<b><u>hypothecate</u></b>	Pledge without delivery or title of possession. <i>She arranged to <b>hypothecate</b> her half of the equity to pay for the charter.</i>
<b><u>hypothesise</u></b>	To believe especially on uncertain or tentative grounds.
<b><u>moot</u></b>	Think about carefully; weigh. <i>The scheme was first <b>mooted</b> last October.</i>
<b><u>observe</u></b>	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>It s chilly she <b>observed</b>.</i>
<b><u>posit</u></b>	Put in position place. <i>The Professor <b>posits</b> Cohen in his second category of poets.</i>
<b><u>propose</u></b>	Propose or intend. <i>He <b>proposed</b> a new plan for dealing with terrorism.</i>
<b><u>propound</u></b>	Put forward (an idea or theory) for consideration by others. <i>He began to <b>propound</b> the idea of a social monarchy as an alternative to Franco.</i>
<b><u>put forward</u></b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b><u>remark</u></b>	Say something as a comment; mention. <i>The judges <b>remarked</b> on the high standard of the entries.</i>
<b><u>say</u></b>	Assume something in order to work out what its consequences would be; make a hypothesis. <i>Let s <b>say</b> you had a lot of money what would you do.</i>
<b><u>speculate</u></b>	Talk over conjecturally, or review in an idle or casual way and with an element of doubt or without sufficient reason to reach a conclusion. <i>Observers <b>speculated</b> that the authorities wished to improve their image.</i>
<b><u>submit</u></b>	Put before. <i>The United States refused to <b>submit</b> to arbitration.</i>
<b><u>suggest</u></b>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>A simpler explanation <b>suggested</b> itself to me.</i>
<b><u>suppose</u></b>	Expect believe or suppose. <i>The procedure <b>supposes</b> that a will has already been proved.</i>
<b><u>theorise</u></b>	To believe especially on uncertain or tentative grounds.
<b><u>theorize</u></b>	Form or construct theories. <i>Galileo <b>theorized</b> the motion of the stars.</i>

<b>venture</b>	Expose to the risk of loss. <i>She <b>ventured</b> out into the blizzard.</i>
<b>volunteer</b>	Do volunteer work. <i>Her name s Louise Christina <b>volunteered</b>.</i>

<b>assuming</b>	Arrogant or presumptuous. <i>On a subject like this it would be too <b>assuming</b> for me to decide.</i>
<b>assumption</b>	A hypothesis that is taken for granted. <i>He acquired all the company s assets for ten million dollars and the <b>assumption</b> of the company s debts.</i>
<b>conjecture</b>	To believe especially on uncertain or tentative grounds. <i>He dismissed it as mere <b>conjecture</b>.</i>
<b>credence</b>	A kind of sideboard or buffet. <i>He gave <b>credence</b> to the gossip.</i>
<b>expect</b>	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>We <b>expect</b> employers to pay a reasonable salary.</i>
<b>extrapolate</b>	Extend the application of (a method or conclusion) to an unknown situation by assuming that existing trends will continue or similar methods will be applicable. <i>A set of <b>extrapolated</b> values.</i>
<b>generalize</b>	Draw from specific cases for more general cases. <i>This kind of infection <b>generalizes</b> throughout the immune system.</i>
<b>guess</b>	Form a correct conclusion about something by guessing. <i>He <b>guessed</b> the right number of beans in the jar and won the prize.</i>
<b>guesswork</b>	An estimate based on little or no information. <i>Answering this question will involve you in a certain amount of <b>guesswork</b>.</i>

<b>hypothesis</b>	A proposal intended to explain certain facts or observations. <i>A scientific <b>hypothesis</b> that survives experimental testing becomes a scientific theory.</i>
<b>inductive</b>	Of reasoning; proceeding from particular facts to a general conclusion. <i><b>Inductive</b> reactance.</i>
<u><a href="#">infer</a></u>	Draw from specific cases for more general cases. <i>From these facts we can <b>infer</b> that crime has been increasing.</i>
<b>inference</b>	The process of inferring something. <i>Researchers are entrusted with drawing <b>inferences</b> from the data.</i>
<u><a href="#">predicate</a></u>	Logic what is predicated of the subject of a proposition the second term in a proposition is predicated of the first term by means of the copula. <i>Aggression is <b>predicated</b> of those who act aggressively.</i>
<u><a href="#">presume</a></u>	Make unjustified demands; take liberties. <i>Kindly don't <b>presume</b> to issue me orders in my own house.</i>
<b>ratiocinate</b>	Form judgements by a process of logic; reason. <i>A tendency to <b>ratiocinate</b> in isolation.</i>
<b>ratiocination</b>	The proposition arrived at by logical reasoning (such as the proposition that must follow from the major and minor premises of a syllogism.)
