- *The act of applying force suddenly.*



Synonyms of "Impetus" as a noun (17 Words)

boost	The act of giving a push. <i>He gave her a boost over the fence.</i>
<u>drift</u>	A horizontal (or nearly horizontal) passageway in a mine. <i>The pilot had not noticed any appreciable drift.</i>
<u>drive</u>	Hitting a golf ball off of a tee with a driver. <i>He experimented with chain drive to run the propeller.</i>
driving force	The act of controlling and steering the movement of a vehicle or animal.
encouragement	The feeling of being encouraged. <i>Incentives and encouragement to play sports.</i>
<u>impulse</u>	A change of momentum produced by an impulse equivalent to the average value of the force multiplied by the time during which it acts. <i>I had an almost irresistible impulse to giggle.</i>
impulsion	A force that moves something along. <i>Attitudes changed under the impulsion of humanitarian considerations.</i>

incentive	A thing that motivates or encourages someone to do something. <i>Tax incentives for investing in depressed areas.</i>
incitement	The act of exhorting; an earnest attempt at persuasion. <i>The incitement of mutiny.</i>
inducement	A positive motivational influence. <i>There is no inducement to wait for payment.</i>
inspiration	An act of breathing in; an inhalation. <i>Helen had one of her flashes of inspiration.</i>
momentum	The impetus gained by a moving object. <i>The momentum of the particles was deduced from meteoritic velocities.</i>
motivation	The psychological feature that arouses an organism to action toward a desired goal; the reason for the action; that which gives purpose and direction to behavior. <i>The following proposal and motivation is submitted for consideration.</i>
motive force	A theme that is repeated or elaborated in a piece of music.
propulsion	The action of driving or pushing forwards. <i>They dive and use their wings for propulsion under water.</i>
stimulus	An interesting and exciting quality. <i>She loved the stimulus of the job.</i>

immense	Extremely large or great, especially in scale or degree. <i>At vast or immense expense.</i>
incentive	A payment or concession to stimulate greater output or investment. <i>Tax incentives for investing in depressed areas.</i>
inducement	A bribe. <i>Inducement of sleep.</i>
large	A garment size for a large person. <i>A large city.</i>
mammoth	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A mammoth corporation.</i>
massive	Imposing in scale or scope or degree or power. <i>Massive crowds are expected.</i>
motivation	A set of facts and arguments used in support of a proposal. <i>Escape can be a strong motivation for travel.</i>
motivator	A person who promotes interest in or enthusiasm for something. <i>She was a great motivator of people and very energetic.</i>
oversized	Bigger than the usual size. <i>An oversized T shirt.</i>
overwhelming	Very strong; urgently felt. <i>An overwhelming majority.</i>

prodigious	Of momentous or ominous significance- Herman Melville. <i>A prodigious storm.</i>
repercussion	A movement back from an impact. <i>His declaration had unforeseen repercussions.</i>
sizable	Fairly large. <i>A sizable fortune.</i>
sized	Having the surface treated or coated with sizing. <i>Comfortably sized rooms.</i>
stimulus	A thing or event that evokes a specific functional reaction in an organ or tissue. <i>She loved the stimulus of the job.</i>
stupendous	So great in size or force or extent as to elicit awe. <i>A stupendous field of grass.</i>
titanic	Of great force or power. <i>A series of titanic explosions.</i>
