incautious	Carelessly failing to exercise proper caution. <i>Incautious</i> talk.
injudicious	Lacking or showing lack of judgment or discretion; unwise. An <b>injudicious</b> measure.
madcap	Done without considering the consequences; foolish or reckless. A <b>madcap</b> scheme.
overhasty	Excessively hasty. Rejected what was regarded as an <b>overhasty</b> plan for reconversion.
powerful	Possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful. His <b>powerful</b> arms.
<u>raging</u>	Tremendous. The river became a <b>raging</b> torrent.
<u>rampant</u>	(especially of something unwelcome) flourishing or spreading unchecked. <i>Two gold lions <b>rampant</b></i> .
rash	Acting or done without careful consideration of the possible consequences; impetuous. It would be extremely <b>rash</b> to make such an assumption.
<u>reckless</u>	Characterized by careless unconcern- Edith Wharton. <i>Reckless</i> squandering of public funds.
<u>relentless</u>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. A patient but <b>relentless</b> taskmaster.
tearaway	Characterized by undue haste and lack of thought or deliberation; (`brainish' is archaic.
<u>torrential</u>	Resembling a torrent in force and abundance. They plunged into the <b>torrential</b> waters.
<u>unbridled</u>	Uncontrolled; unconstrained. <b>Unbridled</b> rage.
<u>uncontrolled</u>	Not being under control; out of control. <i>Uncontrolled</i> growth.
<u>unplanned</u>	Not planned. Accepts an <b>unplanned</b> order.



unreasoned	Not based on good sense or logic. An <b>unreasoned</b> reaction to the idea.
<u>unrestrained</u>	Not restrained or restricted. A display of <b>unrestrained</b> delight.
unthinking	Not exhibiting or characterized by careful thought. She was at pains to correct <b>unthinking</b> prejudices.
<u>vigorous</u>	Strong and active physically or mentally. A tall <b>vigorous</b> and muscular man.
violent	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i>A violent</i> confrontation with riot police.

arrhythmic	Relating to or suffering from cardiac arrhythmia. The <b>arrhythmic</b> phrasing of the music.
<u>capricious</u>	Changeable. Authoritarian rulers are frequently <b>capricious</b> .
<u>careless</u>	Effortless and unstudied. She had been <b>careless</b> and had left the window unlocked.
cursory	Hasty and therefore not thorough or detailed. A casual or <b>cursory</b> inspection failed to reveal the house s structural flaws.
fast	At a rapid tempo. <i>Her foot was stuck <b>fast</b>.</i>



fitful	Intermittently stopping and starting. Business was <b>fitful</b> .
<u>haste</u>	Excessive speed or urgency of movement or action; hurry. In his <b>haste</b> to leave he forgot his book.
hasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>Made a hasty exit.</i>
headlong	Excessively quick. <i>He fell <b>headlong</b> into the tent.</i>
hurried	Done in a hurry; rushed. I ate a <b>hurried</b> breakfast.
hurry	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. In my <b>hurry</b> to leave I knocked over a pile of books.
impetuosity	Rash impulsiveness.
impulsive	Characterized by undue haste and lack of thought or deliberation. An <b>impulsive</b> gesture of affection.
madcap	Amusingly eccentric. <i>Madcap</i> escapades.
overhasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>Rejected what was regarded as an <b>overhasty</b> plan for reconversion.</i>
precipitant	A substance that causes the precipitation of a specified substance. A protein <b>precipitant</b> .
quick	Moving quickly and lightly. His <b>quick</b> reaction prevented an accident.
rapidly	Very quickly; at a great rate. The business is expanding <b>rapidly</b> .
rashly	In a hasty and foolhardy manner. <b>Rashly</b> Theresa accepts a second date with Tony.
rush	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. As soon as the campaign started they <b>rush</b> ed into action.
rushed	Done under pressure. A <b>rushed</b> job.
slapdash	Marked by great carelessness. <i>He gave a <b>slapdash</b> performance.</i>
spasmodic	Occurring or done in brief, irregular bursts. A <b>spasmodic</b> cough.



sudden	Suddenly. A <b>sudden</b> cure.
suddenly	Quickly and unexpectedly. <i>He stopped <b>suddenly</b>.</i>
<u>swift</u>	Swiftly. A <b>swift</b> moving narrative.
<u>swiftly</u>	Without delay; after a very short time. This comment was <b>swiftly</b> followed by an apology for such a poor choice of words.
