### **Definitions of "Humiliated" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “humiliated” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Made to feel uncomfortable because of shame or wounded pride.*
- *Subdued or brought low in condition or status.*



## Synonyms of "Humiliated" as an adjective (6 Words)

- broken** Out of working order busted is an informal substitute for broken.  
*The coke machine is **broken**.*
- crushed** Deformed, pulverized, or forced inwards by compression.  
*I was **crushed** was I not good enough.*
- embarrassed** Feeling or caused to feel ill at ease or self-conscious or ashamed.  
*He had to sort out the **embarrassed** financial affairs of his brother.*
- humbled** Low or inferior in station or quality.
- low** Very low in volume.  
*A **low** cut black dress.*
- mortified** Made to feel uncomfortable because of shame or wounded pride.  
*Felt **mortified** by the comparison with her sister.*



## Usage Examples of "Humiliated" as an adjective

- *Humiliated that his wife had to go out to work.*



## Associations of "Humiliated" (30 Words)

<b>abase</b>	Behave in a way that belittles or degrades (someone). <i>I watched my colleagues abasing themselves before the board of trustees.</i>
<b><u>belittle</u></b>	Lessen the authority, dignity, or reputation of. <i>She <b>belittled</b> Amy's riding skills whenever she could.</i>
<b><u>chagrin</u></b>	Feel distressed or humiliated. <i>He was <b>chagrined</b> when his friend poured scorn on him.</i>
<b>compromising</b>	Vulnerable to danger especially of discredit or suspicion. <i>She found herself in a <b>compromising</b> situation.</i>
<b>criticism</b>	A serious examination and judgment of something. <i>The senator received severe <b>criticism</b> from his opponent.</i>

<b>debase</b>	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>War <b>debases</b> people.</i>
<b>decry</b>	Publicly denounce. <i>They <b>decried</b> human rights abuses.</i>
<b>defame</b>	Charge falsely or with malicious intent. <i>The journalists have <b>defamed</b> me.</i>
<b>degradation</b>	A low or downcast state. <i>A trail of human misery and <b>degradation</b>.</i>
<b>degrade</b>	Lower the grade of something; reduce its worth. <i>He was <b>degraded</b> from his high estate.</i>
<b>demean</b>	Do something that is beneath one's dignity. <i>I had <b>demeaned</b> the profession.</i>
<b>demote</b>	Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank. <i>The head of the army was <b>demoted</b> to deputy defence secretary.</i>
<b>denigrate</b>	Criticize unfairly; disparage. <i>Doom and gloom merchants who <b>denigrate</b> their own country.</i>
<b>deprecate</b>	Express strong disapproval of; deplore. <i>Avoid the <b>deprecated</b> blink element that causes text to flash on and off.</i>
<b>deprecatory</b>	Expressing disapproval; disapproving. <i><b>Deprecatory</b> remarks about the book.</i>
<b>derogate</b>	Detract from. <i>This does not <b>derogate</b> from his duty to act honestly and faithfully.</i>
<b>disappointment</b>	A person or thing that causes disappointment. <i>The job proved a <b>disappointment</b>.</i>
<b>disdain</b>	Look down on with disdain. <i>He <b>disdained</b> to discuss the matter further.</i>
<b>disgrace</b>	Bring shame or dishonor upon. <i>You have <b>disgraced</b> the family name.</i>
<b>disparage</b>	Express a negative opinion of. <i>She <b>disparaged</b> her student s efforts.</i>
<b>disrepute</b>	The state of being held in low esteem. <i>Because of the scandal the school has fallen into <b>disrepute</b>.</i>
<b>downgrade</b>	Reduce to a lower grade, rank, or level of importance. <i><b>Downgrades</b> by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.</i>
<b>infamy</b>	An evil or wicked act. <i>A day that will live in <b>infamy</b>.</i>

<b>inhuman</b>	Without compunction or human feeling. <i>The <b>inhuman</b> scale of the dinosaurs.</i>
<b>mortify</b>	Hold within limits and control. <b>Mortify</b> the flesh.
<b>opprobrium</b>	A state of extreme dishonor. <i>The <b>opprobrium</b> of being closely associated with gangsters.</i>
<b>permafrost</b>	Ground that is permanently frozen. <i>Hilly terrain underlain by <b>permafrost</b>.</i>
<a href="#">relegate</a>	Refer to another person for decision or judgment. <i>People argue about how to <b>relegate</b> certain mushrooms.</i>
<a href="#">shame</a>	Cause to be ashamed. <i>She <b>shames</b> me with her eighty year old energy.</i>
<b>stultify</b>	Cause to appear foolish. <i>Nobody is legally allowed to <b>stultify</b> himself.</i>
