

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "imagine" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Believe (something unreal or untrue) to exist or be so.
- Form a mental image or concept of.
- Suppose or assume.
- Expect, believe, or suppose.
- Form a mental image of something that is not present or that is not the case.

- After Ned died, everyone imagined that Mabel would move away.
- She imagined him at his desk, his head in his hands.
- I think you're imagining things.

Require as a necessary antecedent or precondition.

presuppose Your argument **presuppose**s that it does not matter who is in power.



scenario A postulated sequence of possible events.

A possible **scenario** is that he was attacked after opening the front door.

Talk over conjecturally, or review in an idle or casual way and with an

speculate element of doubt or without sufficient reason to reach a conclusion.

He didn t look as though he had the money to **speculate** in shares.

Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand.

Suppose We leave this to the police.

Believed or reputed to be the case.

supposedly There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues **supposedly**

because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.

theoretical Concerned with theories rather than their practical applications.

A **theoretical** physicist.

theorize Construct a theory about.

Galileo **theorize**d the motion of the stars.

Thinking about or planning the future with imagination or wisdom.

A **visionary** leader.

visualize View the outline of by means of an X-ray.

With this machine ultrasound can be **visualize**d.
