Synonyms of "Humiliating" as an adjective (3 Words)

Causing someone to lose their dignity and the respect of others. demeaning

The poster was not **demeaning** to women.

Of low birth or station (`base' is archaic in this sense. **humbling** Golf is a **humbling** game.

Causing awareness of your shortcomings. mortifying It was **mortifying** to know he had heard every word.

Associations of "Humiliating" (30 Words)

abject (of something bad) experienced or present to the maximum degree.

The most **abject** slaves joined in the revolt.

ashamed Reluctant to do something through fear of embarrassment or humiliation.

I am not **ashamed** to be seen with them.

awkward Lacking grace or skill in manner or movement or performance.

I felt **awkward** standing in front of the whole class.

belittle Cause to seem less serious; play down.

Don t **belittle** his influence.

compromising Vulnerable to danger especially of discredit or suspicion.

She found herself in a compromising situation.



contemptible Deserving of contempt or scorn.

A display of **contemptible** cowardice.

degrading Causing a loss of self-respect; humiliating.

The vicious and **degrading** cult of violence.

A person or thing that is a source of disgrace.

The ships were a **discredit** to the country.

disgraceful Deserving or bringing disgrace or shame- Rachel Carson.

dishonorBring shame or dishonor upon. **Dishonor** checks and drafts.

dishonorable Deceptive or fraudulent; disposed to cheat or defraud or deceive.

Dishonorable in thought and deed.

One of the top clubs in the country is bringing the game into **disrepute**.

embarrassing Causing to feel shame or chagrin or vexation.

An **embarrassing** muddle.

embarrassment A person or thing causing feelings of embarrassment.

Her extreme views might be an **embarrassment** to the movement.

Remove or dispose of an object or substance by flushing.

The grouse were ${\it flush}{\it ed}$ from the woods.

humiliation Strong feelings of embarrassment.

Prove to be of unsound mind or demonstrate someone's incompetence.
