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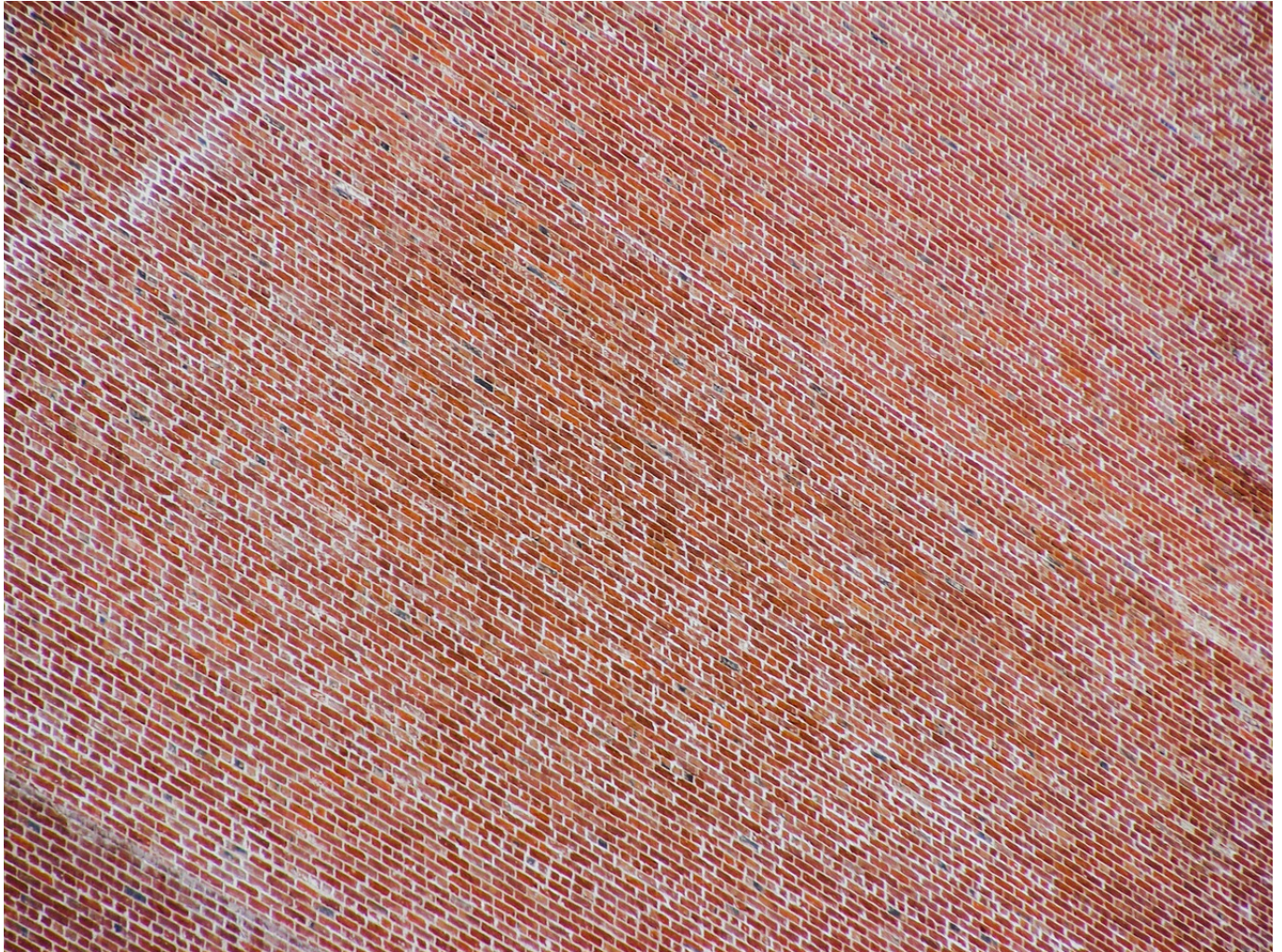

<b>fixed</b>	Having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>A <b>fixed</b> iron ladder down the port side.</i>
<b>immoveable</b>	Not able or intended to be moved.
<b>inexorable</b>	Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason- W.Churchill. <i>The doctors were <b>inexorable</b> and there was nothing to be done.</i>
<b>inflexible</b>	Incapable of change. <i>An <b>inflexible</b> knife blade.</i>
<b>obdurate</b>	Stubbornly refusing to change one's opinion or course of action. <i>I argued this point with him but he was <b>obdurate</b>.</i>
<b><u>resolute</u></b>	Firm in purpose or belief; characterized by firmness and determination. <i>Stood <b>resolute</b> against the enemy.</i>
<b><u>rooted</u></b>	Broken or badly damaged. <i>They stood <b>rooted</b> in astonishment.</i>
<b><u>secure</u></b>	Free from fear or doubt; easy in mind. <i>Everyone needs to have a home and to feel <b>secure</b> and wanted.</i>
<b>set fast</b>	Being below the horizon.

