## Identifies as a Verb

### Definitions of "Identifies" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “identifies” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Consider to be equal or the same.*
- *Conceive of as united or associated.*
- *Identify as in botany or biology, for example.*
- *Give the name or identifying characteristics of; refer to by name or some other identifying characteristic property.*
- *Recognize as being; establish the identity of someone or something.*
- *Consider (oneself) as similar to somebody else.*





## Synonyms of "Identifies" as a verb (7 Words)

- describe** Give a detailed account in words of.  
*The man was **described** as tall clean shaven and with short dark hair.*
- discover** Discover or determine the existence presence or fact of.  
*Firemen **discovered** a body in the debris.*
- distinguish** Recognize or treat (someone or something) as different.  
*We must **distinguish** between two kinds of holiday.*
- key** Vandalize a car by scratching the sides with a key.  
*Ewing **keyed** a 73 35 advantage on the boards with twenty rebounds.*
- key out** Identify as in botany or biology, for example.
- name** Give a name to.  
***Name** your accomplices.*
- place** Take a place in a competition often followed by an ordinal.  
*The horse Bahuddin was not **placed** at Lingfield.*



## Associations of "Identifies" (30 Words)

- akin** Of similar character.  
*My parents were **akin** probably half cousins.*
- alike** (of two or more people or things) similar to each other.  
*He talked in a friendly manner to staff and patients **alike**.*

<b><u>analogous</u></b>	Similar or equivalent in some respects though otherwise dissimilar. <i>The wings of a bee and those of a hummingbird are <b>analogous</b>.</i>
<b>as</b>	Used to emphasize an amount. <i>Go <b>as fast as</b> you can.</i>
<b>assort</b>	(of genes or characteristics) become distributed among cells or progeny. <i>He would <b>assort</b> it with the fabulous dogs as a monstrous invention.</i>
<b>categorize</b>	Place in a particular class or group. <i>Children learn early on to <b>categorize</b>.</i>
<b><u>classify</u></b>	Assign to a particular class or category. <i>How would you <b>classify</b> these pottery shards are they prehistoric.</i>
<b><u>comparable</u></b>	Able to be compared or worthy of comparison. <i>The situation in Holland is <b>comparable</b> to that in England.</i>
<b>compare</b>	To form the comparative or superlative form on an adjective or adverb. <i>We <b>compared</b> notes after we had both seen the movie.</i>
<b><u>congruent</u></b>	(of figures) identical in form; coinciding exactly when superimposed. <i>Institutional and departmental objectives are very largely <b>congruent</b>.</i>
<b><u>distinguish</u></b>	Mark as different. <i>We <b>distinguish</b> several kinds of maple.</i>
<b><u>ditto</u></b>	The same thing again used in lists and accounts and often indicated by a ditto mark under the word or figure to be repeated. <i>If one folds his arms so does the other if one crosses his legs <b>ditto</b>.</i>
<b>equal</b>	A person who is of equal standing with another in a group. <i>Let s <b>equalize</b> the duties among all employees in this office.</i>
<b><u>equally</u></b>	In addition and having the same importance (used to introduce a further comment). <i>All children should be treated <b>equally</b>.</i>
<b>equivalent</b>	Belonging to the same equivalence class. <i>One unit is <b>equivalent</b> to one glass of wine.</i>
<b>evenhanded</b>	Without partiality. <i><b>Evenhanded</b> justice.</i>
<b><u>homogeneous</u></b>	Containing terms all of the same degree. <i>A close knit <b>homogeneous</b> group.</i>
<b><u>identical</u></b>	(of twins) developed from a single fertilized ovum, and therefore of the same sex and usually very similar in appearance. <i>An <b>identical</b> proposition.</i>

<b>indistinguishable</b>	Not able to be identified as different or distinct. <i>A colorless person quite <b>indistinguishable</b> from the colorless mass of humanity.</i>
<b>isochronous</b>	Equal in duration or interval.
<b>liken</b>	Point out the resemblance of someone or something to. <i>Racism is <b>likened</b> to a contagious disease.</i>
<b>likeness</b>	The fact or quality of being alike; resemblance. <i>The only known <b>likeness</b> of Dorothy as a young woman.</i>
<b>proportionate</b>	Agreeing in amount, magnitude, or degree. <i><b>Proportionate</b> representation of a minority group.</i>
<b>recognized</b>	Generally approved or compelling recognition. <i>His <b>recognized</b> superiority in this kind of work.</i>
<b><u>resemblance</u></b>	The state of resembling or being alike. <i>There was a close <b>resemblance</b> between herself and Anne.</i>
<b>same</b>	Same in identity. <i>His attitude is the <b>same</b> as ever.</i>
<b>separate</b>	A separately printed article that originally appeared in a larger publication. <i>He regards the study of literature as quite <b>separate</b> from life.</i>
<b>similitude</b>	Similarity in appearance or character or nature between persons or things. <i>Conrad uses a range of constructions which express or imply <b>similitude</b>.</i>
<b><u>tantamount</u></b>	Equivalent in seriousness to; virtually the same as. <i>His statement was <b>tantamount</b> to an admission of guilt.</i>
<b><u>twin</u></b>	A twinned crystal. <i>She gave birth to <b>twin</b> boys.</i>
