- *Believe (something unreal or untrue) to exist or be so.*
- *Form a mental image or concept of.*
- *Suppose or assume.*
- *Expect, believe, or suppose.*
- *Form a mental image of something that is not present or that is not the case.*



Synonyms of "Imagine" as a verb (23 Words)

assume	Take to be the case or to be true; accept without verification or proof. <i>The queen assumed the stately robes.</i>
conceive of	Become pregnant; undergo conception.
conceptualize	Form a concept or idea of (something). <i>Sex was conceptualized as an overpowering force in the individual.</i>
conjure up	Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together.
envisage	Contemplate or conceive of as a possibility or a desirable future event. <i>The Rome Treaty envisaged free movement across frontiers.</i>
envision	Imagine; conceive of; see in one's mind. <i>She envisioned the admiring glances of guests seeing her home.</i>
expect	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>The are expecting another child in January.</i>
form a picture of	Assume a form or shape.
guess	Form a correct conclusion about something by guessing. <i>She s guessed where we re going.</i>
ideate	Form an idea of; imagine or conceive. <i>He is part of a team that ideates branding strategies.</i>
opine	Expect, believe, or suppose. <i>The man is a genius he opined.</i>
picture	Represent in a photograph or picture. <i>She pictured Benjamin waiting.</i>
presume	Constitute reasonable evidence for. <i>A restaurant bill presumes the consumption of food.</i>
presuppose	Require as a precondition of possibility or coherence. <i>Your argument presupposes that it does not matter who is in power.</i>
reckon	Consider or regard in a specified way. <i>You have to reckon with our opponents.</i>
see in the mind's eye	Find out, learn, or determine with certainty, usually by making an inquiry or other effort.
suppose	Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand. <i>I m supposed to be meeting someone at the airport.</i>

take it	Have with oneself; have on one's person.
take it as given	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes.
take it as read	Make a film or photograph of something.
take it for granted	Travel or go by means of a certain kind of transportation, or a certain route.
think	Expect, believe, or suppose. <i>I can't think what her last name was.</i>
visualize	Form a mental image of; imagine. <i>Mathematicians often visualize.</i>



Usage Examples of "Imagine" as a verb

- *I imagine she earned a lot of money with her new novel.*
- *After Ned died, everyone imagined that Mabel would move away.*
- *She imagined him at his desk, his head in his hands.*
- *I think you're imagining things.*

- *I couldn't imagine what she expected to tell them.*



Associations of "Imagine" (30 Words)

- assumed** Adopted in order to deceive.
*A man living under an **assumed** name.*
- assuming** Arrogant or presumptuous.
*On a subject like this it would be too **assuming** for me to decide.*
- assumption** Audacious (even arrogant) behavior that you have no right to.
*He acquired all the company's assets for ten million dollars and the **assumption** of the company's debts.*
- conceivable** Capable of being imagined or grasped mentally.
*The body was photographed from every **conceivable** angle.*

<u>conjecture</u>	A message expressing an opinion based on incomplete evidence. <i>A matter for conjecture.</i>
daydream	Have a daydream indulge in a fantasy. <i>Stop daydreaming and pay attention.</i>
envisage	Form a mental image of something that is not present or that is not the case. <i>The Rome Treaty envisaged free movement across frontiers.</i>
<u>envision</u>	Imagine; conceive of; see in one's mind. <i>I cannot envision him as President.</i>
fancied	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A fancied wrong.</i>
<u>fantasy</u>	A fanciful mental image, typically one on which a person often dwells and which reflects their conscious or unconscious wishes. <i>A schoolgirl fantasy.</i>
<u>fictitious</u>	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A fictitious address.</i>
guess	An estimate or conclusion formed by guessing. <i>We can only guess at Alan's motives.</i>
hypothesis	A proposal intended to explain certain facts or observations. <i>The hypothesis that every event has a cause.</i>
<u>hypothesize</u>	Put (something) forward as a hypothesis. <i>He hypothesized that the black market would naturally die out.</i>
hypothetical	A hypothetical proposition or statement. <i>Consider the following just as a hypothetical.</i>
ideational	Relating to the formation of ideas or concepts. <i>Policy has been shaped by both material and ideational factors.</i>
illusory	Based on illusion; not real. <i>She knew the safety of her room was illusory.</i>
improbably	In an unexpected or unlikely manner. <i>Monasteries perch improbably on crags and cliff tops.</i>
<u>maybe</u>	Perhaps; possibly. <i>Maybe I won't go back.</i>
<u>presumably</u>	By reasonable assumption. <i>It was not yet ten o'clock so presumably the boys were still at the pub.</i>
<u>presume</u>	Take to be the case or to be true; accept without verification or proof. <i>The argument presumes that only one person can do the work.</i>
presuppose	Require as a necessary antecedent or precondition. <i>Your argument presupposes that it does not matter who is in power.</i>

scenario	A postulated sequence of possible events. <i>A possible scenario is that he was attacked after opening the front door.</i>
<u>speculate</u>	Talk over conjecturally, or review in an idle or casual way and with an element of doubt or without sufficient reason to reach a conclusion. <i>He didn't look as though he had the money to speculate in shares.</i>
<u>suppose</u>	Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand. Suppose we leave this to the police.
<u>supposedly</u>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues supposedly because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
<u>theoretical</u>	Concerned with theories rather than their practical applications. <i>A theoretical physicist.</i>
<u>theorize</u>	Construct a theory about. <i>Galileo theorized the motion of the stars.</i>
<u>visionary</u>	Thinking about or planning the future with imagination or wisdom. <i>A visionary leader.</i>
<u>visualize</u>	View the outline of by means of an X-ray. <i>With this machine ultrasound can be visualized.</i>
