<b>pulsate</b>	Move with or as if with a regular alternating motion. <i>Blood vessels throb and <b>pulsate</b>.</i>
<b><u>pulse</u></b>	Modulate a wave or beam so that it becomes a series of pulses. <i>A knot of muscles at the side of his jaw <b>pulsed</b>.</i>
<b>purr</b>	Indicate pleasure by purring characteristic of cats. <i>A sleek blue BMW <b>purred</b> past him.</i>
<b>reek</b>	Smell badly and offensively. <i>The speeches <b>reeked</b> of anti Semitism.</i>
<b>seethe</b>	Foam as if boiling. <i>The grey ocean <b>seethed</b>.</i>
<b><u>sing</u></b>	Sing in accompaniment to a song or piece of music. <i>The nightingale was <b>singing</b>.</i>
<b>smell</b>	Smell bad. <i>This passage <b>smells</b> of plagiarism.</i>
<b>stink</b>	Be very unpleasant, contemptible, or scandalous. <i>He thinks the values of our society <b>stink</b>.</i>
<b>stink to high heaven</b>	Smell badly and offensively.
<b><u>throb</u></b>	Beat or sound with a strong, regular rhythm; pulsate steadily. <i>The war drums <b>throbbled</b>.</i>
<b>thrum</b>	Make a continuous rhythmic humming sound. <i>Blind men <b>thrum</b> and hum in the soft air.</i>
<b><u>vibrate</u></b>	Feel sudden intense sensation or emotion. <i>The cabin started to <b>vibrate</b>.</i>
<b>whir</b>	(of something rapidly rotating or moving to and fro) make a low, continuous, regular sound. <i>The ceiling fans <b>whirred</b> in the smoky air.</i>

## Associations of "Hum" (30 Words)

<b>alto</b>	A person with an alto voice. <i>Alto</i> clarinet or recorder.
<b><u>anthem</u></b>	A song of praise (to God or to a saint or to a nation). <i>The song became the <b>anthem</b> for hippy activists.</i>
<b>aria</b>	An elaborate song for solo voice.
<b><u>buzz</u></b>	Call with a buzzer. <i>He <b>buzzed</b> the stewardesses every five minutes.</i>
<b>cantata</b>	A medium-length narrative piece of music for voices with instrumental accompaniment, typically with solos, chorus, and orchestra.
<b><u>choir</u></b>	Sing in a choir. <i>His famous Spem in alium for eight five part <b>choirs</b>.</i>
<b>choral</b>	A stately Protestant (especially Lutheran) hymn tune. <i>A <b>choral</b> scholar.</i>

<b>chorus</b>	A section of text spoken by the chorus in drama. <i>The orchestra lacked polish and the <b>chorus</b> were inclined to rush ahead regardless.</i>
<b>concert</b>	Arrange (something) by mutual agreement or coordination. <i>They found direct evidence of <b>concert</b> of action.</i>
<b>contralto</b>	A woman singer having a contralto voice. <i>She sang in a high <b>contralto</b>.</i>
<b>croon</b>	Say in a soft, low voice. <i>The female vocalist <b>crooned</b> smoky blues into the microphone.</i>
<b>descant</b>	Sing in descant. <i>I hear the wood thrush piping one mellow <b>descant</b> more.</i>
<b>ensemble</b>	The coordination between performers executing an ensemble passage. <i>Cherubini's numbers with solos and <b>ensembles</b> intermingled have a freedom and originality.</i>
<b>euphony</b>	The quality of being pleasing to the ear. <i>The poet put <b>euphony</b> before mere factuality.</i>
<b>hymn</b>	Praise by singing a hymn. <i>The joys of domesticity were being <b>hymned</b> in magazines.</i>
<b>lullaby</b>	A quiet song intended to lull a child to sleep. <i>She lullabied us, she fed us.</i>
<b>madrigal</b>	Sing madrigals. <i>The group was <b>madrigaling</b> beautifully.</i>
<b>melody</b>	A sequence of single notes that is musically satisfying; a tune. <i>Her great gift was for <b>melody</b>.</i>
<b>music</b>	The score or scores of a musical composition or compositions. <i>The background <b>music</b> of softly lapping water.</i>
<b>orchestra</b>	The part of a theatre where the orchestra plays typically in front of the stage and on a lower level.
<b>philharmonic</b>	Composing or characteristic of an orchestral group. <i>The most <b>philharmonic</b> ear is at times deeply affected by a simple air.</i>
<b>rehearsal</b>	A practice or trial performance of a play or other work for later public performance. <i>He missed too many <b>rehearsals</b>.</i>
<b>sing</b>	An act or spell of singing. <i>The kettle was <b>singing</b>.</i>

<b>singing</b>	The act of singing vocal music. <i>The cries of laughter from children are a pleasant counterpoint to the <b>singing</b> of blackbirds.</i>
<b>soloist</b>	A musician or singer who performs a solo. <i>He appears as a concerto <b>soloist</b> with all the great British orchestras.</i>
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>The wheels sang their <b>song</b> as the train rocketed ahead.</i>
<b>soprano</b>	A female or boy singer with a soprano voice. <i>A good <b>soprano</b> voice.</i>
<b><u>symphony</u></b>	A long and complex sonata for symphony orchestra. <i>We heard the Vienna <b>symphony</b>.</i>
<b><u>tune</u></b>	Adjust the pitches of (musical instruments). <i>The clarinet was out of <b>tune</b>.</i>
<b><u>whistle</u></b>	The act of signalling e.g. summoning by whistling or blowing a whistle. <i>She <b>whistled</b> for her maid.</i>