<b>set firm</b>	Situated in a particular spot or position.
<b>stable</b>	Not able or intended to be moved.
<b><u>stable</u></b>	Not taking part readily in chemical change. <i>Prices have remained relatively <b>stable</b>.</i>
<b>steadfast</b>	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. <b>Steadfast</b> loyalty.
<b>steely</b>	Coldly determined; hard. <i>There was a <b>steely</b> edge to his questions.</i>
<b>strong-willed</b>	Having a determined will.
<b>stubborn</b>	Having or showing dogged determination not to change one's attitude or position on something, especially in spite of good arguments or reasons to do so. <i>A <b>stubborn</b> infection.</i>
<b>tenacious</b>	Good at remembering. <i>A <b>tenacious</b> grip.</i>
<b>unbending</b>	Reserved, formal, or strict in one's behaviour or attitudes; austere and inflexible. <i>His output is prodigious and springs from the <b>unbending</b> control he exercises over every aspect of his life.</i>
<b><u>uncompromising</u></b>	Not making concessions. <i>The <b>uncompromising</b> ugliness of the era's buildings.</i>
<b><u>unfailing</u></b>	Always able to supply more. <i>His <b>unfailing</b> memory for names.</i>
<b>unmovable</b>	Not able or intended to be moved.
<b><u>unrelenting</u></b>	Not yielding in strength, severity, or determination. <b>Unrelenting</b> opponents.
<b><u>unshakeable</u></b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>An <b>unshakeable</b> alibi.</i>
<b>unswerving</b>	Not changing or becoming weaker; steady or constant. <b>Unswerving</b> loyalty.
<b><u>unwavering</u></b>	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <i>She fixed him with an <b>unwavering</b> stare.</i>
<b>unyielding</b>	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>His <b>unyielding</b> faith.</i>

<b>confirmed</b>	(of a person) firmly established in a particular habit, belief, or way of life and unlikely to change their ways. <i>A <b>confirmed</b> bachelor.</i>
<b>constancy</b>	The tendency for perceived objects to give rise to very similar perceptual experiences in spite of wide variations in the conditions of observation. <i>She did not think much of married bliss yet she approved of <b>constancy</b>.</i>
<b>fixed</b>	Fixed and unmoving. <i>The fight s <b>fixed</b> the ref has your card marked.</i>
<b>halting</b>	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>She speaks <b>halting</b> English with a heavy accent.</i>
<b>immobile</b>	Securely fixed in place. <i>She sat <b>immobile</b> for a long time.</i>
<b>immobility</b>	Inability to move or be moved. <i>The disorder is caused by long periods of <b>immobility</b>.</i>
<b>immutable</b>	Unchanging over time or unable to be changed. <i>The <b>immutable</b> laws of nature.</i>
<b><u>inert</u></b>	Having only a limited ability to react chemically; chemically inactive. <i>She lay <b>inert</b> in her bed.</i>
<b>jammed</b>	Extremely crowded or filled to capacity. <i>A suitcase <b>jammed</b> with dirty clothes.</i>
<b>lint</b>	A fabric, originally of linen, with a raised nap on one side, used for dressing wounds. <i>Some fabrics leave tiny specks of <b>lint</b> on the glass.</i>
<b><u>motionless</u></b>	Not in physical motion. <i>An eagle hung almost <b>motionless</b> close to the ground.</i>
<b><u>nonetheless</u></b>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession). <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was <b>nonetheless</b> attended by some 6 000.</i>
<b>ossified</b>	Having become rigid or fixed in attitude or position. <i>An <b>ossified</b> institution.</i>

<b>paralysis</b>	Loss of the ability to move a body part. <i>The fast acting venom causes <b>paralysis</b> breathing difficulties and sometimes death.</i>
<b>preside</b>	Act as president. <i><b>Preside</b> over companies and corporations.</i>
<b>ready</b>	Make ready or suitable or equip in advance for a particular purpose or for some use event etc. <i>Those who have <b>ready</b> access to the arts.</i>
<b><u>sedentary</u></b>	(of work or a way of life) characterized by much sitting and little physical exercise. <i>Forced by illness to lead a <b>sedentary</b> life.</i>
<b>sitting</b>	In a seated position. <i>Twenty pieces of music is a bit much to take in at one <b>sitting</b>.</i>
<b><u>stable</u></b>	Shelter in a stable. <i>Specially designed dinghies that are very <b>stable</b>.</i>
<b>standing</b>	Executed in or initiated from a standing position. <i>Of equal <b>standing</b>.</i>
<b><u>static</u></b>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>The phone was full of <b>static</b> that sounded distant.</i>
<b>statics</b>	The branch of mechanics concerned with forces in equilibrium.
<b><u>stationary</u></b>	Standing still. <i>A car collided with a <b>stationary</b> vehicle.</i>
<b>steadfast</b>	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. <i><b>Steadfast</b> loyalty.</i>
<b><u>stiff</u></b>	In a stiff manner. <i>Ordinary working <b>stiffs</b> in respectable offices.</i>
<b>still</b>	Make calm or still. <i>A <b>still</b> pond.</i>
<b><u>unchangeable</u></b>	Not changeable or subject to change-Ashley Montagu. <i>The <b>unchangeable</b> seasons.</i>
<b>unmoving</b>	Not in motion. <i>This must be the most <b>unmoving</b> performance of Verdi s opera ever recorded.</i>
<b>unshakable</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable.
<b>waiting</b>	The act of waiting remaining inactive in one place while expecting something. <i><b>Waiting</b> cars and limousines lined the curb.</i>
