<b>confused</b>	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>A <b>confused</b> expression crossed her face.</i>
<b>confusing</b>	Bewildering or perplexing. <i>He found being in Egypt very <b>confusing</b>.</i>
<b>crazed</b>	Insane or wildly out of control. <i>A <b>crazed</b> killer.</i>
<b>energetic</b>	Showing or involving great activity or vitality. <i>Moderately <b>energetic</b> exercise.</i>
<b>fast and furious</b>	Indicating a time ahead of or later than the correct time.
<b>fevered</b>	Highly excited. <i>They mopped his <b>fevered</b> brow.</i>
<b>feverish</b>	Marked by intense agitation or emotion. <i>The next couple of weeks were spent in a whirl of <b>feverish</b> activity.</i>

<b>frantic</b>	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i>Frantic with anger and frustration.</i>
<b>fraught</b>	(of a situation or course of action) filled with or likely to result in (something undesirable). <i>Words <b>fraught</b> with meaning.</i>
<b>frenetic</b>	Fast and energetic in a rather wild and uncontrolled way. <i>Frenetic screams followed the accident.</i>
<b>furious</b>	(of the elements) as if showing violent anger. <i>A <b>furious</b> battle.</i>
<b>hectic</b>	Marked by intense agitation or emotion. <i>A <b>hectic</b> business schedule.</i>
<b>intense</b>	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>The job demands <b>intense</b> concentration.</i>
<b>mad</b>	Affected with madness or insanity. <i>A man who had gone <b>mad</b>.</i>
<b>manic</b>	(in psychiatry) relating to or affected by mania. <i><b>Manic</b> patients.</i>
<b>overactive</b>	More active than normal. <i>The product of an <b>overactive</b> imagination.</i>
<b>tumultuous</b>	Making an uproar or loud, confused noise. <i>A <b>tumultuous</b> crowd.</i>
<b>turbulent</b>	Characterized by conflict, disorder, or confusion; not stable or calm. <i>The <b>turbulent</b> sea.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>A <b>wild</b> bitterly cold night.</i>

<b>active</b>	An active form of a verb. <i>He was politically <b>active</b>.</i>
<b>activeness</b>	The state of being active.
<b>activity</b>	A thermodynamic quantity representing the effective concentration of a particular component in a solution or other system equal to its concentration multiplied by an activity coefficient. <i>Volcanic <b>activity</b>.</i>
<b>athletic</b>	Relating to or befitting athletics or athletes. <i>Big muscular <b>athletic</b> boys.</i>
<b>behavior</b>	Behavioral attributes the way a person behaves toward other people. <i>The <b>behavior</b> of small particles can be studied in experiments.</i>

<b>biologic</b>	Relating to biology biological. <i>There is growing interest in the <b>biologic</b> activities of plant extracts in the treatment of disease.</i>
<b>boy</b>	Men who mix socially or who belong to a particular group, team, or profession. <i>A group of six <b>boys</b>.</i>
<b>brisk</b>	Become brisk. <i>She adopted a <b>brisk</b> businesslike tone.</i>
<b>briskly</b>	In an impatient or brusque way. <i>We spent our day swimming in the <b>briskly</b> cold water.</i>
<b>briskness</b>	Liveliness and eagerness.
<b>bustling</b>	(of a place) full of activity. <i>An absurd and <b>bustling</b> busybody.</i>
<b>child</b>	An immature childish person. <i>She writes books for <b>children</b>.</i>
<b>demonstrative</b>	A demonstrative determiner or pronoun. <i>An affectionate and <b>demonstrative</b> family.</i>
<b>do</b>	Doctor's degree in osteopathy. <i>He's <b>doing</b> bistro food.</i>
<b>dynamics</b>	The varying levels of volume of sound in different parts of a musical performance. <i>The <b>dynamics</b> of changing social relations.</i>
<b>effusive</b>	Extravagantly demonstrative. <i>An <b>effusive</b> welcome.</i>
<b>hyperactivity</b>	Constantly active and sometimes disruptive behaviour, occurring primarily in children. <i><b>Hyperactivity</b> of the thyroid gland.</i>
<b>lively</b>	Elastic; rebounds readily. <i>A <b>lively</b> period in history.</i>
<b>nimble</b>	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>Her mind was so <b>nimble</b> and she was so quick to learn.</i>
<b>nocturnally</b>	At night.
<b>pep</b>	Liveliness and energy. <i>Measures to <b>pep</b> up the economy.</i>
<b>physical</b>	Impelled by physical force especially against resistance. <i>A real cop would get <b>physical</b>.</i>

- revitalization** The action of imbuing something with new life and vitality.  
*The city has seen **revitalization** of its economy.*
- sporting** Exhibiting or calling for sportsmanship or fair play.  
***Sporting** gents and their ladies.*
- sprightly** Full of spirit and vitality.  
*She was quite **sprightly** for her age.*
- vibrant** Quivering; pulsating.  
*His **vibrant** voice.*
- vigorous** Characterized by or involving physical strength, effort, or energy.  
*A **vigorous** hiker.*
- vivacity** Characterized by high spirits and animation.  
*He was struck by her **vivacity** humour and charm.*
