Definitions of "Howl" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "howl" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A loud cry of pain, fear, anger, or amusement.
- A long, doleful cry uttered by an animal such as a dog or wolf.
- A prolonged wailing noise such as that made by a strong wind.
- A long loud emotional utterance.
- A loud sustained noise resembling the cry of a hound.
- The long plaintive cry of a hound or a wolf.
- A wailing noise in a loudspeaker due to feedback.





Synonyms of "Howl" as a noun (21 Words)

<u>bark</u>	A sound resembling a bark typically one made by someone laughing or coughing. A short bark of laughter.
barking	A sailing ship with 3 (or more) masts.
bawl	A loud, unrestrained shout. He addressed every class in a terrifying bawl .
<u>bay</u>	The sound of a hound on the scent. <i>He opened the bomb bay</i> .
baying	A compartment in an aircraft used for some specific purpose.
bellow	United States author (born in Canada) whose novels influenced American literature after World War II (1915-2005. <i>His bellow filled the hallway.</i>
caterwau	A shrill howling or wailing noise. The song ended in a caterwaul of feedback.



cry	A fit of weeping. Peace became the popular cry .
crying	The process of shedding tears (usually accompanied by sobs or other inarticulate sounds. <i>The crying of a child was heard.</i>
howling	A long loud emotional utterance. Their howling had no effect.
<u>roar</u>	A very loud, deep, prolonged sound made by something inanimate. She waited for the lion s roar .
<u>scream</u>	A high-pitched cry made by an animal. Her scream ing attracted the neighbors.
screech	A high-pitched noise resembling a human cry. Mary tried to drown her screech es by shaking her.
<u>shout</u>	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition. Do you want another drink My shout .
shriek	A high-pitched noise resembling a human cry. <i>Shrieks of laughter.</i>
ululation	A long loud emotional utterance.
wail	A prolonged high-pitched sound. <i>Christopher let out a wail</i> .
<u>yell</u>	A loud, sharp cry of pain, surprise, or delight. A yell of pain.
yelp	A short, sharp cry, especially of pain or alarm. She uttered a yelp as she bumped into a table.
yelping	A sharp high-pitched cry (especially by a dog.
yowl	A very loud utterance (like the sound of an animal.

Howl as a Verb

Definitions of "Howl" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "howl" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Make a loud noise, as of wind, water, or vehicles.
- Cry loudly, as of animals.
- Weep and cry out loudly.
- Laugh unrestrainedly and heartily.
- Make a howling sound.
- Emit long loud cries.
- Shout in disapproval in order to prevent a speaker from being heard.





Synonyms of "Howl" as a verb (28 Words)

<u>bark</u>	Make barking sounds. A dog bark ed at her.
bawl	Cry loudly. The manager was bawl ing instructions from the touchline.
<u>bay</u>	Bark with prolonged noises, of dogs.
be creased up	Spend or use time.
be doubled up	Be identical to; be someone or something.
bellow	Shout loudly and without restraint. <i>He bellowed in agony.</i>
caterwaul	Make a shrill howling or wailing noise like that of a cat. The caterwaul ing of a pair of bobcats.
сгу	Bring into a particular state by crying. I can t believe I m cry ing over something so stupid.

laughter	Cause to lose control emotionally.
guffaw	Laugh boisterously. Both men guffaw ed at the remark.
laugh	Produce laughter. We fell about laugh ing.
laugh loudly	Produce laughter.
<u>roar</u>	Laugh unrestrainedly and heartily. A huge fire roar ed in the grate.
roar with laughter	Laugh unrestrainedly and heartily.
<u>scream</u>	Make a loud, high-pitched sound. <i>He never got paid and my information is he s ready to</i> scream .
screech	Make a high pitched screeching noise. The van screech ed round a bend at speed.
<u>shout</u>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. Anyone shooting a hole in one must shout for all players present on the course.
shriek	Be very obvious or strikingly discordant. She was shriek ing abuse at a taxi.
split one's sides	Discontinue an association or relation; go different ways.
ululate	Emit long loud cries. Women were ululating as the body was laid out.
wail	Utter a wail. Wail in self pity.
wrawl	Cry loudly, as of animals.
yammer	Make a loud, repetitive noise. The seismographs were yammer ing for days.
yaup	Emit long loud cries.
yawl	Emit long loud cries.
<u>yell</u>	Utter a sudden loud cry. You don t have to yell I can hear you just fine.
yelp	Utter a yelp. My dog was yelp ing as if hurt.
yowl	Make a loud wailing cry. Out in the street a cat was yowl ing.

- The wind was howling in the trees.
- The wind howled around the house.
- The coyotes were howling in the desert.
- Howl with sorrow.
- A baby started to howl.
- They howled me down and called me a chauvinist.





Associations of "Howl" (30 Words)

bawl	Make a raucous noise. He addressed every class in a terrifying bawl .
bellow	(of a person or animal) emit a deep loud roar, typically in pain or anger. A bellow of rage.
complain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>Let the warbling flute complain.</i>
croon	Say in a soft, low voice. Goodbye you lovely darling she croon ed.
cry	Bring into a particular state by crying. There was a cry of Silence.
gripe	Secure a boat with gripes. I have a gripe about the service here.

Complain about something in a bad-tempered way. I m getting old she grumble d.	
Express or utter with a hiss. The spit and hiss of a cornered cat.	
A type of work song originally sung by black slaves in the US that later contributed to the development of the blues. <i>The audience responded with whoops and hollers.</i>	
Filled with or characterized by howling. The meal was a howling success.	
Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. There were loud protests from the lumber barons.	
An exclamation or shout. An outcry of spontaneous passion.	
A loud outburst of laughter. Swindon roar ed back with two goals.	
Discover (an illicit activity or its perpetrator. Heavy lorries rumble d through the streets.	
Make a high pitched screeching noise. She hit her brother causing him to screech with pain.	
Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. She shout ed for joy.	
Utter a high-pitched piercing sound or words, especially as an expression of terror, pain, or excitement. <i>The audience shrieked with laughter.</i>	
A shrill sound or cry. A concession to their shrill demands.	
Make a snarling noise or move with a snarling noise. Shut your mouth he snarl ed.	
An act or sound of snivelling. He shouldn t snivel about his punishment.	
An act or sound of sobbing. I thought they d killed you he sob bed weakly.	
The noise of squawking. Her plan provoked a loud squawk from her friends.

thunder	Thunder sounds. Briggs thunder ed home a 30 yard free kick.
wail	Utter a wail. <i>Tina ran off wailing.</i>
<u>whimper</u>	A whimpering sound. A child in a bed nearby began to whimper .
whine	A complaining tone of voice. <i>The dog gave a small whine</i> .
whinny	Of a horse make a whinny. The pony whinnied and tossed his head happily.
vell	An organized cheer, especially one used to suppo
