Fake designer clothing.

fallacious Intended to deceive.

Fallacious reasoning.

fawning Displaying exaggerated flattery or affection; obsequious.

Fawning interviews with Hollywood celebs.

feigned Simulated or pretended; insincere.

Feigned sympathy.

Excessive and insincere praise, given especially to further one's own

flattery interests.

She allowed no hint of **flattery** to enter her voice.

fraudulent Intended to deceive - S.T.Coleridge.

Fraudulent psychics.

Tastelessly showy.

A **gaudy** costume.

insincere Lacking sincerity.

She flashed him an **insincere** smile.

mendacious

Not telling the truth; lying.

Mendacious propaganda.

mendacity Untruthfulness.

People publicly castigated for past **mendacity**.

meretricious Tastelessly showy.

Meretricious souvenirs for the tourist trade.

obsequious Attempting to win favor from influential people by flattery.

They were served by **obsequious** waiters.

pretentious Intended to attract notice and impress others.

A **pretentious** scholarly edition.

smarmy Unpleasantly and excessively suave or ingratiating in manner or speech.

Smarmy self importance.

specious

Based on pretense; deceptively pleasing.

The music trade gives Golden Oldies a **specious** appearance of novelty.

Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation.

unconscionable Shareholders have had to wait an **unconscionable** time for the facts to

be established.



unfaithful Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor.

An unfaithful reproduction.

unreliable Not able to be relied upon.

In the early 1950s computers were large and expensive and unreliable.

Not true to an obligation or trust.

*untrue*Is *untrue* to his highest opportunity and duty.

untrustworthy

Not worthy of trust or belief.

These **untrustworthy** impressions were instinctive.

venal Capable of being corrupted.

A venal police officer.
