Synonyms of "Impassioned" as an adjective (20 Words)

ardent

Very enthusiastic or passionate.
*Frightened by his **ardent** burning eyes.*

burning

Of urgent interest and importance; exciting or calling for debate.
*The **burning** question of independence.*

earnest

Earnest.
*Two girls were in **earnest** conversation.*

emotional

Arousing or characterized by intense feeling.
*Gaining **emotional** support from relatives.*

emotive

Characterized by emotion.
*The comparisons are **emotive** rather than analytic.*

fervent	Hot, burning, or glowing. <i>A fervent supporter of the revolution.</i>
fervid	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>His fervid protestations of love.</i>
feverish	Of or relating to or characterized by fever. <i>Worked at a feverish pace.</i>
fiery	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>A fiery imaginative Aries.</i>
frantic	Distraught with fear, anxiety, or other emotion. <i>She was frantic with worry.</i>
heartfelt	Earnest. <i>Our heartfelt thanks.</i>
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>Intense pain.</i>
passionate	Having or expressing strong emotions. <i>He s passionate about football.</i>
perfervid	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>Perfervid nationalism.</i>
sincere	(of a person) saying what they genuinely feel or believe; not dishonest or hypocritical. <i>Felt sincere regret that they were leaving.</i>
torrid	Extremely hot and dry. <i>Hot trumpets and torrid rhythms.</i>
urgent	Of an action or event done or arranged in response to an urgent situation. <i>Bridges in urgent need of repair.</i>
vehement	Showing strong feeling; forceful, passionate, or intense. <i>A vehement defense.</i>
wholehearted	With unconditional and enthusiastic devotion. <i>Gave wholehearted support to her candidacy.</i>
zealous	Marked by active interest and enthusiasm. <i>The council was extremely zealous in the application of the regulations.</i>



Usage Examples of "Impassioned" as an adjective

- *An impassioned appeal.*
- *She made an impassioned plea for help.*



Associations of "Impassioned" (30 Words)

afire	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>The whole mill was afire.</i>
aflame	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>Pour brandy over the steaks and then set aflame.</i>
agitated	Feeling or appearing troubled or nervous. <i>She was red and agitated with the effort of arguing.</i>
alight	To come to rest, settle. <i>The conductor alights to push the cable car completely around.</i>
ardent	Very enthusiastic or passionate. <i>An ardent lover.</i>
burning	The act of burning something. <i>The burning question of independence.</i>
cauterize	Burn the skin or flesh of (a wound) with a heated instrument or caustic substance in order to stop bleeding or to prevent infection. <i>I'll freeze the hand and cauterize the wound.</i>
eager	A high wave (often dangerous) caused by tidal flow (as by colliding tidal currents or in a narrow estuary). <i>Eager to learn.</i>
earnest	Sincerely earnest. <i>Both sides were deeply in earnest even passionate.</i>
enthusiasm	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>Enthusiasm for his program is growing.</i>
enthusiastic	Having or showing great excitement and interest. <i>An enthusiastic response.</i>
fervent	Having or displaying a passionate intensity. <i>A fervent supporter of the revolution.</i>
fervid	Hot, burning, or glowing. <i>Set out when the fervid heat subsides.</i>
fever	The state of being emotionally aroused and worked up. A rise in the temperature of the body; frequently a symptom of infection. <i>In a fever of resentment.</i>
fiery	Showing strong emotion, typically anger. <i>The sun was a fiery ball low on the hills.</i>
frenzied	Wildly excited or uncontrolled. <i>A frenzied attack.</i>

heartily	To a great degree; very (especially with reference to personal feelings). <i>Yes the children chorused heartily.</i>
hot	Make or become hot. <i>A hot laboratory.</i>
igneous	Produced by the action of fire or intense heat. <i>An igneous desert atmosphere.</i>
overwrought	Deeply agitated especially from emotion. <i>Overwrought prose.</i>
passion	A feeling of strong sexual desire. <i>Oratory in which he gradually works himself up into a passion.</i>
passionate	Having or expressing strong emotions. <i>Passionate pleas for help.</i>
rabid	Having or proceeding from an extreme or fanatical support of or belief in something. <i>The show s small but rabid fan base.</i>
stoke	Add coal or other solid fuel to (a fire, furnace, boiler, etc). <i>He stoked up the barbecue.</i>
torrid	Extremely hot. <i>The world s most torrid economies.</i>
zealot	A person who is fanatical and uncompromising in pursuit of their religious, political, or other ideals.
zealotry	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>He expressed concern about religious zealotry playing an increasing role in politics.</i>
zealous	Having or showing zeal. <i>The council was extremely zealous in the application of the regulations.</i>
zest	Great enthusiasm and energy. <i>She had a great zest for life.</i>
