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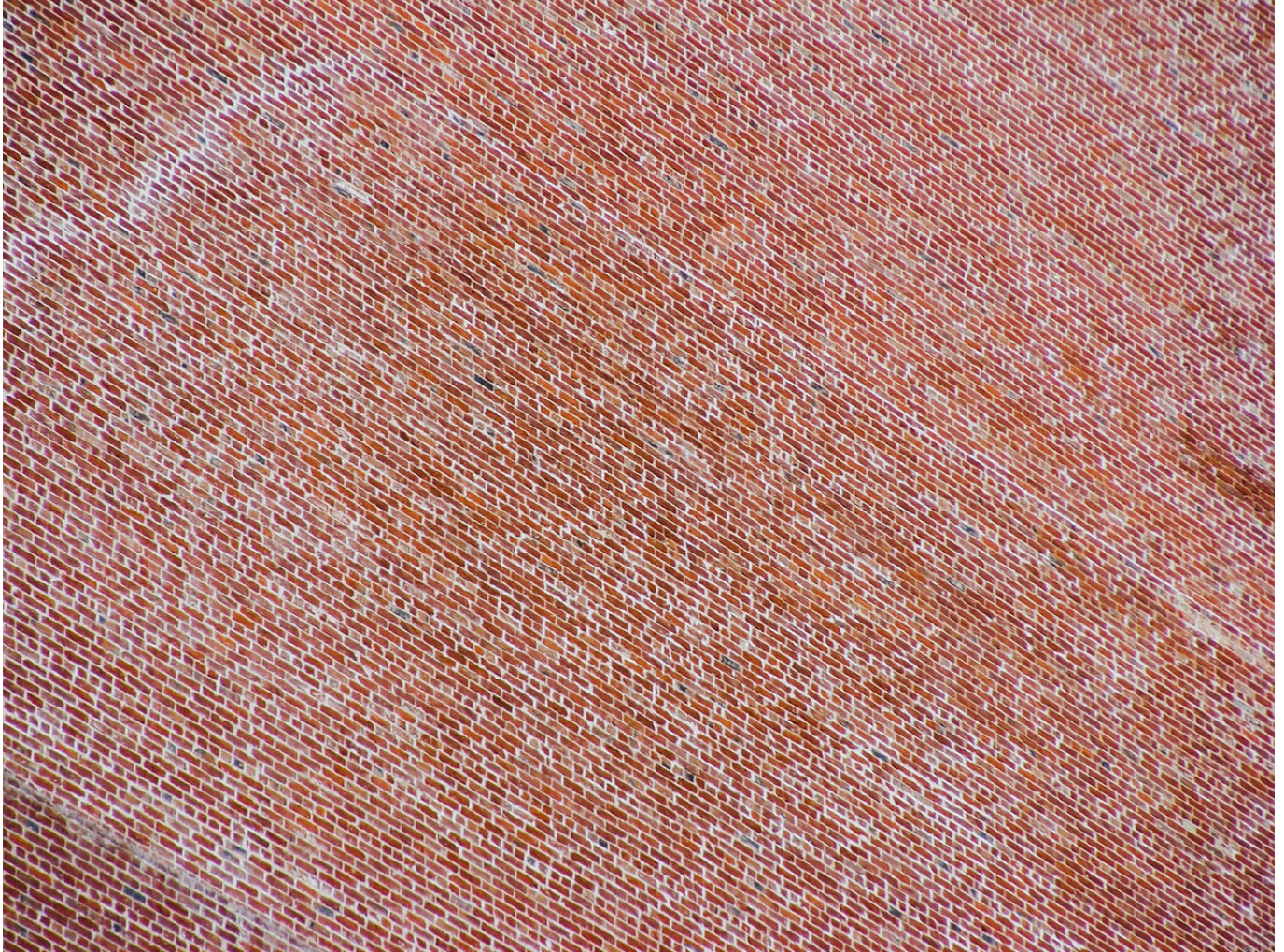

braced	Positioned so as to be ready for confrontation or danger. <i>He stood to attention with his shoulders braced.</i>
dead set	Devoid of activity.
determined	Having been learned or found or determined especially by investigation. <i>Helen was a determined little girl.</i>
<u>dogged</u>	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>Success required dogged determination.</i>
fast	At a rapid tempo. <i>A 35 mm colour film which is ten times faster than Kodacolor II.</i>
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>His voice was firm and confident.</i>
fixed	Having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>A fixed iron ladder down the port side.</i>
immoveable	Not able or intended to be moved.
inexorable	Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason- W.Churchill. <i>The doctors were inexorable and there was nothing to be done.</i>
inflexible	Incapable of change. <i>An inflexible knife blade.</i>
obdurate	Stubbornly refusing to change one's opinion or course of action. <i>I argued this point with him but he was obdurate.</i>
<u>resolute</u>	Firm in purpose or belief; characterized by firmness and determination. <i>Stood resolute against the enemy.</i>
<u>rooted</u>	Broken or badly damaged. <i>They stood rooted in astonishment.</i>
<u>secure</u>	Free from fear or doubt; easy in mind. <i>Everyone needs to have a home and to feel secure and wanted.</i>
set fast	Being below the horizon.

