- *Insanely irresponsible.*

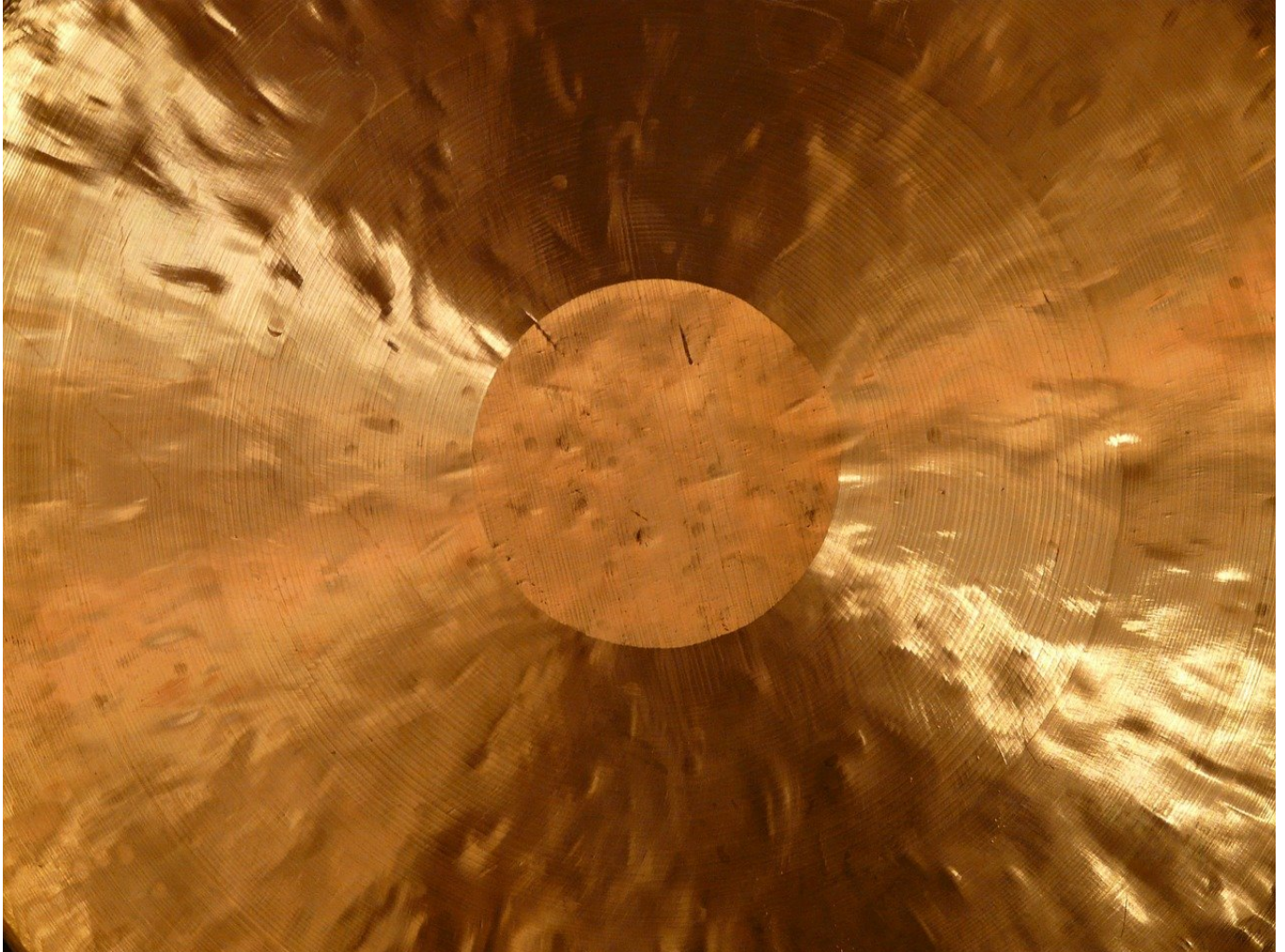


Synonyms of "Idiotic" as an adjective (27 Words)

absurd	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>It may look absurd but having a treadmill desk could improve your attention span.</i>
brainless	Stupid; very foolish. <i>A brainless bimbo.</i>
cockeyed	Incongruous; inviting ridicule. <i>Do you expect us to believe a cockeyed story like that.</i>
crackbrained	Extremely foolish; crazy. <i>A crackbrained idea.</i>
derisory	Ridiculously small or inadequate. <i>His derisory gaze swept over her.</i>
foolish	Devoid of good sense or judgment. <i>He was foolish enough to confide in her.</i>
half-witted	Retarded in intellectual development.

