Definitions of "Impersonal" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “impersonal” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not relating to or responsive to individual persons.*
- *Having no personal preference.*
- *Not influenced by, showing, or involving personal feelings.*
- *Not existing as a person.*
- *(of a place or organization) featureless and anonymous.*
- *(of a verb) used only with a formal subject (in English usually it) and expressing an action not attributable to a definite subject (as in it is snowing).*



Synonyms of "Impersonal" as an adjective (31 Words)

aloof	Not friendly or forthcoming; cool and distant. <i>He stayed aloof from the bickering.</i>
characterless	Lacking distinct or individual characteristics; dull and uninteresting.
cold	Of a person feeling uncomfortably cold. <i>Cold fury gripped him.</i>
colourless	Lacking distinctive character or interest; dull. <i>Her colourless cheeks.</i>
cool	Inducing the impression of coolness used especially of greens and blues and violets. <i>Cool summer dresses.</i>
detached	Aloof and objective. <i>She may be detached or even unfeeling but at least she is not hypocritically effusive.</i>

disinterested	Unaffected by self-interest. <i>A banker is under an obligation to give disinterested advice.</i>
dispassionate	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>A journalist should be a dispassionate reporter of fact.</i>
distant	(of a person) not closely related. <i>A distant look in his eyes.</i>
faceless	(of a person) remote and impersonal; anonymous. <i>The faceless accusers of the police state.</i>
free from discrimination	Not taken up by scheduled activities.
frigid	Unable to be sexually aroused (typically used of a woman). <i>Frigid water.</i>
grey	Used to signify the Confederate forces in the American Civil War who wore grey uniforms. <i>Grey power.</i>
indifferent	Marked by a lack of interest. <i>A properly indifferent jury.</i>
neutral	Belonging to an impartial group or state. <i>Walls are painted in neutral tones.</i>
nondescript	Lacking distinctive or interesting features or characteristics. <i>She lived in a nondescript suburban apartment block.</i>
objective	Serving as or indicating the object of a verb or of certain prepositions and used for certain other purposes. <i>A matter of objective fact.</i>
passionless	Unmoved by feeling-Margaret Deland. <i>The voice is passionless monotone.</i>
remote	(of a place) situated far from the main centres of population; distant. <i>A remote Welsh valley.</i>
reserved	Kept specially for a particular person. <i>Was habitually reserved in speech withholding her opinion.</i>
unbiased	Without bias. <i>An unbiased account of her family problems.</i>
unconcerned	Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous. <i>Scott seemed unconcerned by his companion s problem.</i>

<u>unemotional</u>	Cool and formal in manner. <i>A flat unemotional voice.</i>
unfeeling	Devoid of feeling or sensation. <i>My mother is a cold unfeeling woman.</i>
unprejudiced	Not having or showing a dislike or distrust based on fixed or preconceived ideas. <i>An unprejudiced appraisal of the pros and cons.</i>
<u>unremarkable</u>	Not particularly interesting or surprising. <i>An unremarkable house.</i>
<u>unresponsive</u>	Not responding to some influence or stimulus. <i>These symptoms may be unresponsive to conventional treatment.</i>
unsentimental	Facing facts or difficulties realistically and with determination. <i>The speeches were short and unsentimental.</i>
unswayed	Not influenced or affected- V.L.Parrington. <i>Unswayed by personal considerations.</i>
with no axe to grind	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
<u>withdrawn</u>	Withdrawn from society seeking solitude. <i>When her husband died she became very withdrawn.</i>

achromatic	Having no hue. <i>Achromatic microscopes.</i>
apathy	The trait of lacking enthusiasm for or interest in things generally. <i>Widespread apathy among students.</i>
asexual	(of reproduction) not involving the fusion of gametes. <i>I'd been smitten with Fox but in an entirely asexual way.</i>
bland	Showing no strong emotion. <i>Standardized bland beers of mediocre quality.</i>
disinterest	The state of not being influenced by personal involvement in something; impartiality. <i>He chided Dennis for his disinterest in anything that is not his own idea.</i>
disinterested	Unaffected by self-interest. <i>A banker is under an obligation to give disinterested advice.</i>
dispassion	Objectivity and detachment. <i>Her manner assumed a dispassion and dryness very unlike her usual tone.</i>
dispassionate	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>A journalist should be a dispassionate reporter of fact.</i>
doublet	A man's short close-fitting padded jacket, commonly worn from the 14th to the 17th century. <i>They were wearing red velvet doublets and hose.</i>
goal	An instance of sending the ball into or over the goal especially as a unit of scoring in a game. <i>The decisive opening goal.</i>
impartial	Free from undue bias or preconceived opinions. <i>The cold neutrality of an impartial judge.</i>
impartiality	An inclination to weigh both views or opinions equally. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure impartiality in the judging process.</i>
inactive	Not engaging in or involving any or much physical activity. <i>Inactive machinery.</i>
inanimate	Not alive. <i>The word car is inanimate.</i>
inert	Lacking vigour. <i>She lay inert in her bed.</i>

intention	An act of intending; a volition that you intend to carry out. <i>My intention changed once I saw her.</i>
intermediate	A person at an intermediate level of knowledge or skill. <i>An intermediate stage of development.</i>
median	Denoting the middle term or mean of the middle two terms of a series arranged in order of magnitude For example the median number of the series 55 62 76 85 93 is 76. <i>The median value of 17 20 and 36 is 20.</i>
middle	In cricket tennis etc strike the ball with the middle of the bat racket or club. <i>A whole is that which has beginning middle and end.</i>
neuter	A neuter word. <i>All pit bulls must be registered and neutered.</i>
neutral	An electrically neutral point terminal conductor or wire. <i>The trial should be held on neutral ground.</i>
neutrality	PH value of 7. <i>The structure has overall electrical neutrality.</i>
objective	The objective case. <i>Examine with high power objective.</i>
objectivity	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any objectivity.</i>
passive	A passive form of a verb. <i>Passive resistance.</i>
passivity	The trait of remaining inactive; a lack of initiative. <i>Nickel increases the overall passivity of the iron.</i>
purpose	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose. <i>The purpose of the meeting is to appoint a trustee.</i>
purposive	Having or showing or acting with a purpose or design. <i>Teaching is a purposive activity.</i>
squarely	Directly and without evasion; not roundabout. <i>The responsibility lies squarely with them.</i>
unconcern	The trait of remaining calm and seeming not to care; a casual lack of concern. <i>He is famed for his laid back attitude his apparent unconcern about his actions.</i>
