- *Baptism by immersing a person bodily (but not necessarily completely) in water.*

- *A form of baptism in which part or all of a person's body is submerged.*
- *Deep mental involvement in something.*
- *Sinking until covered completely with water.*
- *The action of immersing someone or something in a liquid.*

concentration	Strengthening the concentration as of a solute in a mixture by removing diluting material. <i>The gas can collect in dangerous concentrations.</i>
dousing	The act of wetting something by submerging it.

<u>involvement</u>	A usually secretive or illicit sexual relationship. <i>He escaped involvement in the accident.</i>
monopolization	Domination (of a market or commodity) to the exclusion of others.
naming	The verbal act of naming. <i>The part he failed was the naming of state capitals.</i>
<u>occupation</u>	Any activity that occupies a person's attention. <i>He missed the bell in his occupation with the computer game.</i>
<u>plunge</u>	An act of jumping or diving into water. <i>The central bank declared a 76 plunge in its profits.</i>
<u>preoccupation</u>	A subject or matter that engrosses someone. <i>Their main preoccupation was how to feed their families.</i>
raptness	A state of elated bliss.
sprinkling	The act of sprinkling or splashing water. <i>A sprinkling of grey at his temples.</i>
submergence	The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. <i>Total submergence of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i>
submerging	Sinking until covered completely with water.
submersion	Sinking until covered completely with water. <i>Five small islands threatened by submersion.</i>

absorption	The process in which incident radiated energy is retained without reflection or transmission on passing through a medium. <i>The absorption of photons by atoms or molecules.</i>
aqueous	Of or containing water. <i>An eerie aqueous light.</i>
assimilate	(of the body or any biological system) absorb and digest (food or nutrients). <i>The Churches assimilated to a certain cultural norm.</i>

<u>assimilation</u>	The social process of absorbing one cultural group into harmony with another. <i>When p is preceded by some Latin prefixes it is doubled because of the assimilation of a consonant as in <i>apparent ad parent</i>.</i>
awash	Covered with water. <i>The main deck was afloat or awash.</i>
<u>blacksmith</u>	A farrier.
<u>concentration</u>	Strengthening the concentration as of a solute in a mixture by removing diluting material. <i>She was frowning in concentration.</i>
consume	Serve oneself to or consume regularly. <i>The effort to pass the exam consumed all his energy.</i>
<u>dampen</u>	Check; keep in check (a fire). <i>Slider switches on the mixers can dampen the drums.</i>
denseness	The amount per unit size.
<u>digest</u>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. <i>I cannot digest milk products.</i>
drench	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>The war drenched the country in blood.</i>
immerse	Cause to be immersed. <i>Immerse the paper in water for twenty minutes.</i>
impregnate	Make pregnant. <i>Wood which had been impregnated with preservative.</i>
<u>ingest</u>	Take (food, drink, or another substance) into the body by swallowing or absorbing it. <i>He spent his days ingesting the contents of the library.</i>
macerate	Separate into constituents by soaking. <i>Macerate the mustard seeds in vinegar.</i>
<u>metal</u>	Containing or made of or resembling or characteristic of a metal <i>A metallic compound.</i>
moisture	Water or other liquid diffused in a small quantity as vapour, within a solid, or condensed on a surface. <i>In freshly felled wood the moisture content varies.</i>
<u>morbid</u>	Suggesting an unhealthy mental state. <i>Morbid interest in death.</i>

<u>preoccupation</u>	A subject or matter that engrosses someone. <i>His preoccupation with politics.</i>
sate	Fill to satisfaction. <i>He was sated with flying.</i>
<u>saturate</u>	Saturated with moisture. <i>The groundwater is saturated with calcium hydroxide.</i>
<u>silver</u>	Turn silver. <i>Her worries had silvered her hair.</i>
sink	Cause to sink. <i>They agreed to sink their differences.</i>
<u>soak</u>	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>A good soak put life back in the wagon.</i>
sop	Give a conciliatory gift or bribe to. <i>He used some bread to sop up the sauce.</i>
<u>submerge</u>	Cover completely or make imperceptible. <i>The tensions submerged earlier in the campaign now came to the fore.</i>
submergence	The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Total submergence of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i>
<u>wet</u>	Cause to become wet. <i>She followed slipping on the wet rock.</i>