imbecile	Having a mental age of three to seven years. <i>Try not to make imbecile remarks.</i>
imbecilic	Having a mental age of three to seven years.
imprudent	Not prudent or wise. <i>Would be imprudent for a noneconomist to talk about the details of economic policy.</i>
incautious	Lacking in caution. <i>An incautious remark.</i>
indiscreet	Having, showing, or proceeding from too great a readiness to reveal things that should remain private or secret. <i>They have been embarrassed by indiscreet friends.</i>
injudicious	Showing very poor judgement; unwise. <i>The result of an injudicious decision.</i>
irresponsible	(of a person, attitude, or action) not showing a proper sense of responsibility. <i>It would have been irresponsible just to drive on.</i>
laughable	So ludicrous as to be amusing. <i>It would have been laughable if it hadn't hurt so much.</i>
ludicrous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>Ludicrous green hair.</i>
mindless	Not marked by the use of reason. <i>Mindless of the fact she was in her nightie she rushed to the door.</i>
nonsensical	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>He dismissed the claim as nonsensical.</i>
preposterous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>A preposterous suggestion.</i>
ridiculous	Incongruous; inviting ridicule. <i>Her conceited assumption of universal interest in her rather dull children was ridiculous.</i>
silly	Inspiring scornful pity. <i>Silly mid on.</i>
thoughtless	Without consideration of the possible consequences. <i>To think a few minutes of thoughtless pleasure could end in this.</i>
unintelligent	Having or showing a low level of intelligence. <i>A dull job with lazy and unintelligent co workers.</i>
unreasonable	Beyond the limits of acceptability or fairness. <i>An unreasonable request.</i>

- unwise** Showing or resulting from lack of judgment or wisdom.
Unwise policy decisions.
- witless** Foolish; stupid.
I was scared **witless**.

- absurdity** A message whose content is at variance with reason.
*The crowd laughed at the **absurdity** of the clown's behavior.*
- airhead** A bridgehead seized by airborne troops.
*She's a total **airhead**.*
- asinine** Extremely stupid or foolish.
*Lydia ignored his **asinine** remark.*
- benighted** Lacking enlightenment or knowledge or culture.
***Benighted** ages of barbarism and superstition.*
- dolt** A person who is not very bright.
- dullard** A slow or stupid person.
*His **dullard** cousin.*
- dumb** Make dumb or unheard silence.
*She stood **dumb** while he poured out a stream of abuse.*
- fatuity** A ludicrous folly.
- fatuous** Devoid of intelligence.
*A **fatuous** comment.*

folly	A costly ornamental building with no practical purpose, especially a tower or mock-Gothic ruin built in a large garden or park. <i>An act of sheer folly.</i>
fool	Fool or hoax. <i>He fooled nightclub managers into believing he was a successful businessman.</i>
foolery	Silly or foolish behaviour. <i>We endured his foolery all afternoon.</i>
foolish	Having or revealing stupidity. <i>Foolish remarks.</i>
idiot	A person of low intelligence.
ignorance	The lack of knowledge or education. <i>He acted in ignorance of basic procedures.</i>
ignorant	Lacking knowledge or awareness in general; uneducated or unsophisticated. <i>I had to walk out before I got ignorant.</i>
imbecile	Having a mental age of three to seven years. <i>Try not to make imbecile remarks.</i>
inane	Lacking sense or meaning; silly. <i>Don't badger people with inane questions.</i>
indiscreet	Having, showing, or proceeding from too great a readiness to reveal things that should remain private or secret. <i>They have been embarrassed by indiscreet friends.</i>
patsy	A person who is gullible and easy to take advantage of. <i>There is a mischievous sparkle in his eyes that suggests he is no patsy.</i>
ridiculous	Deserving or inviting derision or mockery; absurd. <i>Her conceited assumption of universal interest in her rather dull children was ridiculous.</i>
silly	A foolish person (often used as a form of address). <i>Silly mid on.</i>
stupidity	Behaviour that shows a lack of good sense or judgement. <i>A comedy of infantile stupidity.</i>
sucker	Of a plant produce suckers. <i>The suckers run along each tentacle.</i>
twit	Harass with persistent criticism or carping.
vacuity	Total lack of meaning or ideas. <i>He denounced what he considered the frivolity or vacuity of much contemporary painting.</i>

vacuous Devoid of intelligence.
A *vacuous* mind.
