### **Definitions of "Ignite" as a verb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “ignite” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Start or maintain a fire in.*
- *Start to burn or burst into flames.*
- *Catch fire or cause to catch fire.*
- *Arouse or inflame (an emotion or situation).*
- *Cause to start burning; subject to fire or great heat.*
- *Arouse or excite feelings and passions.*



## Synonyms of "Ignite" as a verb (29 Words)

<b>arouse</b>	Excite or provoke (someone) to anger or strong emotions. <i>Something about the man <b>aroused</b> the guard's suspicions.</i>
<b>be set off</b>	Have an existence, be extant.
<b>burst into flames</b>	Break open or apart suddenly and forcefully.
<b>catch</b>	Succeed in catching or seizing especially after a chase. <i>We have a big barrel to <b>catch</b> the rainwater.</i>
<b>catch fire</b>	Reach in time.
<b>combust</b>	Cause to burn or combust. <i>The professor <b>combusted</b> when the student didn't know the answer to a very elementary question.</i>
<b>conflagrate</b>	Cause to start burning.
<b><u>erupt</u></b>	Erupt or intensify suddenly. <i>Noise <b>erupted</b> from the drawing room.</i>
<b><u>excite</u></b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i><b>Excite</b> the neurons.</i>
<b><u>explode</u></b>	Cause to burst with a violent release of energy. <i>The enemy <b>exploded</b> the bridge.</i>
<b>fire</b>	Set fire to. <i>He <b>fired</b> a shot at the retreating prisoners.</i>
<b>fire up</b>	Start firing a weapon.
<b>foment</b>	Bathe with warm water or medicated lotions. <i>They accused him of <b>fomenting</b> political unrest.</i>
<b><u>heat</u></b>	Provide with heat. <i>The action really begins to <b>heat</b> up.</i>
<b>inflame</b>	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The torches <b>inflame</b> the night to the eastward.</i>
<b><u>instigate</u></b>	Provoke or stir up. <i>They <b>instigated</b> a reign of terror.</i>
<b><u>kindle</u></b>	Arouse or inspire (an emotion or feeling). <i>The dried grass of the prairie <b>kindled</b> spreading the flames for miles.</i>
<b>light</b>	Switch on an electric light. <i>Misfortune <b>lighted</b> upon him.</i>
<b><u>provoke</u></b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>A teacher can <b>provoke</b> you into working harder.</i>
<b>set alight</b>	Bear fruit.

<b>set burning</b>	Disappear beyond the horizon.
<b>set fire to</b>	Locate.
<b>set on fire</b>	Apply or start.
<b>spark</b>	Emit sparks of fire or electricity. <i>The explosion <b>sparked</b> a fire.</i>
<b>stir up</b>	Stir feelings in.
<b>take fire</b>	Develop a habit.
<b>touch off</b>	Color lightly.
<b>trigger</b>	Release or pull the trigger on. <i>Burglars fled empty handed after <b>triggering</b> the alarm.</i>
<b>wake</b>	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>We <b>waked</b> Jim last night.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Ignite" as a verb

- *He lit a cigarette which ignited the petrol fumes.*
- *The words ignited new fury in him.*
- *Marsh gases ignited suddenly.*
- *The ostentatious way of living of the rich ignites the hatred of the poor.*
- *Great heat can ignite almost any dry matter.*
- *Furniture can give off lethal fumes when it ignites.*



## Associations of "Ignite" (30 Words)

- blast**      Make with or as if with an explosion.  
*The striker **blasted** the free kick into the net.*
- blaze**      Indicate by marking trees with blazes.  
*He **blazed** away at the men.*

<b>burn</b>	Burn sear or freeze tissue using a hot iron or electric current or a caustic agent. <i>The diesel engine was converted to <b>burn</b> natural gas.</i>
<b>cinder</b>	A small piece of partly burnt coal or wood that has stopped giving off flames but still has combustible matter in it. <i>A cold hearth full of <b>cinders</b>.</i>
<b>combust</b>	Undergo combustion. <i>We <b>combust</b> coal and other fossil fuels.</i>
<b>combustible</b>	A combustible substance. <i>A volatile and <b>combustible</b> personality.</i>
<b>combustion</b>	A state of violent disturbance and excitement. <i><b>Combustion</b> grew until revolt was unavoidable.</i>
<b>erupt</b>	Erupt or intensify suddenly. <i>The soldiers <b>erupted</b> in fits of laughter.</i>
<b>explosive</b>	Liable to lead to sudden change or violence. <i><b>Explosive</b> violence.</i>
<b>fire</b>	Destroy by fire. <i>The boss <b>fired</b> his secretary today.</i>
<b>firework</b>	A device with an explosive that burns at a low rate and with colored flames; can be used to illuminate areas or send signals etc. <i>They were oohing and aahing as if they were watching the <b>fireworks</b>.</i>
<b>flame</b>	A brilliant orange red colour like that of flames. <i>The person who posted an inflammatory message got <b>flamed</b>.</i>
<b>flammable</b>	Easily ignited. <i>The use of highly <b>flammable</b> materials.</i>
<b>flare</b>	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>She felt a <b>flare</b> of delight.</i>
<b>furor</b>	An interest followed with exaggerated zeal.
<b>incendiary</b>	An incendiary bomb or device. <i>Every bard was regarded as an <b>incendiary</b>.</i>
<b>incinerate</b>	Become reduced to ashes. <i>Waste packaging is to be <b>incinerated</b> rather than buried in landfills.</i>
<b>incinerator</b>	An apparatus for burning waste material, especially industrial waste, at high temperatures until it is reduced to ash.
<b>inflame</b>	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The finger joints were <b>inflamed</b> with rheumatoid arthritis.</i>

<b>kindle</b>	Call forth (emotions, feelings, and responses). <i>The young man <b>kindled</b> at once.</i>
<b>lava</b>	Rock that in its molten form as magma issues from volcanos lava is what magma is called when it reaches the surface. <i>Porphyritic <b>lavas</b>.</i>
<b>pyrotechnic</b>	Of or relating to the craft of making fireworks. <i>His writing contains more <b>pyrotechnic</b> energy more colour and action.</i>
<b>scald</b>	Any of a number of plant diseases which produce an effect similar to that of scalding especially a disease of fruit marked by browning and caused by excessive sunlight bad storage conditions or atmospheric pollution. <i><b>Scald</b> the milk with the citrus zest.</i>
<b>smolder</b>	Have strong suppressed feelings. <i>A <b>smoldering</b> fire.</i>
<b>smoulder</b>	Smoke coming from a smouldering fire. <i>The <b>smoulder</b> suddenly became a blaze.</i>
<b>spark</b>	Emit or produce sparks. <i>The trial <b>sparked</b> a furious row.</i>
<b>tan</b>	Treat skins and hides with tannic acid so as to convert them into leather. <i>She looks tall <b>tan</b> and healthy.</i>
<b>tinder</b>	Dry, flammable material, such as wood or paper, used for lighting a fire. <i>They slashed down the undergrowth for <b>tinder</b>.</i>
<b>torch</b>	Tall stalked very woolly mullein with densely packed yellow flowers ancient Greeks and Romans dipped the stalks in tallow for funeral torches. <i>The shops had been looted and <b>torched</b>.</i>
<b>volcano</b>	A mountain or hill, typically conical, having a crater or vent through which lava, rock fragments, hot vapour, and gas are or have been erupted from the earth's crust. <i>Clare had been building up a silent <b>volcano</b> of resentment.</i>
