Impasse as a Noun

Definitions of "Impasse" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “impasse” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A situation in which no progress can be made or no advancement is possible.*
- *A street with only one way in or out.*
- *A situation in which no progress is possible, especially because of disagreement; a deadlock.*



Synonyms of "Impasse" as a noun (8 Words)

blind alley	Something intended to misrepresent the true nature of an activity. Said by a player to announce that the opponent's king is in the position of checkmate.
checkmate	<i>If the rebel forces succeed in cutting off the road they will have achieved checkmate.</i>
cul de sac	A passage with access only at one end.
dead end	A time when coldness (or some other quality associated with death) is intense.
dead-end street	A situation offering opportunities.
<u>deadlock</u>	A situation in a game or match where the scores are level. <i>An attempt to break the deadlock.</i>
<u>stalemate</u>	A situation in which further action or progress by opposing or competing parties seems impossible. <i>The war had again reached stalemate.</i>
standstill	A situation in which no progress can be made or no advancement is possible. <i>The traffic came to a standstill.</i>



Usage Examples of "Impasse" as a noun

- *The current political impasse.*
- *Reached an impasse on the negotiations.*



Associations of "Impasse" (30 Words)

abeyance	A state of temporary disuse or suspension. <i>Matters were held in abeyance pending further enquiries.</i>
<u>cease</u>	Cease is a noun only in the phrase without cease end. <i>The hostilities ceased and normal life was resumed.</i>
<u>cessation</u>	A stopping. <i>A cessation of animal testing of cosmetics.</i>
<u>deadlock</u>	Secure a door with a deadlock. <i>Ashton broke the deadlock with a penalty after 15 minutes.</i>
desist	Stop doing something; cease or abstain. <i>Each pledged to desist from acts of sabotage.</i>
difficulty	A condition or state of affairs almost beyond one's ability to deal with and requiring great effort to bear or overcome. <i>Finished the test only with great difficulty.</i>

<u>discontinue</u>	Prevent completion. <i>He discontinued his visits.</i>
discontinuity	A break in or lack of continuity. <i>There is no significant discontinuity between modern and primitive societies.</i>
<u>halt</u>	Come to a halt stop moving. <i>Company halt.</i>
halting	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>She speaks halting English with a heavy accent.</i>
hardship	Severe suffering or privation. <i>The many hardships of frontier life.</i>
<u>hiatus</u>	An interruption in the intensity or amount of something. <i>There was a brief hiatus in the war with France.</i>
<u>immovable</u>	Immovable property. <i>All immovable objects have graffiti sprayed on them.</i>
layover	A brief stay in the course of a journey. <i>There was only a forty eight minute layover.</i>
<u>pause</u>	A mark over a note or rest that is to be lengthened by an unspecified amount. <i>The speaker paused.</i>
permanently	For a long time without essential change. <i>He is permanently disabled.</i>
predicament	A difficult, unpleasant, or embarrassing situation. <i>Finds himself in a most awkward predicament.</i>
<u>puzzled</u>	Filled with bewilderment. <i>Puzzled that she left without saying goodbye.</i>
<u>quandary</u>	A state of perplexity or uncertainty over what to do in a difficult situation. <i>A legal quandary.</i>
quit	Give up in the face of defeat of lacking hope; admit defeat. <i>He quit as manager of the struggling Third Division team.</i>
resign	Part with a possession or right. <i>He lost his Queen and resigned in 45 moves.</i>
<u>stalemate</u>	Subject to a stalemate. <i>The war had again reached stalemate.</i>
stanch	Stop the flow of a liquid.
standstill	An interruption of normal activity. <i>The traffic came to a standstill.</i>

<u>stasis</u>	A period or state of inactivity or equilibrium. <i>Long periods of stasis.</i>
stop	Used in telegrams to indicate a full stop. <i>He stopped work for tea.</i>
temporarily	For a limited period of time; not permanently. <i>A temporarily vacant department store.</i>
trouble	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>He wanted to die and end his troubles.</i>
unaccustomed	Not habituated to; unfamiliar with. <i>Many varieties of unaccustomed foods.</i>
walkout	The act of walking out (of a meeting or organization) as a sign of protest. <i>There was a walkout by the Black members as the chairman rose to speak.</i>
