- *Expect, believe, or suppose.*
- *Form a mental image of something that is not present or that is not the case.*



## Synonyms of "Imagine" as a verb (23 Words)

<a href="#"><u>assume</u></a>	Take to be the case or to be true; accept without verification or proof. <i>The queen <b>assumed</b> the stately robes.</i>
<b>conceive of</b>	Become pregnant; undergo conception.
<b>conceptualize</b>	Form a concept or idea of (something). <i>Sex was <b>conceptualized</b> as an overpowering force in the individual.</i>
<b>conjure up</b>	Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together.
<b>envisage</b>	Contemplate or conceive of as a possibility or a desirable future event. <i>The Rome Treaty <b>envisaged</b> free movement across frontiers.</i>
<a href="#"><u>envision</u></a>	Imagine; conceive of; see in one's mind. <i>She <b>envisioned</b> the admiring glances of guests seeing her home.</i>
<a href="#"><u>expect</u></a>	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>The are <b>expecting</b> another child in January.</i>
<b>form a picture of</b>	Assume a form or shape.
<b>guess</b>	Form a correct conclusion about something by guessing. <i>She s <b>guessed</b> where we re going.</i>
<b>ideate</b>	Form an idea of; imagine or conceive. <i>He is part of a team that <b>ideates</b> branding strategies.</i>
<b>opine</b>	Expect, believe, or suppose. <i>The man is a genius he <b>opined</b>.</i>
<b>picture</b>	Represent in a photograph or picture. <i>She <b>pictured</b> Benjamin waiting.</i>
<a href="#"><u>presume</u></a>	Constitute reasonable evidence for. <i>A restaurant bill <b>presumes</b> the consumption of food.</i>
<b>presuppose</b>	Require as a precondition of possibility or coherence. <i>Your argument <b>presupposes</b> that it does not matter who is in power.</i>
<b>reckon</b>	Consider or regard in a specified way. <i>You have to <b>reckon</b> with our opponents.</i>
<b>see in the mind's eye</b>	Find out, learn, or determine with certainty, usually by making an inquiry or other effort.
<a href="#"><u>suppose</u></a>	Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand. <i>I m <b>supposed</b> to be meeting someone at the airport.</i>



<b>take it</b>	Have with oneself; have on one's person.
<b>take it as given</b>	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes.
<b>take it as read</b>	Make a film or photograph of something.
<b>take it for granted</b>	Travel or go by means of a certain kind of transportation, or a certain route.
<b>think</b>	Expect, believe, or suppose. <i>I can't <b>think</b> what her last name was.</i>
<u><b>visualize</b></u>	Form a mental image of; imagine. <i>Mathematicians often <b>visualize</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Imagine" as a verb

- *I imagine she earned a lot of money with her new novel.*
- *After Ned died, everyone imagined that Mabel would move away.*
- *She imagined him at his desk, his head in his hands.*
- *I think you're imagining things.*

- *I couldn't imagine what she expected to tell them.*



## Associations of "Imagine" (30 Words)

- assumed** Adopted in order to deceive.  
*A man living under an **assumed** name.*
- assuming** Arrogant or presumptuous.  
*On a subject like this it would be too **assuming** for me to decide.*
- assumption** Audacious (even arrogant) behavior that you have no right to.  
*He acquired all the company's assets for ten million dollars and the **assumption** of the company's debts.*
- conceivable** Capable of being imagined or grasped mentally.  
*The body was photographed from every **conceivable** angle.*

<b><u>conjecture</u></b>	A message expressing an opinion based on incomplete evidence. <i>A matter for <b>conjecture</b>.</i>
<b>daydream</b>	Have a daydream indulge in a fantasy. <i>Stop <b>daydreaming</b> and pay attention.</i>
<b>envisage</b>	Form a mental image of something that is not present or that is not the case. <i>The Rome Treaty <b>envisaged</b> free movement across frontiers.</i>
<b><u>envision</u></b>	Imagine; conceive of; see in one's mind. <i>I cannot <b>envision</b> him as President.</i>
<b>fancied</b>	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A <b>fancied</b> wrong.</i>
<b><u>fantasy</u></b>	A fanciful mental image, typically one on which a person often dwells and which reflects their conscious or unconscious wishes. <i>A schoolgirl <b>fantasy</b>.</i>
<b><u>fictitious</u></b>	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A <b>fictitious</b> address.</i>
<b>guess</b>	An estimate or conclusion formed by guessing. <i>We can only <b>guess</b> at Alan's motives.</i>
<b>hypothesis</b>	A proposal intended to explain certain facts or observations. <i>The <b>hypothesis</b> that every event has a cause.</i>
<b><u>hypothesize</u></b>	Put (something) forward as a hypothesis. <i>He <b>hypothesized</b> that the black market would naturally die out.</i>
<b>hypothetical</b>	A hypothetical proposition or statement. <i>Consider the following just as a <b>hypothetical</b>.</i>
<b>ideational</b>	Relating to the formation of ideas or concepts. <i>Policy has been shaped by both material and <b>ideational</b> factors.</i>
<b>illusory</b>	Based on illusion; not real. <i>She knew the safety of her room was <b>illusory</b>.</i>
<b>improbably</b>	In an unexpected or unlikely manner. <i>Monasteries perch <b>improbably</b> on crags and cliff tops.</i>
<b><u>maybe</u></b>	Perhaps; possibly. <i><b>Maybe</b> I won't go back.</i>
<b><u>presumably</u></b>	By reasonable assumption. <i>It was not yet ten o'clock so <b>presumably</b> the boys were still at the pub.</i>
<b><u>presume</u></b>	Take to be the case or to be true; accept without verification or proof. <i>The argument <b>presumes</b> that only one person can do the work.</i>
<b>presuppose</b>	Require as a necessary antecedent or precondition. <i>Your argument <b>presupposes</b> that it does not matter who is in power.</i>

<b>scenario</b>	A postulated sequence of possible events. <i>A possible <b>scenario</b> is that he was attacked after opening the front door.</i>
<u><b>speculate</b></u>	Talk over conjecturally, or review in an idle or casual way and with an element of doubt or without sufficient reason to reach a conclusion. <i>He didn't look as though he had the money to <b>speculate</b> in shares.</i>
<u><b>suppose</b></u>	Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand. <i><b>Suppose</b> we leave this to the police.</i>
<u><b>supposedly</b></u>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues <b>supposedly</b> because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
<u><b>theoretical</b></u>	Concerned with theories rather than their practical applications. <i>A <b>theoretical</b> physicist.</i>
<u><b>theorize</b></u>	Construct a theory about. <i>Galileo <b>theorized</b> the motion of the stars.</i>
<u><b>visionary</b></u>	Thinking about or planning the future with imagination or wisdom. <i>A <b>visionary</b> leader.</i>
<u><b>visualize</b></u>	View the outline of by means of an X-ray. <i>With this machine ultrasound can be <b>visualized</b>.</i>
