysitting.</i>
butler	English poet (1612-1680).
<u>chore</u>	A specific piece of work required to be done as a duty or for a specific fee. <i>He sees interviews as a chore.</i>
<u>cleaner</u>	A device for cleaning such as a vacuum cleaner. <i>My suit s at the cleaners.</i>

cleaning	The act of making something clean. <i>He gave his shoes a good cleaning.</i>
dutiful	Conscientiously or obediently fulfilling one's duty. <i>A dutiful child.</i>
enslave	Make a slave of; bring into servitude. <i>They were enslaved by their need to take drugs.</i>
epigone	An inferior imitator of some distinguished writer or artist or musician. <i>The humdrum compositions of some of Beethoven's epigones.</i>
errand	The purpose or object of an errand. <i>She asked Tim to run an errand for her.</i>
factotum	An employee who does all kinds of work. <i>He was employed as the general factotum.</i>
<u>flatter</u>	Cause (someone) to feel honoured and pleased. <i>The final scoreline flattered England.</i>
follower	A person who moves or travels behind someone or something. <i>He is a keen follower of football.</i>
footman	A soldier in the infantry.
housekeeping	The regulation of metabolic functions that are common to all cells. <i>Writing barely pays my part of the housekeeping.</i>
<u>janitor</u>	Someone employed to clean and maintain a building.
lackey	A person who is obsequiously willing to obey or serve another person. <i>He denied that he was the lackey of the Chief Secretary to the Treasury.</i>
laundress	A working woman who takes in washing.
<u>loyal</u>	Inspired by love for your country. <i>Loyal service.</i>
<u>maid</u>	An unmarried girl or young woman. <i>Mary eventually managed to find a job as a maid.</i>
<u>minion</u>	A servile or fawning dependant. <i>He gets oppressed minions like me to fob them off.</i>
<u>obedient</u>	Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i>An obedient soldier.</i>
retainer	An appliance for keeping a loose tooth, an orthodontic prosthesis, or orthodontically aligned teeth in place. <i>Faithful family retainers.</i>
<u>secretary</u>	A person who is head of an administrative department of government. <i>She was secretary to David Wilby MP.</i>

servant

A person who performs duties for others, especially a person employed in a house on domestic duties or as a personal attendant.

*The state cannot be a **servant** of the church.*

steward

An attendant on an airplane.

*Security is found in reparticipating in community and **stewarding** nature.*

sycophant

A person who acts obsequiously towards someone important in order to gain advantage.

toady

A pufferfish.

*She imagined him **toadying** to his rich clients.*

wash

An act of washing something or an instance of being washed.

*The plan's impact on jobs would be a **wash** creating as many as it costs.*
