Humiliated as an Adjective

Definitions of "Humiliated" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “humiliated” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Made to feel uncomfortable because of shame or wounded pride.*
- *Subdued or brought low in condition or status.*



Synonyms of "Humiliated" as an adjective (6 Words)

- broken** Out of working order busted is an informal substitute for broken.
*The coke machine is **broken**.*
- crushed** Deformed, pulverized, or forced inwards by compression.
*I was **crushed** was I not good enough.*
- embarrassed** Feeling or caused to feel ill at ease or self-conscious or ashamed.
*He had to sort out the **embarrassed** financial affairs of his brother.*
- humbled** Low or inferior in station or quality.
- low** Very low in volume.
*A **low** cut black dress.*
- mortified** Made to feel uncomfortable because of shame or wounded pride.
*Felt **mortified** by the comparison with her sister.*



Usage Examples of "Humiliated" as an adjective

- *Humiliated that his wife had to go out to work.*



Associations of "Humiliated" (30 Words)

abase	Behave in a way that belittles or degrades (someone). <i>I watched my colleagues abasing themselves before the board of trustees.</i>
<u>belittle</u>	Lessen the authority, dignity, or reputation of. <i>She belittled Amy's riding skills whenever she could.</i>
<u>chagrin</u>	Feel distressed or humiliated. <i>He was chagrined when his friend poured scorn on him.</i>
compromising	Vulnerable to danger especially of discredit or suspicion. <i>She found herself in a compromising situation.</i>
criticism	A serious examination and judgment of something. <i>The senator received severe criticism from his opponent.</i>

debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>War debases people.</i>
decry	Publicly denounce. <i>They decried human rights abuses.</i>
defame	Charge falsely or with malicious intent. <i>The journalists have defamed me.</i>
degradation	A low or downcast state. <i>A trail of human misery and degradation.</i>
degrade	Lower the grade of something; reduce its worth. <i>He was degraded from his high estate.</i>
demean	Do something that is beneath one's dignity. <i>I had demeaned the profession.</i>
demote	Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank. <i>The head of the army was demoted to deputy defence secretary.</i>
denigrate	Criticize unfairly; disparage. <i>Doom and gloom merchants who denigrate their own country.</i>
deprecate	Express strong disapproval of; deplore. <i>Avoid the deprecated blink element that causes text to flash on and off.</i>
deprecatory	Expressing disapproval; disapproving. <i>Deprecatory remarks about the book.</i>
derogate	Detract from. <i>This does not derogate from his duty to act honestly and faithfully.</i>
disappointment	A person or thing that causes disappointment. <i>The job proved a disappointment.</i>
disdain	Look down on with disdain. <i>He disdained to discuss the matter further.</i>
disgrace	Bring shame or dishonor upon. <i>You have disgraced the family name.</i>
disparage	Express a negative opinion of. <i>She disparaged her student s efforts.</i>
disrepute	The state of being held in low esteem. <i>Because of the scandal the school has fallen into disrepute.</i>
downgrade	Reduce to a lower grade, rank, or level of importance. <i>Downgrades by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.</i>
infamy	An evil or wicked act. <i>A day that will live in infamy.</i>

inhuman	Without compunction or human feeling. <i>The inhuman scale of the dinosaurs.</i>
mortify	Hold within limits and control. <i>Mortify the flesh.</i>
opprobrium	A state of extreme dishonor. <i>The opprobrium of being closely associated with gangsters.</i>
permafrost	Ground that is permanently frozen. <i>Hilly terrain underlain by permafrost.</i>
<u>relegate</u>	Refer to another person for decision or judgment. <i>People argue about how to relegate certain mushrooms.</i>
<u>shame</u>	Cause to be ashamed. <i>She shames me with her eighty year old energy.</i>
stultify	Cause to appear foolish. <i>Nobody is legally allowed to stultify himself.</i>
