## Impersonal as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Impersonal" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “impersonal” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not relating to or responsive to individual persons.*
- *Having no personal preference.*
- *Not influenced by, showing, or involving personal feelings.*
- *Not existing as a person.*
- *(of a place or organization) featureless and anonymous.*
- *(of a verb) used only with a formal subject (in English usually it) and expressing an action not attributable to a definite subject (as in it is snowing).*



## Synonyms of "Impersonal" as an adjective (31 Words)

<b>aloof</b>	Not friendly or forthcoming; cool and distant. <i>He stayed <b>aloof</b> from the bickering.</i>
<b>characterless</b>	Lacking distinct or individual characteristics; dull and uninteresting.
<b>cold</b>	Of a person feeling uncomfortably cold. <i><b>Cold</b> fury gripped him.</i>
<b>colourless</b>	Lacking distinctive character or interest; dull. <i>Her <b>colourless</b> cheeks.</i>
<b>cool</b>	Inducing the impression of coolness used especially of greens and blues and violets. <i><b>Cool</b> summer dresses.</i>
<b>detached</b>	Aloof and objective. <i>She may be <b>detached</b> or even unfeeling but at least she s not hypocritically effusive.</i>

<b>disinterested</b>	Unaffected by self-interest. <i>A banker is under an obligation to give <b>disinterested</b> advice.</i>
<b>dispassionate</b>	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>A journalist should be a <b>dispassionate</b> reporter of fact.</i>
<b>distant</b>	(of a person) not closely related. <i>A <b>distant</b> look in his eyes.</i>
<b>faceless</b>	(of a person) remote and impersonal; anonymous. <i>The <b>faceless</b> accusers of the police state.</i>
<b>free from discrimination</b>	Not taken up by scheduled activities.
<b>frigid</b>	Unable to be sexually aroused (typically used of a woman). <i><b>Frigid</b> water.</i>
<b>grey</b>	Used to signify the Confederate forces in the American Civil War who wore grey uniforms. <i><b>Grey</b> power.</i>
<b>indifferent</b>	Marked by a lack of interest. <i>A properly <b>indifferent</b> jury.</i>
<b>neutral</b>	Belonging to an impartial group or state. <i>Walls are painted in <b>neutral</b> tones.</i>
<b>nondescript</b>	Lacking distinctive or interesting features or characteristics. <i>She lived in a <b>nondescript</b> suburban apartment block.</i>
<b>objective</b>	Serving as or indicating the object of a verb or of certain prepositions and used for certain other purposes. <i>A matter of <b>objective</b> fact.</i>
<b>passionless</b>	Unmoved by feeling-Margaret Deland. <i>The voice is <b>passionless</b> monotone.</i>
<b>remote</b>	(of a place) situated far from the main centres of population; distant. <i>A <b>remote</b> Welsh valley.</i>
<b>reserved</b>	Kept specially for a particular person. <i>Was habitually <b>reserved</b> in speech withholding her opinion.</i>
<b>unbiased</b>	Without bias. <i>An <b>unbiased</b> account of her family problems.</i>
<b>unconcerned</b>	Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous. <i>Scott seemed <b>unconcerned</b> by his companion's problem.</i>

<b><u>unemotional</u></b>	Cool and formal in manner. <i>A flat <b>unemotional</b> voice.</i>
<b>unfeeling</b>	Devoid of feeling or sensation. <i>My mother is a cold <b>unfeeling</b> woman.</i>
<b>unprejudiced</b>	Not having or showing a dislike or distrust based on fixed or preconceived ideas. <i>An <b>unprejudiced</b> appraisal of the pros and cons.</i>
<b><u>unremarkable</u></b>	Not particularly interesting or surprising. <i>An <b>unremarkable</b> house.</i>
<b><u>unresponsive</u></b>	Not responding to some influence or stimulus. <i>These symptoms may be <b>unresponsive</b> to conventional treatment.</i>
<b>unsentimental</b>	Facing facts or difficulties realistically and with determination. <i>The speeches were short and <b>unsentimental</b>.</i>
<b>unswayed</b>	Not influenced or affected- V.L.Parrington. <i><b>Unswayed</b> by personal considerations.</i>
<b>with no axe to grind</b>	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
<b><u>withdrawn</u></b>	Withdrawn from society seeking solitude. <i>When her husband died she became very <b>withdrawn</b>.</i>

