(of a concept or fact) be harmonious or consistent with.
*The national assembly **accorded** the General more power.*

add

Put in an additional element ingredient etc.
*I hope we haven't been too much trouble she **added** politely.*

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| afford | Afford access to. <i>Only aristocrats could afford to stoop to such practices.</i> |
| announce | Announce publicly or officially. <i>The President's office announced that the siege would be lifted.</i> |
| bestow | Bestow a quality on. <i>Bestow an honor on someone.</i> |
| bring | Bring into a different state. <i>Bring comments.</i> |
| broadcast | Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>Broadcast the news.</i> |
| carry | Transfer (a number, cipher, or remainder) to the next column or unit's place before or after, in addition or multiplication. <i>The bridge is capable of carrying even the heaviest loads.</i> |
| channel | Cause to pass along or through a specified route or medium. <i>She was channelling the spirit of Billie Holiday.</i> |
| circulate | Cause to become widely known. <i>The air here does not circulate.</i> |
| communicate | Receive Holy Communion. <i>A politician must have the ability to communicate.</i> |
| conduct | Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <i>Heat is conducted to the surface.</i> |
| confer | Have a conference in order to talk something over. <i>The Minister may have exceeded the powers conferred on him by Parliament.</i> |
| contribute | Contribute to some cause. <i>He contributed to a private pension.</i> |
| convey | Communicate (a message or information). <i>Pipes were laid to convey water to the house.</i> |
| disseminate | Spread throughout an organ or the body. <i>There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can disseminate and migrate.</i> |
| give | Give entirely to a specific person activity or cause. <i>Give me a second to bring the car around.</i> |
| go public with | Begin or set in motion. |
| grant | Be willing to concede. <i>Grant a privilege.</i> |

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| leave | Leave behind unintentionally. <i>Leave the young fawn alone.</i> |
| lend | Bestow a quality on. <i>I will lend you my car.</i> |
| make known | Proceed along a path. |
| make public | Create by artistic means. |
| offer | Offer verbally. <i>The Shakespeare Company is offering King Lear this month.</i> |
| pass on | Eliminate from the body. |
| present | Represent abstractly for example in a painting drawing or sculpture. <i>We presented the arguments to him.</i> |
| proclaim | Affirm or declare as an attribute or quality of. <i>He had a rolling gait that proclaimed him a man of the sea.</i> |
| promulgate | Promote or make widely known (an idea or cause). <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was promulgated.</i> |
| provide | Make a possibility or provide opportunity for permit to be attainable or cause to remain. <i>These clubs provide a much appreciated service for this area.</i> |
| recount | Tell someone about something; give an account of an event or experience. <i>We had to recount all the votes after an accusation of fraud was made.</i> |
| relate | Feel sympathy for or identify with. <i>High unemployment is related to high crime rates.</i> |
| relay | Control or operate by relay. <i>Please relay the news to the villagers.</i> |
| report | Cover an event or subject as a journalist or a reporter. <i>Undisclosed illegalities are reported to the company s directors.</i> |
| set forth | Bear fruit. |
| spread | Become distributed or widespread. <i>Spread each slice thinly with mayonnaise.</i> |
| supply | Give what is desired or needed, especially support, food or sustenance. <i>The two reservoirs supply about 1 of the city s needs.</i> |
| tell | Express in words. <i>Tell him to go away.</i> |
| transmit | Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>Transmit a message.</i> |
| yield | (of a mass or structure) give way under force or pressure. <i>This method yields the same results.</i> |

- *Impart a new skill to the students.*

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| amortization | The reduction of the value of an asset by prorating its cost over a period of years. <i>Because of amortization you ll own your home by the end of the loan term.</i> |
| announce | Make known make an announcement. <i>I have a confession to make she announced.</i> |
| apprise | Inform or tell (someone). <i>Have the students been apprised of the tuition hike.</i> |
| assistance | Gift of money or other material help to support a person or cause. <i>Economic assistance to depressed areas.</i> |
| authenticate | Prove or show (something) to be true, genuine, or valid. <i>It only accepts commands from users who have authenticated as clients.</i> |
| bequeath | Leave or give by will after one's death. <i>My aunt bequeathed me all her jewelry.</i> |
| bestow | Bestow a quality on. <i>Stooping to bestow the presents into eager hands.</i> |
| borrow | Allow (a certain distance) when playing a shot to compensate for sideways motion of the ball due to a slope or other irregularity. <i>To meet this deficit the government has to borrow money.</i> |
| bring | Go or come after and bring or take back. <i>She could not bring herself to mention it.</i> |
| conspicuously | In a way that attracts notice or attention. <i>One important voice has been conspicuously absent.</i> |
| contribute | Contribute to some cause. <i>He contributed articles to the magazine.</i> |
| credential | Provide with credentials. <i>The Russian ambassador presented his credentials on September 30.</i> |
| descendants | All of the offspring of a given progenitor. |

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| disclose | Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>The curtain rose to disclose a stunning set.</i> |
| disclosed | Made known (especially something secret or concealed). <i>The disclosed purpose of their wicked plan.</i> |
| <u>divulge</u> | Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret. <i>I do not want to divulge my plans at the moment.</i> |
| <u>expose</u> | Expose to light of photographic film. <i>He published an expose of the graft and corruption in city government.</i> |
| finance | Provide funding for (a person or enterprise). <i>The firm s finance department.</i> |
| <u>give</u> | Leave with give temporarily. <i>For your entertainment this evening I give you Mister Albert DeNero.</i> |
| inform | Give incriminating information about someone to the police or other authority. <i>She had informed on her own parents for years.</i> |
| <u>lend</u> | Give temporarily; let have for a limited time. <i>The current system lends itself to great abuse.</i> |
| <u>loan</u> | A thing that is borrowed, especially a sum of money that is expected to be paid back with interest. <i>Borrowers can take out a loan for 84 000.</i> |
| moneylender | A person whose business is lending money to others who pay interest. |
| mortgage | A deed effecting a mortgage. <i>I put down a hundred thousand in cash and took out a mortgage for the rest.</i> |
| notify | Give notice of or report (something) formally or officially. <i>They were notified that John had been taken prisoner.</i> |
| posterity | The descendants of a person. <i>The victims names are recorded for posterity.</i> |
| reveal | Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret. <i>God rarely reveal his plans for Mankind.</i> |
| revealing | Disclosing unintentionally something concealed. <i>A revealing glance.</i> |
| telltale | A device or object that automatically gives a visual indication of the state or presence of something. <i>The telltale bulge of a concealed weapon.</i> |
