

He had to sort out the **embarrassed** financial affairs of his brother.


humbled Low or inferior in station or quality.

Felt **mortified** by the comparison with her sister.






Usage Examples of "Humiliated" as an adjective

**abase** *I watched my colleagues abasing themselves before the board of* 

trustees.

**belittle**Lessen the authority, dignity, or reputation of.

She **belittle**d Amy s riding skills whenever she could.

**chagrin**Feel distressed or humiliated.

He was **chagrin**ed when his friend poured scorn on him.

**compromising** Vulnerable to danger especially of discredit or suspicion.

She found herself in a **compromising** situation.

**criticism** A serious examination and judgment of something.

The senator received severe **criticism** from his opponent.



Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance

debase often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones.

War **debase**s people.

Publicly denounce. decry

They decried human rights abuses.

Charge falsely or with malicious intent. defame

The journalists have **defame**d me.

A low or downcast state. degradation

A trail of human misery and **degradation**.

Lower the grade of something; reduce its worth. degrade

He was **degrade**d from his high estate.

Do something that is beneath one's dignity. demean

I had **demean**ed the profession.

Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank. demote

The head of the army was **demote**d to deputy defence secretary.

Criticize unfairly; disparage. denigrate

Doom and gloom merchants who **denigrate** their own country.

Express strong disapproval of; deplore. deprecate

Avoid the **deprecate**d blink element that causes text to flash on and off.

Expressing disapproval; disapproving. deprecatory

**Deprecatory** remarks about the book.

Detract from. derogate

This does not **derogate** from his duty to act honestly and faithfully.

A person or thing that causes disappointment. disappointment

The job proved a **disappointment**.

Look down on with disdain. disdain

He **disdain**ed to discuss the matter further.

Bring shame or dishonor upon. disgrace

You have **disgrace**d the family name.

Express a negative opinion of. disparage

She **disparage**d her student s efforts.

The state of being held in low esteem. **disrepute** 

Because of the scandal the school has fallen into **disrepute**.

Reduce to a lower grade, rank, or level of importance. downgrade

**Downgrades** by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.

An evil or wicked act.

infamy A day that will live in **infamy**.



inhuman Without compunction or human feeling.

The **inhuman** scale of the dinosaurs.

mortify
Hold within limits and control.

**Mortify** the flesh.

**opprobrium** A state of extreme dishonor.

The **opprobrium** of being closely associated with gangsters.

**permafrost** Ground that is permanently frozen. *Hilly terrain underlain by* **permafrost**.

Refer to another person for decision or judgment.

People argue about how to **relegate** certain mushrooms.

**shame** Cause to be ashamed.

She **shame**s me with her eighty year old energy.

Cause to appear foolish.

stultify

Nobody is legally allowed to stultify himself.
