### **Definitions of "Hysteria" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “hysteria” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Neurotic disorder characterized by violent emotional outbreaks and disturbances of sensory and motor functions.*
- *An old-fashioned term for a psychological disorder characterized by conversion of psychological stress into physical symptoms (somatization) or a change in self-awareness (such as a fugue state or selective amnesia).*
- *Excessive or uncontrollable fear.*
- *Exaggerated or uncontrollable emotion or excitement.*
- *State of violent mental agitation.*

<b>allergic</b>	Caused by or relating to an allergy. <i>I m <b>allergic</b> to the hype.</i>
<b>bipolar</b>	Of a person suffering from bipolar disorder. <i>A sharply <b>bipolar</b> division of affluent and underclass.</i>
<b>crazy</b>	Foolish. <i><b>Crazy</b> about cars and racing.</i>
<b>delirium</b>	An acutely disturbed state of mind characterized by restlessness, illusions, and incoherence, occurring in intoxication, fever, and other disorders. <i>Somewhere a patient shouted in <b>delirium</b>.</i>
<b>dementia</b>	A chronic or persistent disorder of the mental processes caused by brain disease or injury and marked by memory disorders, personality changes, and impaired reasoning.
<b>enrage</b>	Make (someone) very angry. <i>The students were <b>enraged</b> at these new rules.</i>
<b>epilepsy</b>	A neurological disorder marked by sudden recurrent episodes of sensory disturbance, loss of consciousness, or convulsions, associated with abnormal electrical activity in the brain.
<b>frantic</b>	Conducted in a hurried, excited, and disorganized way. <i>Something <b>frantic</b> in their gaiety.</i>
<b>frenetic</b>	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i><b>Frenetic</b> screams followed the accident.</i>
<b>frenzy</b>	A state or period of uncontrolled excitement or wild behaviour. <i>Doreen worked herself into a <b>frenzy</b> of rage.</i>
<b>furiously</b>	In a manner marked by extreme or violent energy. <i>I was <b>furiously</b> opposed to the cuts.</i>
<b>fury</b>	A feeling of intense anger. <i>In a <b>fury</b> he lashed the horse on.</i>
<b>hyperactivity</b>	A condition characterized by excessive restlessness and movement. <i><b>Hyperactivity</b> of the thyroid gland.</i>
<b>hypersensitive</b>	Easily hurt, worried, or offended. <i><b>Hypersensitive</b> to pollen.</i>

<b><u>hysterical</u></b>	Characterized by or arising from psychoneurotic hysteria. <i><b>Hysterical</b> laughter.</i>
<b>infuriate</b>	Make (someone) extremely angry and impatient. <i>I was <b>infuriated</b> by your article.</i>
<b><u>insane</u></b>	Shocking; outrageous. <i>She had an <b>insane</b> desire to giggle.</i>
<b>ire</b>	A strong emotion; a feeling that is oriented toward some real or supposed grievance. <i>The plans provoked the <b>ire</b> of conservationists.</i>
<b>livid</b>	(of a light) imparting a deathlike luminosity. <i>Lips <b>livid</b> with the hue of death.</i>
<b>mad</b>	Make someone mad. <i>He felt as if he were going <b>mad</b>.</i>
<b>madden</b>	Cause to go crazy; cause to lose one's mind. <i>His behavior is <b>maddening</b>.</i>
<b>mania</b>	Mental illness marked by periods of great excitement or euphoria, delusions, and overactivity. <i>He had a <b>mania</b> for automobiles.</i>
<b>manic</b>	Frantically busy; hectic. <i>The <b>manic</b> interludes in depression.</i>
<b>migraine</b>	A severe recurring vascular headache; occurs more frequently in women than men. <i>An attack of <b>migraine</b>.</i>
<b><u>paranoia</u></b>	A mental condition characterized by delusions of persecution, unwarranted jealousy, or exaggerated self-importance, typically worked into an organized system. It may be an aspect of chronic personality disorder, of drug abuse, or of a serious condition such as schizophrenia in which the person loses touch with reality. <i>Mild <b>paranoia</b> afflicts all prime ministers.</i>
<b><u>paranoid</u></b>	A person who is paranoid. <i>You think I m <b>paranoid</b> but I tell you there is something going on.</i>
<b>psychosis</b>	A severe mental disorder in which thought and emotions are so impaired that contact is lost with external reality. <i>They were suffering from a <b>psychosis</b>.</i>
<b><u>rabid</u></b>	Of or connected with rabies. <i>The show s small but <b>rabid</b> fan base.</i>

**schizophrenia** Any of several psychotic disorders characterized by distortions of reality and disturbances of thought and language and withdrawal from social contact.  
*Gibraltar s **schizophrenia** continues to be fed by colonial pride.*

**spinster** Someone who spins (who twists fibers into threads).