set firm	Situated in a particular spot or position.
stable	Not able or intended to be moved.
<u>stable</u>	Not taking part readily in chemical change. <i>Prices have remained relatively stable.</i>
steadfast	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. Steadfast loyalty.
steely	Coldly determined; hard. <i>There was a steely edge to his questions.</i>
strong-willed	Having a determined will.
stubborn	Having or showing dogged determination not to change one's attitude or position on something, especially in spite of good arguments or reasons to do so. <i>A stubborn infection.</i>
tenacious	Good at remembering. <i>A tenacious grip.</i>
unbending	Reserved, formal, or strict in one's behaviour or attitudes; austere and inflexible. <i>His output is prodigious and springs from the unbending control he exercises over every aspect of his life.</i>
<u>uncompromising</u>	Not making concessions. <i>The uncompromising ugliness of the era's buildings.</i>
<u>unfailing</u>	Always able to supply more. <i>His unfailing memory for names.</i>
unmovable	Not able or intended to be moved.
<u>unrelenting</u>	Not yielding in strength, severity, or determination. Unrelenting opponents.
<u>unshakeable</u>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>An unshakeable alibi.</i>
unswerving	Not changing or becoming weaker; steady or constant. Unswerving loyalty.
<u>unwavering</u>	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <i>She fixed him with an unwavering stare.</i>
unyielding	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>His unyielding faith.</i>

confirmed	(of a person) firmly established in a particular habit, belief, or way of life and unlikely to change their ways. <i>A confirmed bachelor.</i>
constancy	The tendency for perceived objects to give rise to very similar perceptual experiences in spite of wide variations in the conditions of observation. <i>She did not think much of married bliss yet she approved of constancy.</i>
fixed	Fixed and unmoving. <i>The fight s fixed the ref has your card marked.</i>
halting	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>She speaks halting English with a heavy accent.</i>
immobile	Securely fixed in place. <i>She sat immobile for a long time.</i>
immobility	Inability to move or be moved. <i>The disorder is caused by long periods of immobility.</i>
immutable	Unchanging over time or unable to be changed. <i>The immutable laws of nature.</i>
<u>inert</u>	Having only a limited ability to react chemically; chemically inactive. <i>She lay inert in her bed.</i>
jammed	Extremely crowded or filled to capacity. <i>A suitcase jammed with dirty clothes.</i>
lint	A fabric, originally of linen, with a raised nap on one side, used for dressing wounds. <i>Some fabrics leave tiny specks of lint on the glass.</i>
<u>motionless</u>	Not in physical motion. <i>An eagle hung almost motionless close to the ground.</i>
<u>nonetheless</u>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession). <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was nonetheless attended by some 6 000.</i>
ossified	Having become rigid or fixed in attitude or position. <i>An ossified institution.</i>

paralysis	Loss of the ability to move a body part. <i>The fast acting venom causes paralysis breathing difficulties and sometimes death.</i>
preside	Act as president. <i>Preside over companies and corporations.</i>
ready	Make ready or suitable or equip in advance for a particular purpose or for some use event etc. <i>Those who have ready access to the arts.</i>
<u>sedentary</u>	(of work or a way of life) characterized by much sitting and little physical exercise. <i>Forced by illness to lead a sedentary life.</i>
sitting	In a seated position. <i>Twenty pieces of music is a bit much to take in at one sitting.</i>
<u>stable</u>	Shelter in a stable. <i>Specially designed dinghies that are very stable.</i>
standing	Executed in or initiated from a standing position. <i>Of equal standing.</i>
<u>static</u>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>The phone was full of static that sounded distant.</i>
statics	The branch of mechanics concerned with forces in equilibrium.
<u>stationary</u>	Standing still. <i>A car collided with a stationary vehicle.</i>
steadfast	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. <i>Steadfast loyalty.</i>
<u>stiff</u>	In a stiff manner. <i>Ordinary working stiffs in respectable offices.</i>
still	Make calm or still. <i>A still pond.</i>
<u>unchangeable</u>	Not changeable or subject to change-Ashley Montagu. <i>The unchangeable seasons.</i>
unmoving	Not in motion. <i>This must be the most unmoving performance of Verdi s opera ever recorded.</i>
unshakable	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable.
waiting	The act of waiting remaining inactive in one place while expecting something. <i>Waiting cars and limousines lined the curb.</i>
