- *The quickness of action or occurrence.*
- *Immediate intuitive awareness.*
- *Lack of an intervening or mediating agency.*

<b>briskness</b>	Liveliness and eagerness.
<b>celerity</b>	Swiftness of movement.
<b><u>dispatch</u></b>	The property of being prompt and efficient. <i>The executioner s merciful <b>dispatch</b> of his victims.</i>
<b><u>expedition</u></b>	The people involved in an expedition. <i>An <b>expedition</b> to the jungles of the Orinoco.</i>
<b>expeditiousness</b>	The property of being prompt and efficient.
<b>fastness</b>	A strongly fortified defensive structure. <i>A remote Himalayan mountain <b>fastness</b>.</i>
<b>immediateness</b>	Lack of an intervening or mediating agency.
<b>instancy</b>	The quickness of action or occurrence. <i>The <b>instancy</b> of modern communication.</i>
<b>instantaneousness</b>	The quickness of action or occurrence.
<b>promptness</b>	The quality or habit of adhering to an appointed time.
<b><u>quickness</u></b>	Intelligence as revealed by an ability to give correct responses without delay. <i>His <b>quickness</b> of temper involved him in many controversies.</i>
<b>rapidity</b>	The quality of moving or reacting with great speed. <i>The fish sank into the sand with such <b>rapidity</b> that it must be seen to be believed.</i>
<b>sharpness</b>	A strong odor or taste property. <i>The <b>sharpness</b> of her loss.</i>
<b>speediness</b>	A rate that is rapid.
<b>swiftness</b>	The quality of moving at high speed. <i>Kay had the upper hand with her agility and <b>swiftness</b>.</i>
<b>velocity</b>	The rate at which money changes hands within an economy. <i>The tank shot backwards at an incredible <b>velocity</b>.</i>

<u>compose</u>	Phrase (a letter or piece of writing) with great care and thought. <i>Beethoven <b>composed</b> nine symphonies.</i>
<b>contiguous</b>	Very close or connected in space or time. <i>Utah and the <b>contiguous</b> state of Idaho.</i>
<u>degraded</u>	Lowered in value. <i>Deplorably dissipated and <b>degraded</b>.</i>
<u>exigent</u>	Demanding attention. <i>Became more <b>exigent</b> over his pronunciation.</i>
<b>extemporaneous</b>	Spoken or done without preparation. <i>An <b>extemporaneous</b> piano recital.</i>
<b>extempore</b>	Spoken or done without preparation. <i>An <b>extempore</b> skit.</i>
<b>extemporize</b>	Compose or perform something such as music or a speech without preparation; improvise. <i>He <b>extemporized</b> at the piano.</i>
<b>extravagant</b>	Resulting from or showing a lack of restraint in spending money or resources. <i><b>Extravagant</b> praise.</i>
<b>immediately</b>	In direct or very close relation. <i>She was sitting <b>immediately</b> behind me.</i>
<b>imminent</b>	About to happen. <i>They were in <b>imminent</b> danger of being swept away.</i>
<u>impending</u>	Close in time; about to occur. <i>The author had returned to his country ahead of the <b>impending</b> war.</i>
<u>impromptu</u>	A short musical passage that seems to have been made spontaneously without advance preparation. <i>An <b>impromptu</b> speech.</i>
<b>improvident</b>	Not given careful consideration. <i><b>Improvident</b> and undisciplined behaviour.</i>
<u>improvise</u>	Perform without preparation. <i>After the hurricane destroyed our house we had to <b>improvise</b> for weeks.</i>
<b>improvised</b>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>We slept on <b>improvised</b> beds.</i>
<u>instant</u>	Instant coffee. <i>An <b>instant</b> need.</i>

<b>instantaneous</b>	Occurring with no delay. <i>Modern methods of <b>instantaneous</b> communication.</i>
<b><u>instantly</u></b>	At once; immediately. <i>She fell asleep almost <b>instantly</b>.</i>
<b>myopic</b>	Lacking foresight or intellectual insight. <b>Myopic</b> thinking.
<b>now</b>	(in a narrative or account of past events) at the time spoken of or referred to. <i>What do you want <b>now</b>.</i>
<b>offhand</b>	In a casually inconsiderate manner. <i>Couldn't give the figures <b>offhand</b>.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a society of priests without vows, especially the Oratory of St Philip Neri founded in 1564. <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>
<b>pressing</b>	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>Too <b>pressing</b> to permit of longer delay.</i>
<b>prodigal</b>	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. <b>Prodigal</b> in their expenditures.
<b>prompt</b>	The time limit for the payment of an account stated on a prompt note. <i>The train is <b>prompt</b>.</i>
<b><u>promptly</u></b>	At exactly a specified time; punctually. <i>I won my appeal but instead of reinstating me they <b>promptly</b> sacked me again.</i>
<b>spontaneously</b>	In a spontaneous manner. <i>Mutations can occur <b>spontaneously</b>.</i>
<b><u>swift</u></b>	Swiftly. <i>The <b>swiftest</b> horse in his stable.</i>
<b><u>swiftly</u></b>	In a swift manner. <i>She got up and walked <b>swiftly</b> to the door.</i>
<b>urgent</b>	Of an action or event done or arranged in response to an urgent situation. <i>Bridges in <b>urgent</b> need of repair.</i>
