- *Not pertinent to the matter under consideration.*
- *Unimportant under the circumstances; irrelevant.*
- *Without material form or substance.*
- *(often followed by `to') lacking importance; not mattering one way or the other.*
- *Lacking importance; not mattering one way or the other.*
- *Of no importance or relevance especially to a law case.*
- *Spiritual, rather than physical.*

<u>inconsequential</u>	Not following logically as a consequence. <i>His work seems trivial and inconsequential.</i>
incorporeal	Not composed of matter; having no material existence. <i>A supreme but incorporeal being called God.</i>
indifferent	Characterized by a lack of partiality. <i>He gave an indifferent shrug.</i>
<u>insignificant</u>	Signifying nothing. <i>Insignificant sounds.</i>
insubstantial	Lacking material form or substance; unreal. <i>Insubstantial evidence.</i>
<u>intangible</u>	(of an asset or benefit) not constituting or represented by a physical object and of a value not precisely measurable. <i>The moonlight made things seem intangible.</i>
<u>irrelevant</u>	Having no bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i>An irrelevant comment.</i>

nonmaterial	Not consisting of matter.
not germane	Relevant and appropriate.
not material	Derived from or composed of matter.
not pertinent	Being of striking appropriateness and pertinence.
of little account	Lowercase.
of no matter	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
of no moment	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
orthogonal	Having a set of mutually perpendicular axes; meeting at right angles. <i>Wind and sea may displace the ship's center of gravity along three orthogonal axes.</i>
unembodied	(of an idea, quality, or feeling) not having a tangible or visible form. <i>Claims to knowledge of an unembodied consciousness.</i>
unimportant	Devoid of importance, meaning, or force. <i>The question seems unimportant.</i>
unsubstantial	Having little or no solidity, reality, or factual basis. <i>A pretty if unsubstantial cubist composition.</i>
