- *Completely neat and clean.*
- *Perfectly clean, neat, or tidy.*
- *Free from stain or blemish.*
- *Uniformly coloured without spots or other marks.*
- *Free from flaws or mistakes; perfect.*
- *Without fault or error.*

spotless	Without faults or moral blemishes; pure. <i>Spotless behaviour is seemingly the norm in his organization.</i>
stainless	(of a person or their reputation) free from wrongdoing or disgrace. <i>Stainless surfaces can never mellow with use.</i>
unblemished	Free from physical or moral spots or stains. <i>An unblemished professional record.</i>
undefiled	(of language) not having its purity or excellence debased. <i>Learn to speak pure English undefiled.</i>
unsoiled	Without soil or spot or stain. <i>She looked fresh and her uniform was unsoiled.</i>
unstained	Free from blemishes. <i>An apron keeps his clothing unstained.</i>
unsullied	Not spoiled or made impure. <i>An unsullied reputation.</i>
untarnished	Not spoiled or damaged. <i>An untarnished reputation.</i>

pristine	In its original condition; unspoilt. <i>A pristine white shirt.</i>
pure	Of color being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i>Pure science.</i>
sinless	Free from sin. <i>The sinless life of Christ.</i>
spotless	Absolutely clean or pure; immaculate. <i>Spotless behaviour is seemingly the norm in his organization.</i>
unadulterated	Not mixed with impurities. <i>The unadulterated truth.</i>
unaffected	Free of artificiality; sincere and genuine. <i>Fibers remained apparently unaffected by the treatment.</i>
unalloyed	(of metal) not alloyed; pure. <i>Unalloyed copper.</i>

unblemished	Not damaged or marked in any way. <i>Her body was perfectly formed and unblemished.</i>
uncontaminated	Free from admixture with noxious elements; clean. <i>Uncontaminated air and food.</i>
unmixed	Not constituting a compound. <i>Bold unmixed colours.</i>
unpainted	Not having makeup on. <i>An unpainted house.</i>
unpolluted	Free from admixture with noxious elements; clean. <i>Her mind remains unpolluted by the filth they teach her.</i>
unspotted	Without soil or spot or stain. <i>The network of avian enthusiasts ensures that no rarity goes unspotted.</i>
unstained	Not stained. <i>An apron keeps his clothing unstained.</i>
unsullied	Free from blemishes. <i>The unsullied snow of mountains.</i>
<u>untainted</u>	Free from blemishes. <i>The island remains virtually untainted by commercialism.</i>
<u>virtuous</u>	Having or showing high moral standards. <i>She considered herself very virtuous because she neither drank nor smoked.</i>