<b>apathy</b>	The trait of lacking enthusiasm for or interest in things generally. <i>Widespread <b>apathy</b> among students.</i>
<b>asexual</b>	(of reproduction) not involving the fusion of gametes. <i>I d been smitten with Fox but in an entirely <b>asexual</b> way.</i>
<b>bland</b>	Showing no strong emotion. <i>Standardized <b>bland</b> beers of mediocre quality.</i>

<b>dispassionate</b>	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>A journalist should be a <b>dispassionate</b> reporter of fact.</i>
<b>doublet</b>	A man's short close-fitting padded jacket, commonly worn from the 14th to the 17th century. <i>They were wearing red velvet <b>doublets</b> and hose.</i>
<b>goal</b>	An instance of sending the ball into or over the goal especially as a unit of scoring in a game. <i>The decisive opening <b>goal</b>.</i>
<b>impartial</b>	Free from undue bias or preconceived opinions. <i>The cold neutrality of an <b>impartial</b> judge.</i>
<b>impartiality</b>	An inclination to weigh both views or opinions equally. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure <b>impartiality</b> in the judging process.</i>
<b>inactive</b>	Not engaging in or involving any or much physical activity. <i><b>Inactive</b> machinery.</i>
<b>inanimate</b>	Not alive. <i>The word car is <b>inanimate</b>.</i>
<b>inert</b>	Lacking vigour. <i>She lay <b>inert</b> in her bed.</i>



<b><u>intention</u></b>	An act of intending; a volition that you intend to carry out. <i>My <b>intention</b> changed once I saw her.</i>
<b>intermediate</b>	A person at an intermediate level of knowledge or skill. <i>An <b>intermediate</b> stage of development.</i>
<b>median</b>	Denoting the middle term or mean of the middle two terms of a series arranged in order of magnitude For example the median number of the series 55 62 76 85 93 is 76. <i>The <b>median</b> value of 17 20 and 36 is 20.</i>
<b><u>middle</u></b>	In cricket tennis etc strike the ball with the middle of the bat racket or club. <i>A whole is that which has beginning <b>middle</b> and end.</i>
<b>neuter</b>	A neuter word. <i>All pit bulls must be registered and <b>neutered</b>.</i>
<b><u>neutral</u></b>	An electrically neutral point terminal conductor or wire. <i>The trial should be held on <b>neutral</b> ground.</i>
<b>neutrality</b>	PH value of 7. <i>The structure has overall electrical <b>neutrality</b>.</i>
<b>objective</b>	The objective case. <i>Examine with high power <b>objective</b>.</i>
<b><u>objectivity</u></b>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any <b>objectivity</b>.</i>
<b><u>passive</u></b>	A passive form of a verb. <i><b>Passive</b> resistance.</i>
<b>passivity</b>	The trait of remaining inactive; a lack of initiative. <i>Nickel increases the overall <b>passivity</b> of the iron.</i>
<b>purpose</b>	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose. <i>The <b>purpose</b> of the meeting is to appoint a trustee.</i>
<b>purposive</b>	Having or showing or acting with a purpose or design. <i>Teaching is a <b>purposive</b> activity.</i>
<b>squarely</b>	Directly and without evasion; not roundabout. <i>The responsibility lies <b>squarely</b> with them.</i>
<b>unconcern</b>	The trait of remaining calm and seeming not to care; a casual lack of concern. <i>He is famed for his laid back attitude his apparent <b>unconcern</b> about his actions.</i>
