confused	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. A <b>confused</b> expression crossed her face.
confusing	Bewildering or perplexing. <i>He found being in Egypt very</i> <b>confusing</b> .
crazed	Insane or wildly out of control. A <b>crazed</b> killer.
<u>energetic</u>	Showing or involving great activity or vitality. Moderately <b>energetic</b> exercise.
fast and furious	Indicating a time ahead of or later than the correct time.
fevered	Highly excited. They mopped his <b>fevered</b> brow.
<u>feverish</u>	Marked by intense agitation or emotion. The next couple of weeks were spent in a whirl of <b>feverish</b> activity.



<u>frantic</u>	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i>Frantic</i> with anger and frustration.
fraught	(of a situation or course of action) filled with or likely to result in (something undesirable. Words <b>fraught</b> with meaning.
frenetic	Fast and energetic in a rather wild and uncontrolled way. <i>Frenetic</i> screams followed the accident.
furious	(of the elements) as if showing violent anger. A <b>furious</b> battle.
<u>hectic</u>	Marked by intense agitation or emotion. A <b>hectic</b> business schedule.
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. The job demands <b>intense</b> concentration.
mad	Affected with madness or insanity. A man who had gone <b>mad</b> .
manic	(in psychiatry) relating to or affected by mania. <i>Manic patients.</i>
overactive	More active than normal. The product of an <b>overactive</b> imagination.
tumultuous	Making an uproar or loud, confused noise. A <b>tumultuous</b> crowd.
<u>turbulent</u>	Characterized by conflict, disorder, or confusion; not stable or calm. <i>The turbulent sea.</i>
wild	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. A <b>wild</b> bitterly cold night.



athletic	Relating to or befitting athletics or athletes. <i>Big muscular <b>athletic</b> boys.</i>
behavior	Behavioral attributes the way a person behaves toward other people. The <b>behavior</b> of small particles can be studied in experiments.

demonstrative	A demonstrative determiner or pronoun. An affectionate and <b>demonstrative</b> family.
do	Doctor s degree in osteopathy. <i>He s <b>do</b>ing bistro food.</i>
dynamics	The varying levels of volume of sound in different parts of a musical performance. The <b>dynamics</b> of changing social relations.
effusive	Extravagantly demonstrative. An <b>effusive</b> welcome.
hyperactivity	Constantly active and sometimes disruptive behaviour, occurring primarily in children. <i>Hyperactivity</i> of the thyroid gland.
lively	Elastic; rebounds readily. A <b>lively</b> period in history.
nimble	Moving quickly and lightly. Her mind was so <b>nimble</b> and she was so quick to learn.
nocturnally	At night.
рер	Liveliness and energy. Measures to <b>pep</b> up the economy.
physical	Impelled by physical force especially against resistance. A real cop would get <b>physical</b> .

sporting	Exhibiting or calling for sportsmanship or fair play. <i>Sporting gents and their ladies.</i>
sprightly	Full of spirit and vitality. She was quite <b>sprightly</b> for her age.
<u>vibrant</u>	Quivering; pulsating. His <b>vibrant</b> voice.
<u>vigorous</u>	Characterized by or involving physical strength, effort, or energy. A <b>vigorous</b> hiker.
<u>vivacity</u>	Characterized by high spirits and animation. <i>He was struck by her <b>vivacity</b> humour and charm.</i>
