## Associations of "Ill at ease" (30 Words)

<b>allay</b>	Satisfy (thirst). <i>Some stale figs partly <b>allayed</b> our hunger.</i>
<b><a href="#">alleviate</a></b>	Make (suffering, deficiency, or a problem) less severe. <i>Measures to <b>alleviate</b> unemployment.</i>
<b><a href="#">appease</a></b>	Pacify or placate (someone) by acceding to their demands. <i>We give to charity because it <b>appeases</b> our guilt.</i>
<b><a href="#">catching</a></b>	The act of detecting something catching sight of something. <i>Chicken pox is <b>catching</b> until scabs form on all the blisters.</i>
<b><a href="#">communicable</a></b>	(of disease) capable of being transmitted by infection. <i><b>Communicable</b> ideas.</i>
<b>conciliate</b>	Make (one thing) compatible with (another). <i>All complaints about charges will be <b>conciliated</b> if possible.</i>
<b>contagious</b>	Easily diffused or spread as from one person to another. <i>It is a relatively new disease and very <b>contagious</b>.</i>
<b>disease</b>	An impairment of health or a condition of abnormal functioning. <i>We are suffering from the British <b>disease</b> of self deprecation.</i>
<b>extenuate</b>	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>His whole frame was <b>extenuated</b> by hunger and fatigue.</i>
<b>flu</b>	Influenza. <i>She was in bed with <b>flu</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">illness</a></b>	Impairment of normal physiological function affecting part or all of an organism. <i>He died after a long <b>illness</b>.</i>
<b>infectious</b>	Caused by infection or capable of causing infection. <i>A loud <b>infectious</b> laugh.</i>
<b>mitigate</b>	Make (something bad) less severe, serious, or painful. <i>Drainage schemes have helped to <b>mitigate</b> this problem.</i>

<b>mitigation</b>	The action of lessening in severity or intensity. <i>The identification and <b>mitigation</b> of pollution.</i>
<b>mollification</b>	A state of being appeased or ameliorated or tempered. <i>His unsuccessful <b>mollification</b> of the mob.</i>
<b>mollify</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>She managed to <b>mollify</b> the angry customer.</i>
<b>pacify</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>The U N troops are working to <b>pacify</b> Bosnia.</i>
<b>palliate</b>	Make (a disease or its symptoms) less severe without removing the cause. <i>There is no way to excuse or <b>palliate</b> his dirty deed.</i>
<b>palliation</b>	Easing the severity of a pain or a disease without removing the cause.
<b>relieve</b>	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>Another signalman <b>relieved</b> him at 5 30.</i>
<b>sars</b>	A respiratory disease of unknown etiology that apparently originated in mainland China in 2003; characterized by fever and coughing or difficulty breathing or hypoxia; can be fatal.
<b>septic</b>	Denoting a drainage system incorporating a septic tank. <i>A <b>septic</b> environment.</i>
<b>sick</b>	People who are sick. <i>She <b>sicked</b> up all over the carpet.</i>
<b>slacken</b>	Reduce or decrease in speed or intensity. <i>Suddenly the line <b>slackens</b> and flutters in the wind.</i>
<b>smallpox</b>	A highly contagious viral disease characterized by fever and weakness and skin eruption with pustules that form scabs that slough off leaving scars.
<b>soothe</b>	Reduce pain or discomfort in (a part of the body). <i>The medicine <b>soothes</b> the pain of the inflammation.</i>
<b>succor</b>	Assistance in time of difficulty.
<b>symptom</b>	Anything that accompanies X and is regarded as an indication of X's existence. <i>Dental problems may be a <b>symptom</b> of other illness.</i>
<b>therapy</b>	(medicine) the act of caring for someone (as by medication or remedial training etc). <i>He is currently in <b>therapy</b>.</i>
<b>transmissible</b>	(of a disease or trait) able to be passed on from one person or organism to another. <i>The virus mutated into a form that was <b>transmissible</b> between humans.</i>
