<b>captivation</b>	The state of being intensely interested (as by awe or terror).
<b>christening</b>	A Christian ceremony at which a baby is christened; a baptism. <i>A <b>christening</b> robe.</i>
<b><u>concentration</u></b>	Strengthening the concentration as of a solute in a mixture by removing diluting material. <i>The gas can collect in dangerous <b>concentrations</b>.</i>
<b>dousing</b>	The act of wetting something by submerging it.
<b>ducking</b>	Flesh of a duck (domestic or wild).

<b>engrossment</b>	The quality of being intent and concentrated.
<b>ingress</b>	The arrival of the sun, moon, or a planet in a specified constellation or part of the sky.
<b>intentness</b>	The quality of being intent and concentrated. <i>The <b>intentness</b> of his gaze.</i>
<b><u>involvement</u></b>	A usually secretive or illicit sexual relationship. <i>He escaped <b>involvement</b> in the accident.</i>
<b>monopolization</b>	Domination (of a market or commodity) to the exclusion of others.
<b>naming</b>	The verbal act of naming. <i>The part he failed was the <b>naming</b> of state capitals.</i>
<b><u>occupation</u></b>	Any activity that occupies a person's attention. <i>He missed the bell in his <b>occupation</b> with the computer game.</i>
<b><u>plunge</u></b>	An act of jumping or diving into water. <i>The central bank declared a 76 <b>plunge</b> in its profits.</i>
<b><u>preoccupation</u></b>	A subject or matter that engrosses someone. <i>Their main <b>preoccupation</b> was how to feed their families.</i>
<b>raptness</b>	A state of elated bliss.
<b>sprinkling</b>	The act of sprinkling or splashing water. <i>A <b>sprinkling</b> of grey at his temples.</i>
<b>submergence</b>	The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. <i>Total <b>submergence</b> of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i>
<b>submerging</b>	Sinking until covered completely with water.
<b>submersion</b>	Sinking until covered completely with water. <i>Five small islands threatened by <b>submersion</b>.</i>

<b>absorb</b>	Take in, also metaphorically. <i>The work <b>absorbed</b> him and continued to make him happy.</i>
<b>absorption</b>	The process in which incident radiated energy is retained without reflection or transmission on passing through a medium. <i>The <b>absorption</b> of photons by atoms or molecules.</i>
<b>aqueous</b>	Of or containing water. <i>An eerie <b>aqueous</b> light.</i>
<b>assimilate</b>	(of the body or any biological system) absorb and digest (food or nutrients). <i>The Churches <b>assimilated</b> to a certain cultural norm.</i>

<b><u>assimilation</u></b>	The social process of absorbing one cultural group into harmony with another. <i>When p is preceded by some Latin prefixes it is doubled because of the <b>assimilation</b> of a consonant as in <i>apparent ad parent</i>.</i>
<b>awash</b>	Covered with water. <i>The main deck was afloat or <b>awash</b>.</i>
<b><u>blacksmith</u></b>	A farrier.
<b><u>concentration</u></b>	Strengthening the concentration as of a solute in a mixture by removing diluting material. <i>She was frowning in <b>concentration</b>.</i>
<b>consume</b>	Serve oneself to or consume regularly. <i>The effort to pass the exam <b>consumed</b> all his energy.</i>
<b><u>dampen</u></b>	Check; keep in check (a fire). <i>Slider switches on the mixers can <b>dampen</b> the drums.</i>
<b>denseness</b>	The amount per unit size.
<b><u>digest</u></b>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. <i>I cannot <b>digest</b> milk products.</i>
<b>drench</b>	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>The war <b>drenched</b> the country in blood.</i>
<b>immerse</b>	Cause to be immersed. <i><b>Immerse</b> the paper in water for twenty minutes.</i>
<b>impregnate</b>	Make pregnant. <i>Wood which had been <b>impregnated</b> with preservative.</i>
<b><u>ingest</u></b>	Take (food, drink, or another substance) into the body by swallowing or absorbing it. <i>He spent his days <b>ingesting</b> the contents of the library.</i>
<b>macerate</b>	Separate into constituents by soaking. <i><b>Macerate</b> the mustard seeds in vinegar.</i>
<b><u>metal</u></b>	Containing or made of or resembling or characteristic of a metal <i>Ambrose Bierce.</i> <i>A <b>metallic</b> compound.</i>
<b>moisture</b>	Water or other liquid diffused in a small quantity as vapour, within a solid, or condensed on a surface. <i>In freshly felled wood the <b>moisture</b> content varies.</i>
<b><u>morbid</u></b>	Suggesting an unhealthy mental state. <i><b>Morbid</b> interest in death.</i>

<b><u>preoccupation</u></b>	A subject or matter that engrosses someone. <i>His <b>preoccupation</b> with politics.</i>
<b>sate</b>	Fill to satisfaction. <i>He was <b>sated</b> with flying.</i>
<b><u>saturate</u></b>	Saturated with moisture. <i>The groundwater is <b>saturated</b> with calcium hydroxide.</i>
<b><u>silver</u></b>	Turn silver. <i>Her worries had <b>silvered</b> her hair.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Cause to sink. <i>They agreed to <b>sink</b> their differences.</i>
<b><u>soak</u></b>	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>A good <b>soak</b> put life back in the wagon.</i>
<b>sop</b>	Give a conciliatory gift or bribe to. <i>He used some bread to <b>sop</b> up the sauce.</i>
<b><u>submerge</u></b>	Cover completely or make imperceptible. <i>The tensions <b>submerged</b> earlier in the campaign now came to the fore.</i>
<b>submergence</b>	The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Total <b>submergence</b> of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i>
<b><u>wet</u></b>	Cause to become wet. <i>She followed slipping on the <b>wet</b> rock.</i>
