- *Free from flaws or mistakes; perfect.*
- *Without fault or error.*

<b>unblemished</b>	Free from physical or moral spots or stains. <i>An <b>unblemished</b> professional record.</i>
<b>undefiled</b>	(of language) not having its purity or excellence debased. <i>Learn to speak pure English <b>undefiled</b>.</i>
<b>unsoiled</b>	Without soil or spot or stain. <i>She looked fresh and her uniform was <b>unsoiled</b>.</i>
<b>unstained</b>	Free from blemishes. <i>An apron keeps his clothing <b>unstained</b>.</i>
<b>unsullied</b>	Not spoiled or made impure. <i>An <b>unsullied</b> reputation.</i>
<b>untarnished</b>	Not spoiled or damaged. <i>An <b>untarnished</b> reputation.</i>

<b>perfection</b>	The state of being without a flaw or defect. <i>Among the key tasks was the <b>perfection</b> of new mechanisms of economic management.</i>
<b>pristine</b>	In its original condition; unspoiled. <i>A <b>pristine</b> white shirt.</i>
<b>pure</b>	Of color being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i><b>Pure</b> science.</i>
<b>sinless</b>	Free from sin. <i>The <b>sinless</b> life of Christ.</i>
<b>spotless</b>	Absolutely clean or pure; immaculate. <i><b>Spotless</b> behaviour is seemingly the norm in his organization.</i>
<b>unadulterated</b>	Not mixed with impurities. <i>The <b>unadulterated</b> truth.</i>
<b>unaffected</b>	Free of artificiality; sincere and genuine. <i>Fibers remained apparently <b>unaffected</b> by the treatment.</i>
<b>unalloyed</b>	(of metal) not alloyed; pure. <i><b>Unalloyed</b> copper.</i>

<b>unblemished</b>	Not damaged or marked in any way. <i>Her body was perfectly formed and <b>unblemished</b>.</i>
<b>uncontaminated</b>	Free from admixture with noxious elements; clean. <i><b>Uncontaminated</b> air and food.</i>
<b>unmixed</b>	Not constituting a compound. <i>Bold <b>unmixed</b> colours.</i>
<b>unpainted</b>	Not having makeup on. <i>An <b>unpainted</b> house.</i>
<b>unpolluted</b>	Free from admixture with noxious elements; clean. <i>Her mind remains <b>unpolluted</b> by the filth they teach her.</i>
<b>unspotted</b>	Without soil or spot or stain. <i>The network of avian enthusiasts ensures that no rarity goes <b>unspotted</b>.</i>
<b>unstained</b>	Not stained. <i>An apron keeps his clothing <b>unstained</b>.</i>
<b>unsullied</b>	Free from blemishes. <i>The <b>unsullied</b> snow of mountains.</i>
<b><u>untainted</u></b>	Free from blemishes. <i>The island remains virtually <b>untainted</b> by commercialism.</i>
<b><u>virtuous</u></b>	Having or showing high moral standards. <i>She considered herself very <b>virtuous</b> because she neither drank nor smoked.</i>
